Doggone the depression! Just when we had a fine fishing and duck-shooting trip nicely arranged—up pops the devil. The camp was located in another county necessitating state hunting licenses for three members of the party and a state license costs \$8.50—\$25.50 for the privilege of one or two day's ducking. No can do—especially when the three who lacked a license were working for a salary and the trip was planned the right before pay-day. The duck-shooting was declared out and we proceeded up the river for bass.

While on the subject, how about this damphool hunting and fishing license? ee that the sportsmen of Florida have been contributing to a lost cause ever since the organization of the Fish & Game Department? What benefits are we getting and what improvements have been made in the hunting and fishing that you know of. The lakes and the river are jammed with hyacinths that are ruining the bass fishing. There are no markers on the river that indicate channels from slues and about the only thing we get for our money are restrictions. The rattlesnakes have taken the fields and woods by storm until no man with sense will unleash a good bird dog in any county in the state—unless we have a decided cold spell that will route the snakes.

It's high time we sportsmen advocated a state wide license for Florida residents at a price commensurate with what we get. \$1.00 is ample for the state wide fishing fee and not more than \$3.00 for a state wide hunting license. We in-

vegle out of state sportsmen to Florida to hunt and fish and then tax them \$10.50 for a fishing license and \$25.00 for a hunting license—regardless if their stay is for a week-end or for the season.

The former charge is out of line entirely and the latter is simply obtaining money under false pretenses. The result of the present license fees is that most men dodge and side-step or refuse to hunt or fish outside the county of their residence and as a matter of cold, frosty facts most of the time of the wardens is spent chasing fishermen and hunters to inspect their license.

If Governor Sholtz follows his determination to abolish the Department of Fresh Water Fish & Game it will be regarded as a calamity by many of the conservation theorists, and will doubtless destroy what little progress we have made in organizing a competent protective organization but if he reforms it he will have the support of every sportsman in the state. It's time to quit playing politics and get down to brass tacks if we are going to protect what few fish we have in the inland lakes and what little game is left today of the vast quantity we had only a few years back.

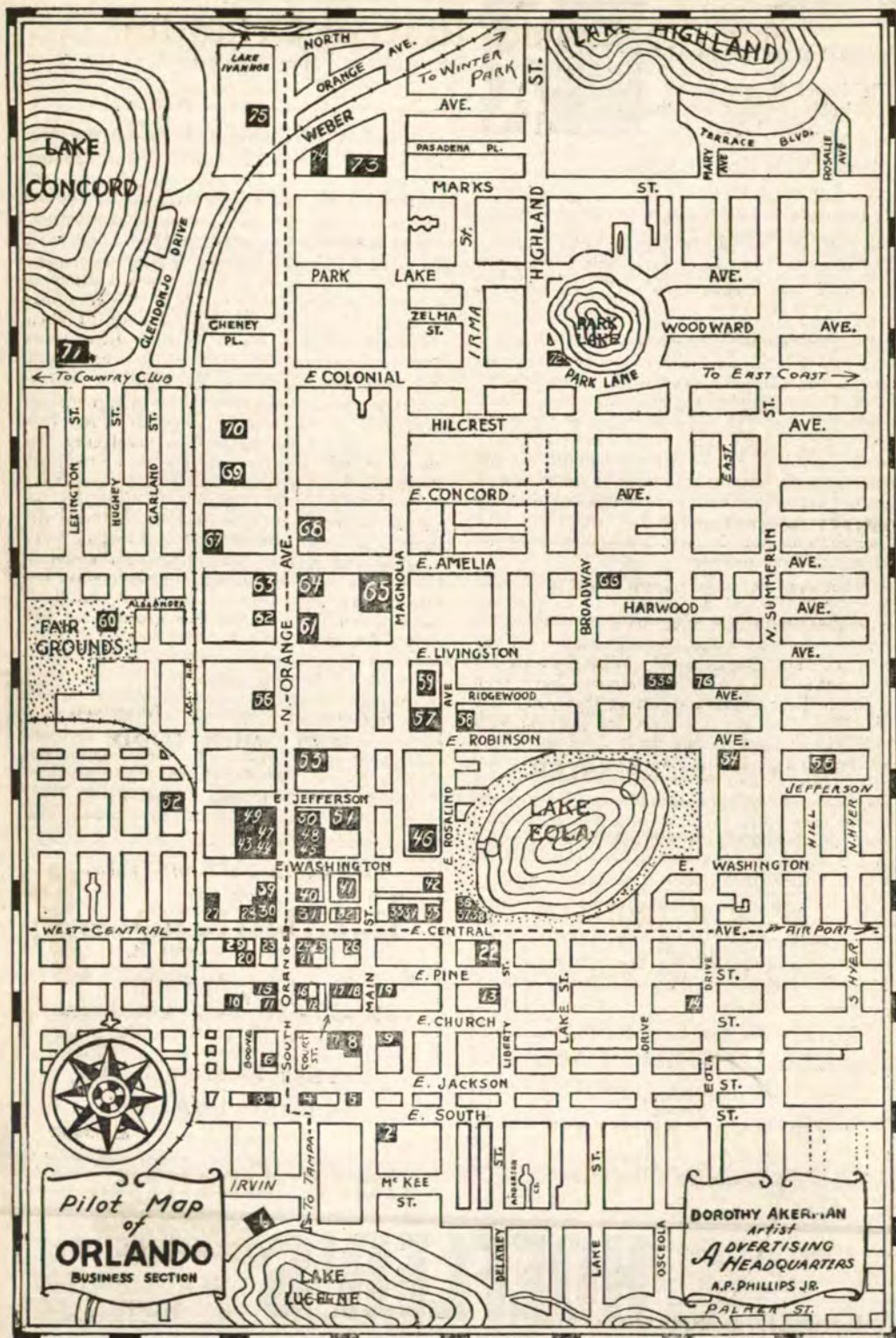
