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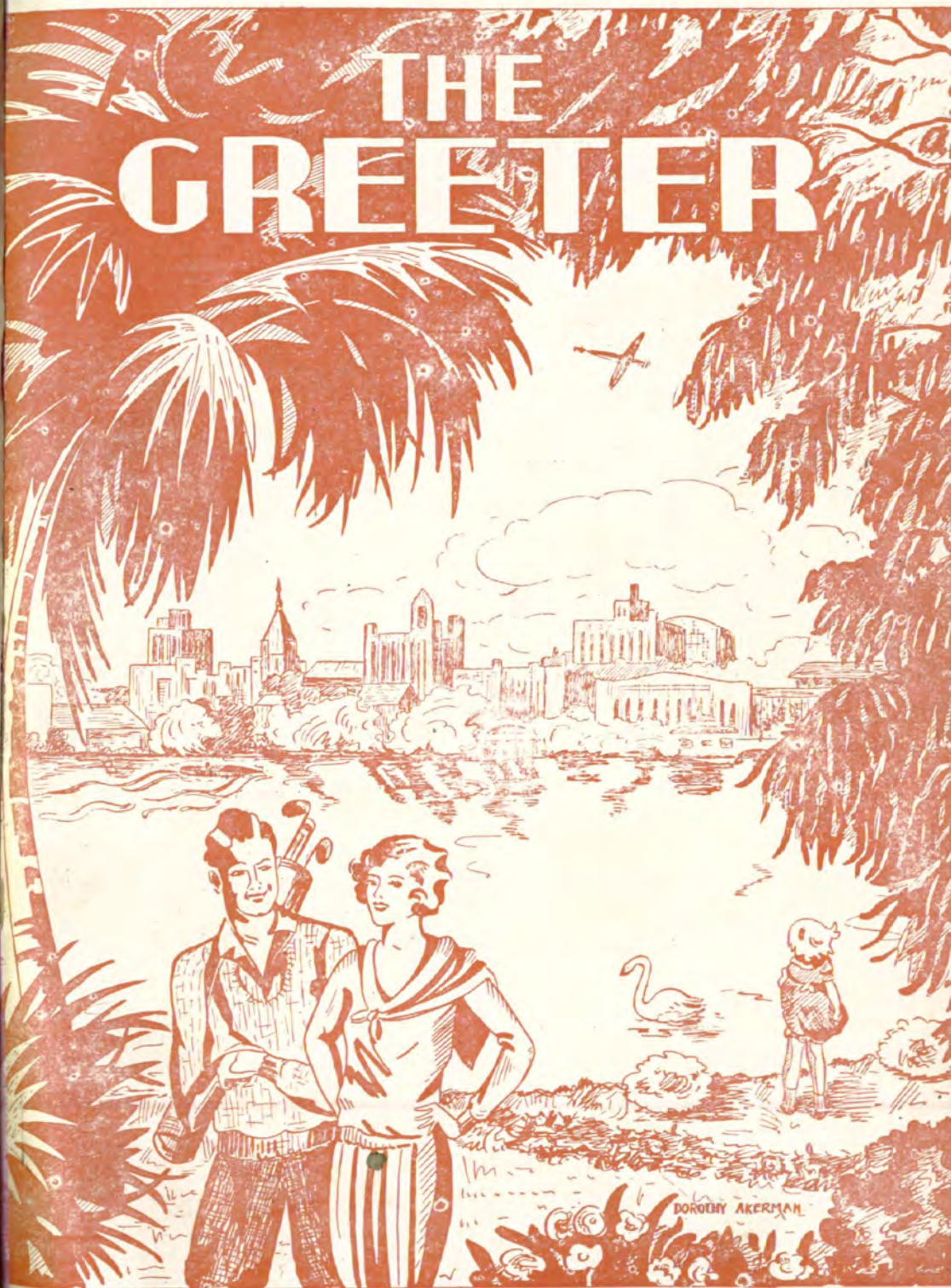

I've always yearned for a yacht! Whenever this yearning of mine is voiced at the family fireside the temperature usually drops. "You need a yacht about as badly as you need a battleship," opines friend wife, "and the family budget will support either equally as well, at present writing. If you hadn't tried to run a shoe-string into a tannery during the real estate boom, we might—"

"But Poodle," I parry, "if we had a small yacht we could save automobile expenses, hotel bills, have a place to entertain our fishermen friends, keep trophies and give bridge parties anywhere and everywhere we dropped anchor or tied to a dock. In the winter we could run to any port on the Florida coast and during the summer we could take trips to the North, sail when and where we pleased, and in a short time the money saved would pay for the boat. I think it's a grand idea."

