## fishing

Northern waters now in the spot light are attracting the fishermen and soon the usual seasonal tales of trout and tarpon will appear in the newspapers and periodicals.

In Florida Venice, Sarasota, Boca Grande and Fort Myers are crowded with tarpon fishermen and the tarpon run this season has been the greatest in years, although few large fish have been landed to date. The record catch at Boca Grande was made last week by Dr. L. E. Burch of Nashville, Tenn., who brought a 192 pounder to gaff. Frank Ferst of Atlanta, Ga., brought in three big ones weighing 102, 103 and 137 pounds respectively, while Miss E. Miibank of New York landed four, the largest 115 pounds. The total catch in a single day was 80 tarpon over a 24 hour period.

The National Amateur Fishing Association, sponsored by a group of New York sportsmen and headed by Zane Grey of California, has been launched with headquarters at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York City. The organizations booklet, registration blanks and all data pertaining to membership will be sent to anglers anywhere on request. Florida sportsmen are urged to get in touch with this association as it affords splendid awards for record catches in the way of buttons, cups etc. All inquiries should be addressed to Mr. Robert Lathrop Bacon, Regional Director, Waldorf-Astoria, New York, N. Y.

The L & N Railway is again stressing the fine fishing along the gulf coast in the vicinity of Pensacola. Florida fishermen will find every variety of salt water fishing in this section of the state and excellent accommodations at the San Carlos hotel in Pensacola. There is also good bass fishing at the famous Dead Lakes and at numerous inland lakes in the vicinity of Panama City where a number of fishing camps are well located.

Y., has prepared a very interesting catalog illustrating some of the specimens mounted by this master taxidermist who boasts that he will mount anything from an "insect to an elephant." Those interested in the art of taxidermy should send for a copy of Mr. Hoffman's booklet with its hundreds of items of interest to amateur or professional taxidermists. A post card will bring you a copy and acquaint you with new ideas when you wish to preserve that record fish that you expect to land this season.
