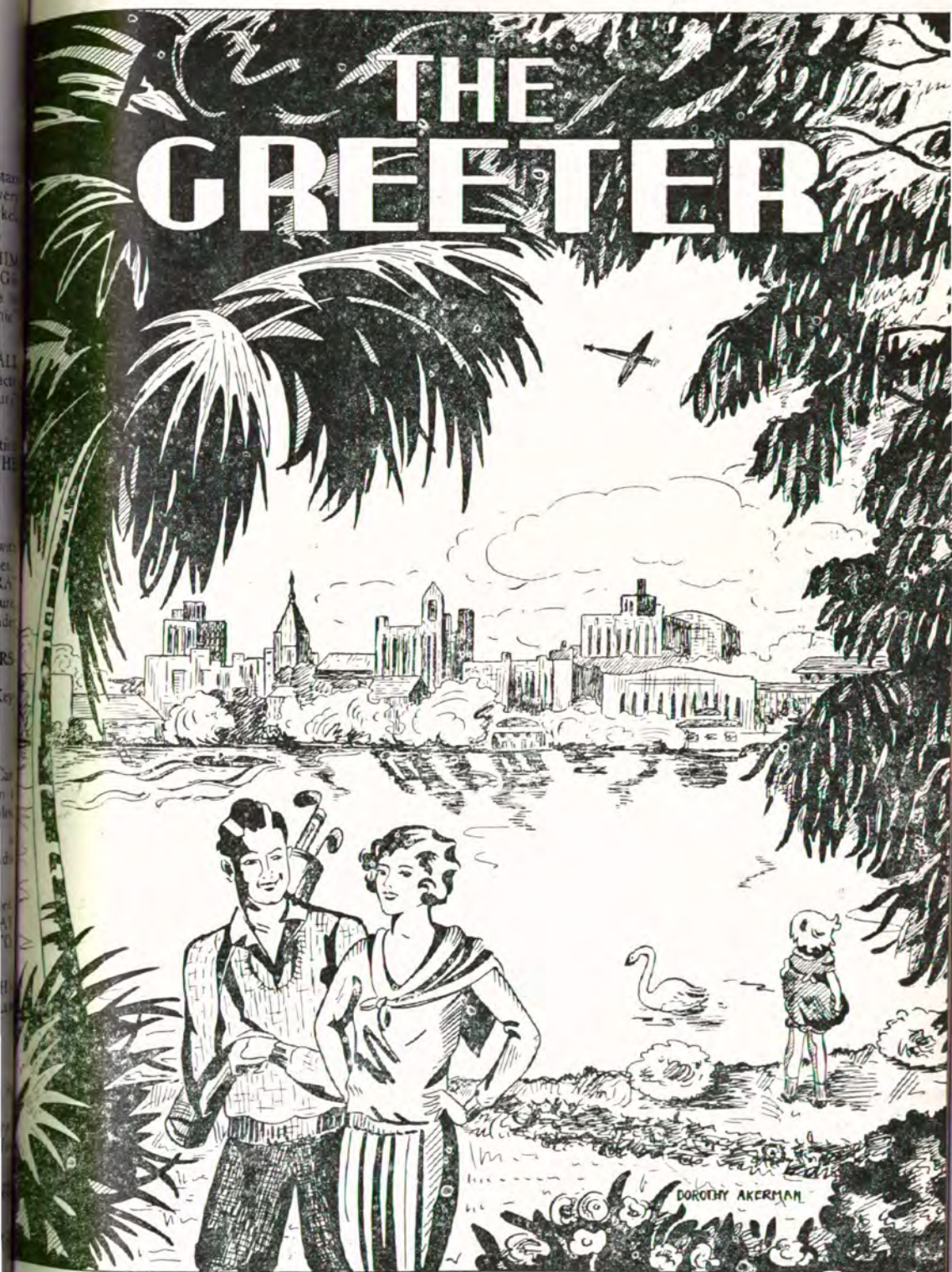

The largest planting by the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries according to report, last year, was of loch leven trout, 23,143,000 in fish and eggs.

New Jersey anglers estimate that there will be approximately 500,000 adult trout in the streams of that state during the season which opens on April 15, though 10,000 less trout will be planted this year than last.
