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

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Open Ed and OER Definitions

SPARC

Open Education encompasses resources, tools and practices that are free of legal, financial and technical barriers and can be fully used, shared and adapted in the digital environment. Open Education maximizes the power of the Internet to make education more affordable, accessible and effective. https://sparcopen.org/open-education

UNESCO

Open Educational Resources (OER) are learning, teaching and research materials in any format and medium that reside in the public domain or are under copyright that have been released under an open license, that permit no-cost access, re-use, re-purpose, adaptation and redistribution by others. https://www.unesco.org/en/open-educational-resources



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Libraries & OER

Why Libraries & Librarians?

- Libraries are well-positioned to support OERs.
 - Alignment of values & skill-sets
- Libraries have been at the forefront of open movements.
 - Open access broadly
 - Active participants in the creation & maintenance of OER initiatives (MERLOT, OpenOregon, Open Education Network, local institutional repositories & more)
 - Increase in OER or textbook affordability specific positions




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UCF Libraries & OER

Timeline Highlights:

- 2015 Informal working group (librarians & instructional designers)
- 2016 First OER: <u>Anthology of Medieval Literature</u>
- 2018 <u>Affordable Instructional Materials Initiative (AIM)</u> formation to include First Day, OER, Library-sourced materials, and Affordability Counts.
- 2019 Hired first textbook affordability librarian
- **Today** is a collaboration among instructional designers, the textbook affordability librarian, specialized librarians, and others from the AIM Initiative.

Getting Started:

- Share freely available educational materials.
- Host in-house workshops or learning days.
- Participate in orientations or events on campus.
- Invite external experts to host sessions.
- Create online events with a broader audience.

Cultivating in the Future...


OER education/support in the tenure and promotion process.

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Select and organize high-quality OER materials

Getting Started:

- Utilize dedicated OER repositories & collections.
- Explore institutional repositories or open book platforms.
- Develop searches based on needs (textbooks & other materials).
- Create guides or lists of OER materials and/or OER matching courses & areas.
- Review copyright & licensing considerations.

Consider accessibility needs & provide information & recommendations


Getting Started:

- Utilize accessibility toolkits for OER.
- Consult with Student Accessibility Services and Digital Accessibility Teams.



Curating in the Future...

 Utilize more advanced technologies to find, store, and make OERs interoperable across platforms.



Offer expertise and guidance on using & creating OER

Getting Started:

- Some institutions can only provide consultation support versus full-scale OER creation.
- Leverage the expertise of many different types of librarians.
- Highlight the expertise of campus partners (e.g. instructional designers, Office of General Counsel) & synergies of campus partnerships.
- Connect to experts, colleagues & listservs.

Examples:

- Digitial Initiatives / Strategies Librarians
- Institutional Repository Librarians
- OER Librarians
- Scholarly Communication Librarians
- Subject librarians
- Technical Services Librarians
- Textbook Affordability Librarians

Develop guides and website information to highlight expertise


Getting Started:

- o Refer to existing resources, including statutes & other legislation.
- Provide information about librarian expertise, including discipline specific or functional experts.
- o Provide resources & recommendations for accessibility.
- Provide resources & recommendations for copyright & licensing.



Consulting in the Future...

 Utilize technologies and tools, like generative AI, to develop GPT chatbots to answer consultlevel questions.



Partner on OER adoption or authoring projects

Getting Started

- What is your project? Adoption? Authorship?
- Consider available time and collaborators.
- Agree on responsibilities, possibly with an informal memo or formal MOU.
- Find a toolkit or template for projects.
- Develop communication and project management standards for ongoing work.




Collaborating in the Future...

- Consider utilizing generative AI on using & creating OER.
 - Remain aware of ongoing legal or ethical considerations.

Examples:

- Creating outlines
- Creating test bank questions
- Make revisions & changes to an existing text
- Developing videos, audio, or other types of media
- Creating more adaptive and interactive content



Advocating for OER adoption and integration into systems

Getting Started:

- Share and highlight success stories.
- Think beyond textbook savings.
- Develop awards and recognition programs.
- Advocate for policy changes.



Championing in the Future...

 Partner with interdisciplinary researchers to study the impact of OER beyond current gaps and limitations.
