# fishing

The deer hunting season in Florida closed December 31 and the waterfowl season, January 15. The season on quail, turkey and cat squirrel closes February 15. The fresh water fishing season is, of course, open throughout the year, with the exceptions which call for closed periods, in April and May, in Calhoun, Gulf and Sumter Counties and the Choctawhatchee River. Bass fishing is unusually good this season in this section. As a year 'round proposition there is no more dependable bass fishing lake than the mammoth and ever productive old Lake Apopka. Well's Gap and Fisherman's Paradise on the South shore line, just 14 miles from Orlando over the finest of paved roads via Clarcona offer every compliment for a day of real sport. The record catch from the latter camp during the last week was a 13 lb. bass caught last Sunday with a Creek Chub No. 2,000. The record string was taken by three ladies from the Buckeye state, who landed the day's limit, 36 bass, in less than four hours fishing. Even the live bait dock fishermen have hung up noticeable records, the largest bass caught from the dock being 12 lbs., with two eight pounders as runners up.

Let's go fishing!

Fresh fish every day are available at Dr. V. A. Strayer's table. Doc is one of the most ardent fishermen in these parts and usually brings home the limit at least three times a week. The entire catch upon his return home being placed in a special tank and revived and, therefore, really fresh fish are on hand when the appetite wills.

Tom Connelly of St. Paul, Minn., made the 400 mile journey from Grand Rapids, Mich., to New Orleans, La., on a cedar log 32 inches in diameter and 16 feet in length. This famous lumberjack now holds all distance records for log riding. His log was so battered during the long river trip that two replacements were necessary.

Citrus fruits will be on display in all their glory, and in no place in the United States can as great a variety of native grown citrus fruits be displayed as in rich Central Florida.

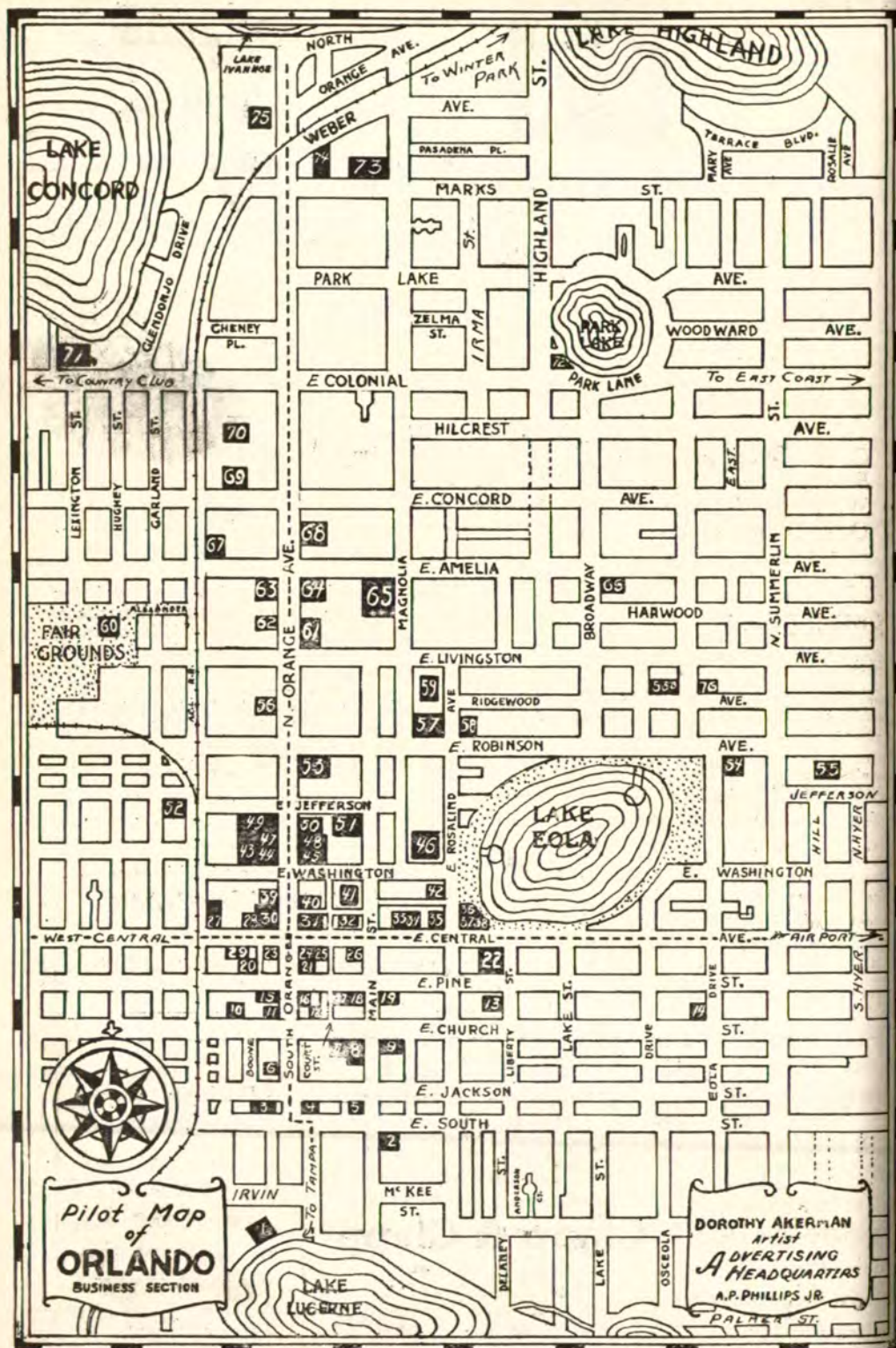