"And I think you're all wet. By the way, have you mailed a check for the rent, the gas and electric bill, paid that man for the work he did on the lawn and settled your income tax and insurance premium; I believe the income tax matter will be a mere trifle this year, if any?" So the yacht proposition is again listed under the heading of unfinished business and once more relegated to the suspense file.

Last week a friend invited us to spend the week-end on his 55-foot yacht during a salt water fishing trip on the gulf. "We will be ready to leave the dock at St. Petersburg about 4 P. M., Friday; bring your tackle and if there is anything

special you like in the way of food bring it along, but remember we have about everything imaginable in the way of stores, so don't bring too much junk, and remember we expect to be back early Monday morning."

When I helped load the list of "specials" Poodle selected I thought we were going to compete with Piggly-Wiggly or join Byrd on his polar expedition. She brought everything imaginable from cans of tomato juice to "ham what 'am" and packed two-thirds of her kitchen utensils, insisting that they might come in handy, regardless of the fact that the yacht's galley appeared fairly well supplied with everything a cook could possibly find use for during a three-day trip.

The yachting trip was a grand and glorious success! We had ideal weather, the gulf and the bay were calm, and the salt water fishing was simply great. The longer I was aboard and the more I explored the boat, the more determined I became to have a yacht of my very own, so with this idea uppermost I sidled up to the captain and presented my verbal questionnaire. What did this boat cost? \$57,000, six years ago. What was the captain's salary? \$325 per month. How much gas did it carry, and what was the mileage per gallon? Two tanks of 250 gallons each; one emergency tank of 50 gallons; the boat averaged about five miles per gallon—about three while cruising. Supplies, etc., averaged \$750 per month, while insurance, tolls, license, docking, painting and repairs were about \$150 per month extra.

Yes, indeed, Mrs. Kelly, we have a wonderful navy and it is supported by the government, but your tax and my tax pays the freight. So until I become a successful bootlegger or get elected to the senate my yacht is going to be a hired row boat equipped with an outboard motor.

But I still insist owning a yacht is a darn swell idea—if it happens to be owned and kept in commission by the other fellow.

