Spencer Mosher, who writes interesting fishing items for the Orlando Sentinel, wrote me the following letter from Maitland a year or so ago.

"Dear Editor:

I'm sure a lot of anglers are ready and willing to raise up and protest against the way too many stores sell fishing tackle. . . . like so much bread and flour. . . . (Stop and remember, you fellows.) Personally I have been to a dozen places lately to buy tackle only to encounter the most depressing surroundings imaginable. . . . plugs and flies are stored away with hinges and screw-drivers and rods hung up like shovels. What has gotten into the fishing tackle dealers? Is it the depression? Do they make no allowance for the romantic appeal of fishing? A dentist about to extract a tooth is far more cheerful than these gentlemen upon greeting a customer.

Picking up a spinner he'd say: "Boys, on a bait like this last Sunday I hooked one of the biggest muskies I ever hung in these waters. . . . it was in a lake two miles north of here. . . . he got away and I'll wager he is there yet. And say, maybe the small-mouth bass up my way weren't striking last evening!" . . . And so on for half an hour. . . . a pleasant half-hour And down in South Florida there's a dyed-in-the-wool fisherman who sells tackle and sees only poetry in every plug he offers to sell you, while he simply raves over his quality rods and reels. . . . Believe me, he does some business! There are two dealers in Orlando who are pleasant as Ike Walton himself and they are getting the trade—my trade at least.

Beware the clerk with the downcast look and ever present scowl. Fellows who never handled a rod except the wrong end, and a reel would skin their knuckles. . . . (It ought to!) Picking up a well known reel they remark, with about the same enthusiasm you'd expect from a can of salmon: "Now, sir, here is just what you are looking for and "we guarantee it." —Blah! The only click their ears are attuned to hear is the click of the cash register. I could shoot any of these idiots cheerfully.

Fishing is too fine a sport to longer stand such treatment and I protest against the selling of bass plugs, flies, graceful rods and fine reels as though they were so much canned tomatoes. How many of you fishermen are with me?
