to send for a servant the indox^r refused to lett I
movinge haue my horse unless he had an ord^r from
thee, for thou not being in towne I could not finde
I heard that one Tho. Ford hath conuict the doore
I taken him away with he ought not to adone for I des^t
to heare from thee whether thou gaue any such ord^r
I though I my selfe be detained in prison, heard for
atime I desire will rom for I would thou would not
lett me be robed or my horse plundered or rather stolen
from mee for such doings as I haue mett with howe
in the Citie if my horse & saddle & cloath be taken
away I be in prison is such as I thinke mett with before
now it is vnkward of iustitie it makes moderate people to
wonder that a man cannot rom to the Citie of west^r
your going to stay but one night, I would not eat any
mans bread for nought but be cast in prison, and
haue his horse taken from him, for I would haue my
horse restored that I who haue most right may
