This is because a skin test is usually required of snake bite victims to see if they are allergic to the anti-venom serum that may have to be administered.


The closest hospital for anyone bitten on campus is Winter Park Memorial Hospital just off Aloma Avenue.







Kissel Heads Communications

Those who are enrolled in course in the field of communication are destined to come in contact with Dr. Bernard C. Kissel. head of the department.

Dr. Kissel was born in Grand Rapids. Michigan. He attended Grand Rapids Jr. College. Later he enrolled at the University of Michigan, where he received his B.A. in speech. He was active in sports throughout college, participating in both football and track.

Upon graduation he was inducted into the armed services as a Lieutenant, and then served in the Korean Conflict.

Dr. Kissel, after his discharge, returned to the University of Michigan to receive his Masters and Ph.D. in Communications.

As an educator he occupied the position of an instructor at the University of Michigan for a period of two years. Then transferring to the University of



Texas, he taught nine years on subjects ranging from speech to semantics.

Dr. Kissell is very active in many civic groups and organizations. He is chairman of the board of the Presbyterian Campus Ministry, and is an elder in the Presbyterian church.

He was not only instrumental in the creation of the Association for the Visual Handicapped Students in Public and Private schools but also, served a term as the organization's vice-president.

Other organizations he has been affiliation with include: advertising manager for the Southern Speech Association; assistant editor of Speech Monographs; Editoral Advisor for Prentice Hall and Alysm Barn. A member of the legislative assembly of the Speech Association of America.
