\$100,000.00 for a fishing rod! Don't get excited, I didn't pay it. That is what it cost Charley Heddon to perfect and produce a new type of steel bait casting rod—that and two years of experiment in order to get a steel rod light as bamboo and with an indefinite guarantee against breakage. It seems all the tackle manufacturers have gone steel-minded. Rod makers are out to decide for all time the question of supremacy of steel over bamboo. That's certainly a tough break for the Japs and the Chinks. At the critical moment when China and Japan were trying to sell enough bamboo to finance their war, vying with each other in price cutting in order to buy more planes and machine guns to capture or hold Manchuria, along comes a steel rod that threatens to put the well-known kibosh on the expensive bamboos. It sure is a tough break for the laundrymen and the Japs.

The dry fly man is not necessarily a fool merely because he may try the floating fly at the beginning of the trout season. A number of underwater lures fall under the general heading of wet flies. In larger waters the bucktails are particularly effective for large trout.

For early season casting, when bass are up in shallow waters, surface plugs or semi-surface lures yield the best results. Reel them in slowly. Cork-bodied bass plugs are also very good at this time.

Wisconsin made thirty-two arrests for violation of fishing laws in January with fines ranging up to \$50, and imprisonments up to sixty days.