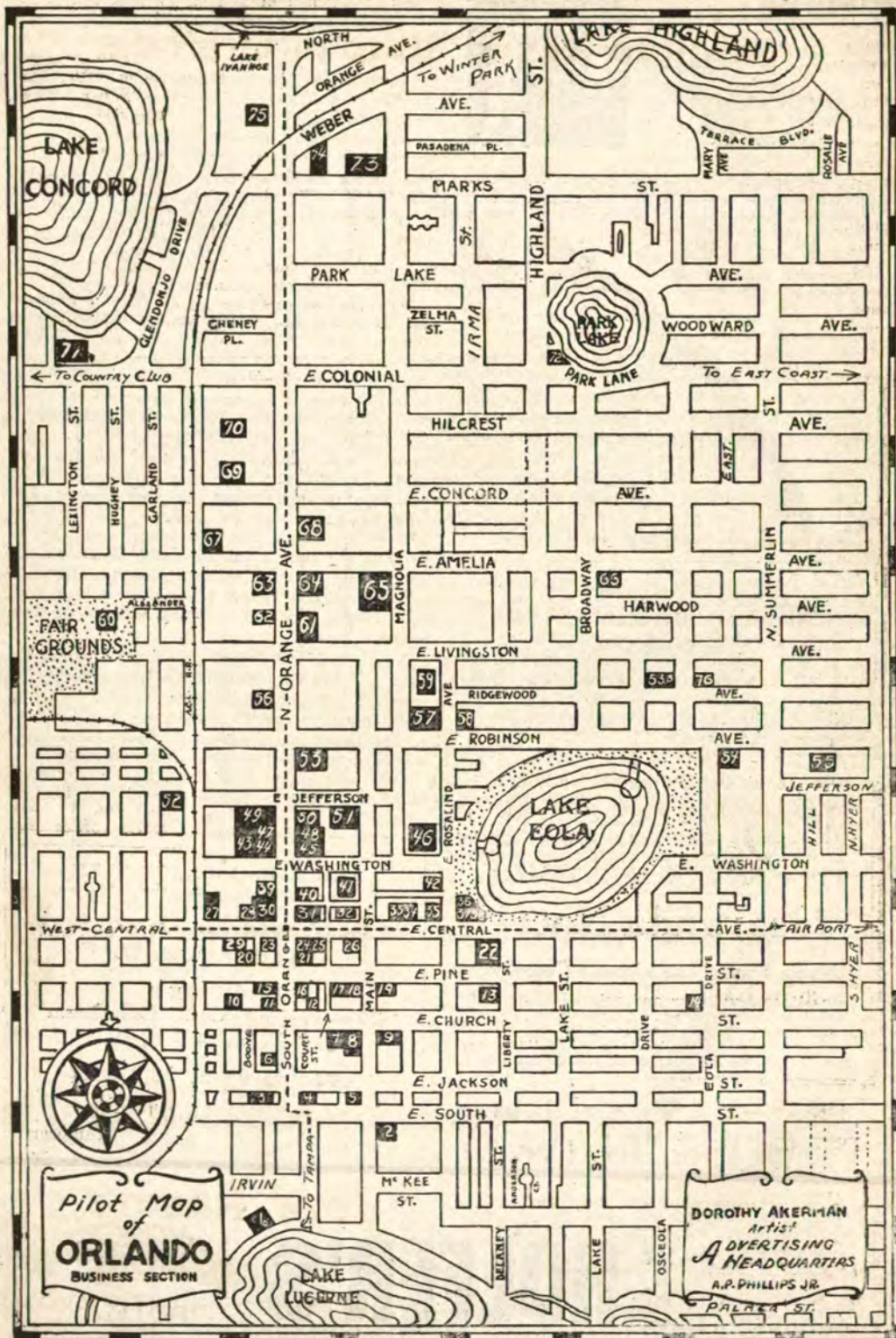

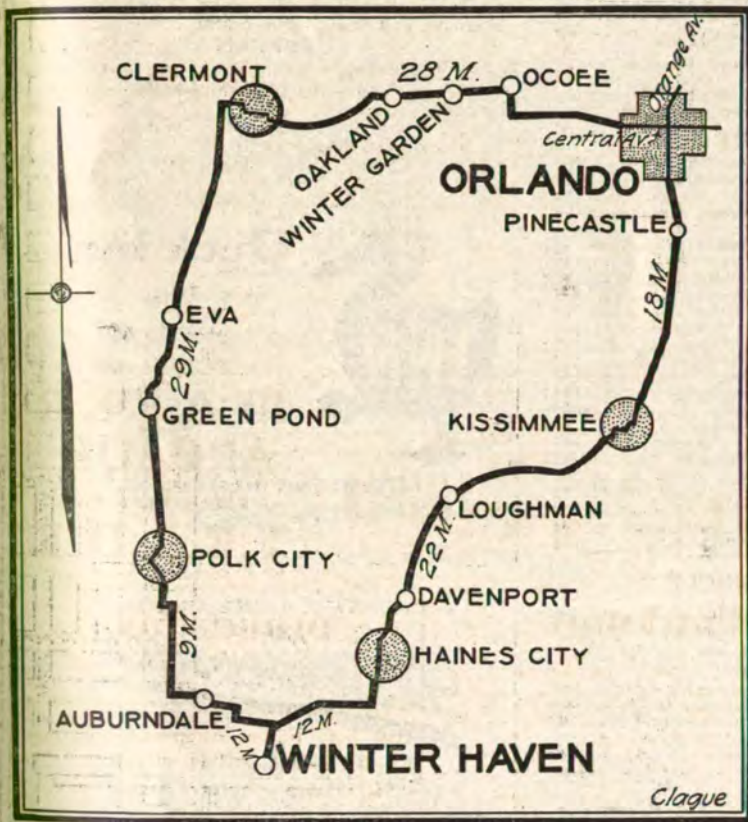
