Sea-angling is yearly winning converts from the fresh water streams of England, according to recent reports, and the followers of Izaak Walton are steadily forsaking their depleted streams in the land where fishing first became an art.

River fishing in England has deteriorated rapidly during the last thirty years because of pollution and diminution of the supply of fresh stock. Some rivers have been converted into open sewers, others have been dredged and canalized in such a manner that the spawning grounds no longer exist. On others fast motor launches send a wave along the banks leaving the fry high and dry, while dab-chicks, ducks and swans devour the spawn.

The Angler's News of London thus summarizes the situation: "There are many reasons why sea-angling has increased in popularity. One of them is because fresh-water anglers, who always fished with fine tackle, have found that their old ideas of sea-angling were fallacious. They have been under the impression that there was no real angling in the sea.

"For many years past men have been catching in the sea very much larger fish than their brother anglers in fresh water have ever taken, with tackle that is much finer than that used on our rivers.

"That fine sporting sea-fish, the bass, has been taken up to ten pounds, at least, on 1x gut, and the writer does not think that many fresh-water anglers would consistently use gut of this description when angling for fish of this weight from a moored boat or from terra firma.

"Many sea-anglers use a fly-rod when fishing for this sporting fish, and generally speaking, it is very doubtful whether the great majority of present day sea-anglers do not fish as finely as fresh water anglers.

"The London angler is more or less forced to become a sea-angler and, when once he has tasted the delights of the sea, he always feels

the call of it. Another reason for the popularity of sea-angling is the fact that a much greater percentage of fish caught in the sea can be put on the breakfast table. Very few sea-fish are not delicious when properly prepared.

"We sea-anglers hold out both hands in invitation to fresh-water anglers to join our ranks, assured of the fact that Neptune will keep up a steady supply of victims to their rods. Every fresh-water angler has in his possession all the tackle that he needs for fishing in the sea."

What is true of England's waters is equally true of the fresh waters of America and Canada. Daily the fresh water game fish are being depleted and unless something radical is done and done immediately less than five years will see Florida's famous bass fishing a thing of the past. Fish are a stored product and unless restocking and destruction of rough fish is done on a large scale our famous inland lakes and streams will be bassless.

Don't imagine that the present day plentitude of medium size bass in Lake Apopka and similar lakes will always be with us. The famous Blue Cypress was robbed of its lunker bass last season by seiners and bass-bootleggers and today you can cast from shore to shore and your only reward will be a few large mouths—just keepers.

This accounts for the number of local anglers who are invading the salt water fishing camps while the bass waters are forsaken. It's up to you Mr. Sportsman to help remedy the situation. What are you going to do about it?

