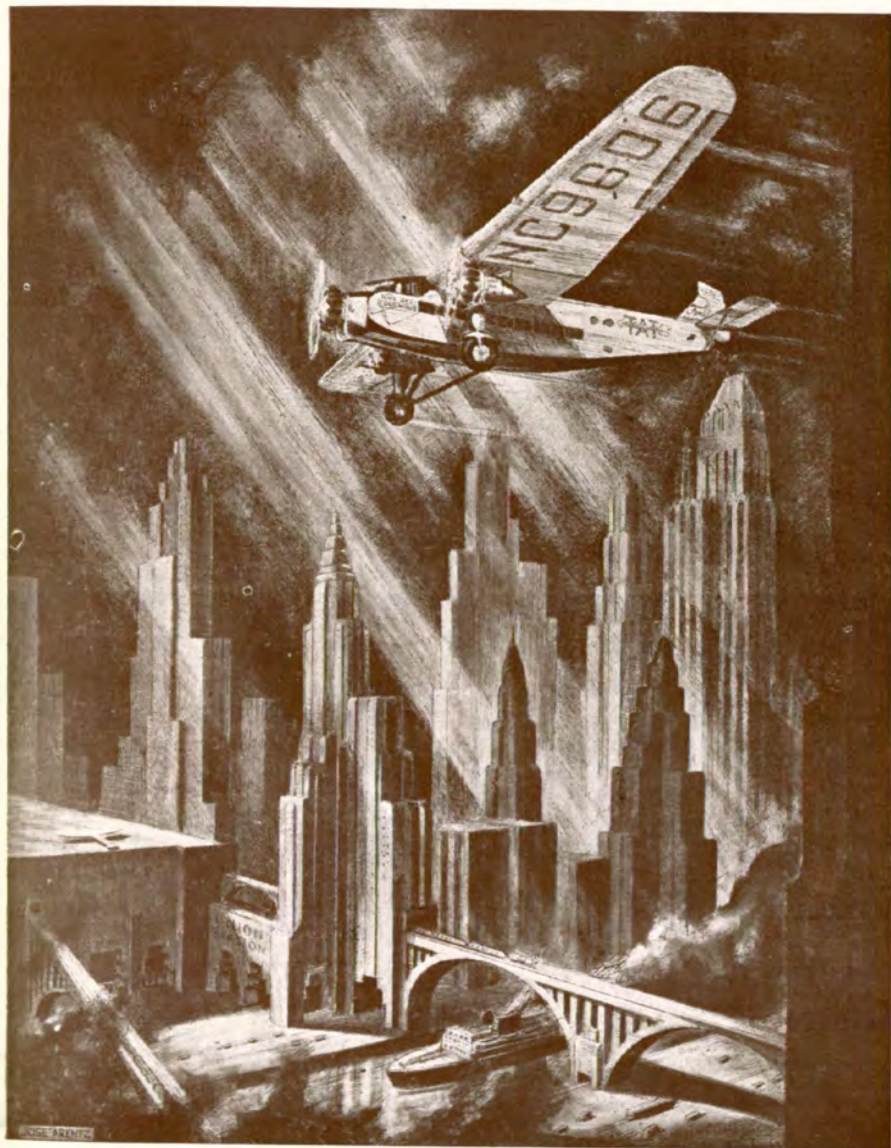

As a cold business proposition, let me give you this: THERE IS NO BETTER INVESTMENT IN FLORIDA TO-DAY THAN ACREAGE BORDERING ON ANY OF THE INLAND BASS LAKES. The greatest asset this state has is fresh and salt water fishing. It is Florida's one-best-bet and it will continue to attract sportsmen, men of affairs and winter tourists year after year as long as the fishing supremacy of Florida is maintained.

In these trying times when the average person pinches a dollar until the eagle screams with pain, one, and ONLY ONE, attraction lures the man of moderate means to Florida. Its WINTER OUTDOOR SPORTS! Here are a few illustrations that may serve as food for thought. Eight months ago Mr. J. F. Moody of Winter Park purchased the ten acre track on Lake Apopka known as Fisherman's Paradise for practically a song. Mr. Moody spent some eight or ten thousand dollars in improvements, including modern docks, boats, and equipment. Since this resort was opened to the public as a fishing camp it has averaged 10% return on the total investment. Where is a business, eight months old, that can show and prove like earnings? And remember most of the time shown in the books and records of Fisherman's Paradise covers the dulllest months of the year in Florida. of the ducks on the St. John's river, the deer and wild turkey shooting in the Big Scrub, the bass in our more than thirty thousand inland lakes, you'll find, nine times out of ten, that you've struck a responsive chord and found an intent and eager listener. I've tried it and I know. From June until November in 1930 I interviewed some 700 business and professional men in connection with the Hidden Lake Game Preserve, sponsored by Mr. Fred W. Warner, a retired official of General Motors. In every instance my allotted fifteen minutes, grudgingly granted until I made known the object of my visit was simply to talk fishing, lengthened into hours and but for the untimely death of Mr. Warner, a majority of those 700 men would be in Florida to-day. The business man of the nation are just beginning to learn to PLAY.

