E W. "Gene" Skinner, Warren, Ohio sportsman and writer, arrived in Orlando to-day and solemnly declared he was through with the North once and for all. "I've been coming to Florida for the past twelve years," was his greeting, "and now I'm here for keeps. I like to fish and I love to hunt and I don't know of any place on earth that offers better of both than Florida. I'm checking into this state for keeps. Let's go fishin'."

I had so many things to discuss and so many recent fishing experiences to relate that most of the day passed before we got back to the proposed fishing trip and then we decided to visit all the camps on Lake Apopka, look things over and start our fishing bright and early tomorrow morning.

We drove to Johnson's Camp, Well's Gap Fishing Camp, Jacksons Camp and the Edgewater Club at Winter Garden and every place we went found fishermen embarking or returning and some of them had mighty fine strings of bass. So tomorrow bright and early, as aforesaid, we will hike to the St. John's river and I'll row the boat while 'Gene shows me he has not lost any of the old time skill that made him famous as a bass fisherman.

Angling is an enterprise which has many of the elements of gambling, but the item of chance should be removed from the planting of fish. Newly hatched fry and small fingerlings placed in lakes or streams filled with suckers, gar and rough fish is an out-and-out gamble with nature since the cards are all stacked against the little fellows chances of reaching maturity.

"When we plant a bass six inches long or upwards we have pretty good assurance that this fish will be on hand several years later to view with a critical eye the various dizzy-looking lures tossed in his direction by the rod and reel sport fishermen," says 'Gene Skinner, and 'Gene,

by the way, is an eminent authority on fish culture. "Fish of this size," adds 'Gene, "in all probability, will have a chance to reproduce their kind, and, after all, our fishing must to a very large extent depend upon the method of replenishment we use, rather than the hatchery output. The bigger the fish we plant the better their chances to survive and produce more fish."

On Lake Apopka to-day I discussed fishing with a 70 year old enthusiast who hailed from California and whose most vivid experience in life was the landing of a 700 lb. jewfish several years ago. "Shucks!" he grumbled as he untangled his lure from a two pound bass, "This kind of fishing is too tame for an old timer like myself. I want to hook a tarpon, jewfish or marlin that will put up a real fight."

"Who helped you land that 700 pound jewfish?" I asked. "Narry a soul helped me land him, I made him quit fightin' all by myself; of course about seven fellers took hold of the rope and helped me tow him ashore but I caught and conquered him all by myself."—Page Ripley.

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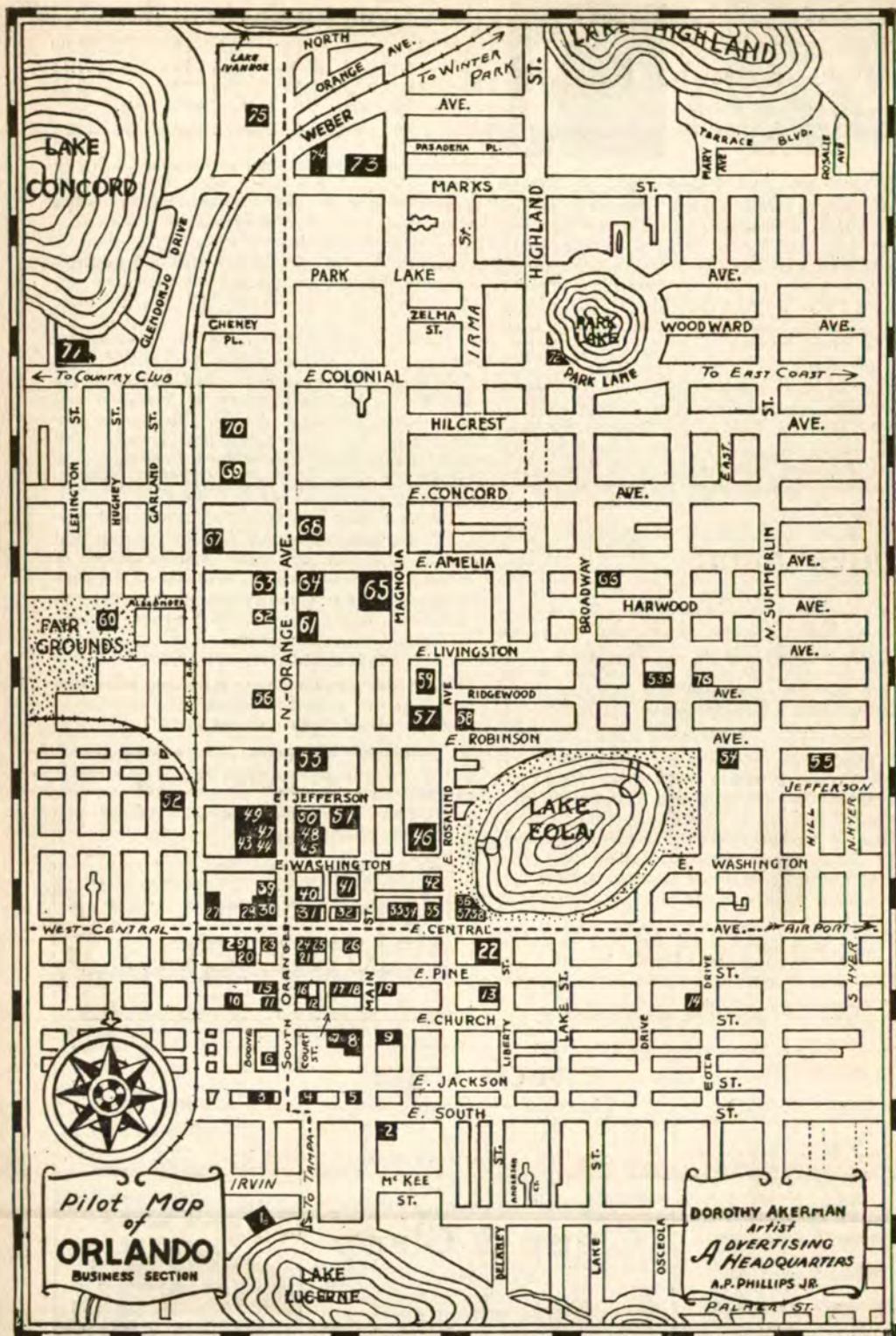