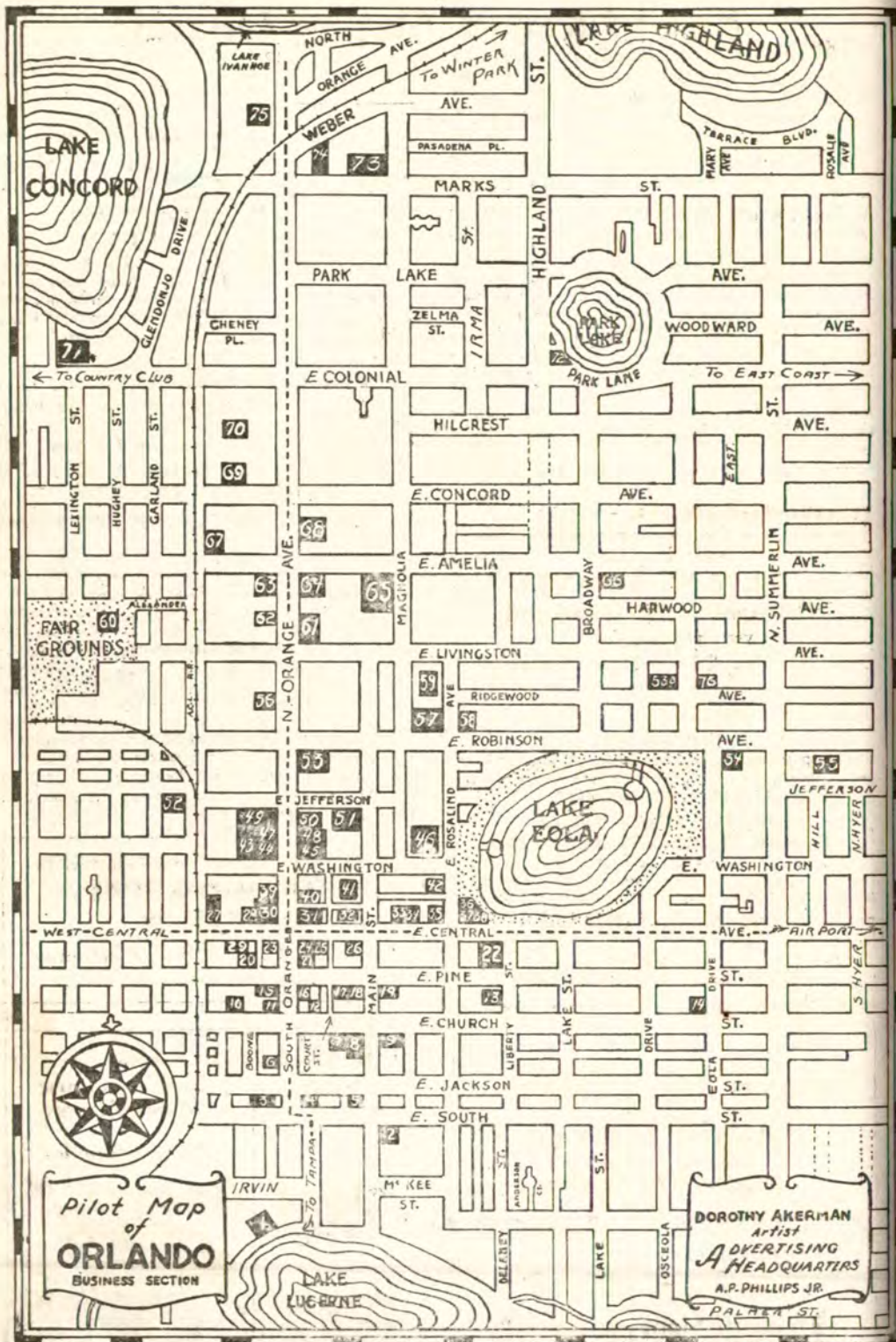

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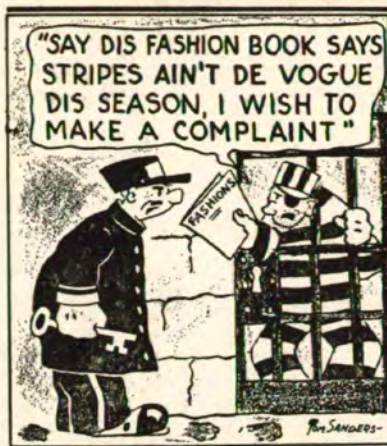

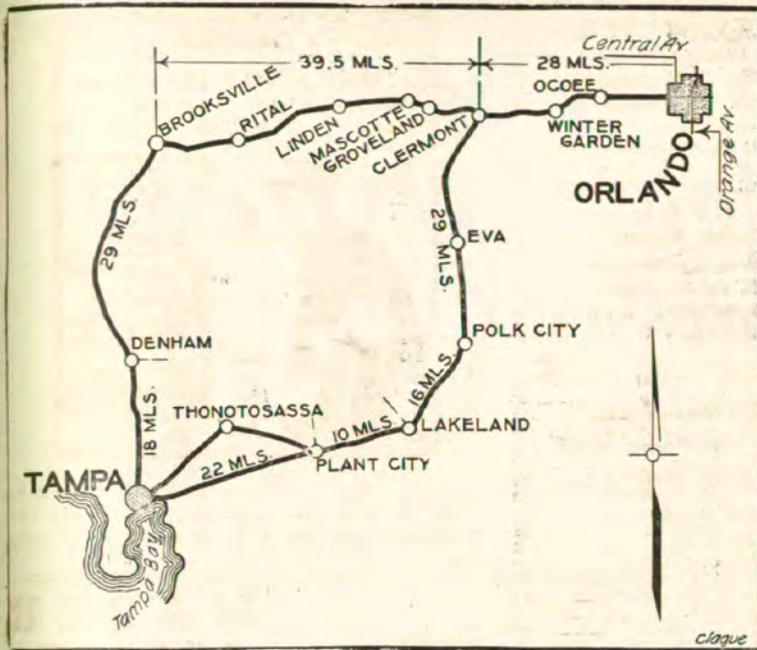