Don't believe for one moment that this great country of ours has gone to the bow-wows. The United States of America is too great, too powerful and too wealthy a nation to succumb for any great length of time to the ill effect of any depression. The Morgan once said: "Any man who is a bear on the future of America, will go broke!" That is as true to-day as when uttered and those of us with the vision of J. Pierpont Morgan will profit by following his example. When our people discern and remove the cause of the present condition, re-adjustment will surely and quickly come and this state and all others will emerge triumphant. Men will again commence to play, rest and recreate; and no greater play ground exists than that afforded by the State of Florida. Let's go fishin' . . . .

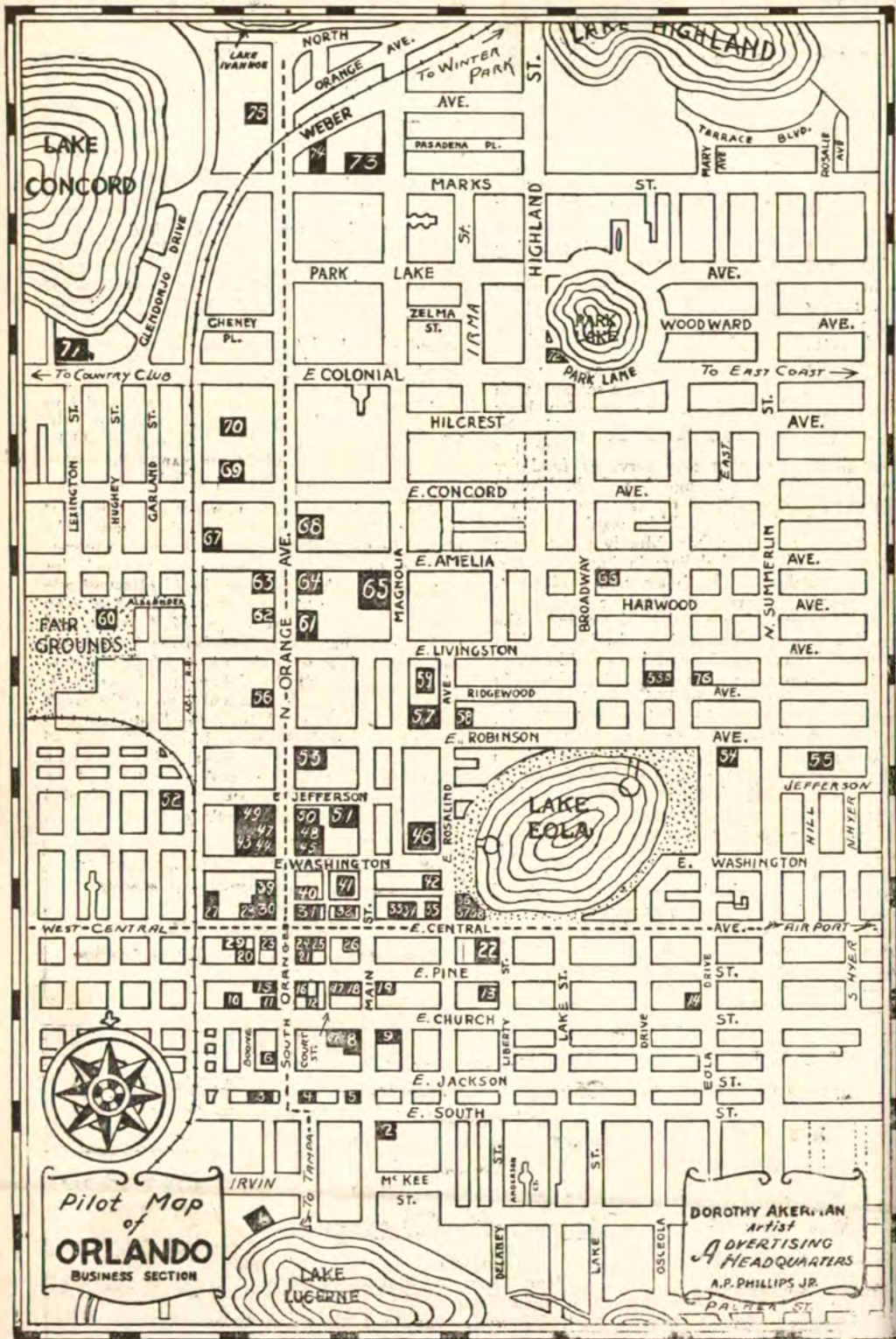
