CARRYING ON

The hardest thing in the world to do

If some of the local tackle dealers would
go fishin' instead of crabbin', and get right
with the world they might be able to move
lures that are fast becoming fly-specked in
their display windows.

It took a group of Northern anglers to
discover that the real game fish along the
Gulf Coast is the succulent pompano. This
fish, so highly prized by epicures, was rare-
ly taken on a hook and line until some fel-
lows from the North discovered the modus
operandi of enticing them from the surf
with live sand fleas.

After learning to catch sand fleas the
process of taking the pompano seems sim-
ple. These small crabs wash up with each
wave and immediately burrow into the
loose sand. Most of the Florida surf fish
come very close to the shore to feed, es-
pecially the pompano, and they are easily
caught with this bait. Small hooks, num-
ber one-naught, must be used and the sand
flea tied on with thread. In the vicinity of
Pensacola and Panama City this type of
salt water fishing is now all the rage and
hundreds of pompano are caught daily. Try
it at Canaveral and Sebastian.
