At our Session; it was Given forth y<sup>t</sup> ye Magistrates  
would send for ye unto Sessions. but now I have little  
or nothing of y<sup>t</sup>. my deare Lov seluts J<sup>n</sup> Yarwood  
desyreth of both thow & her to keepe unto youre mos-  
ure or Gift of god Given ye, y<sup>t</sup> ye harts & mynds  
may be stayed therewithout wavering for unless I  
continually wach be there will Cheepe in y<sup>t</sup> wch  
will hinder ye work; And Phineas, keepe thow  
Judgement; If thow prosper in gods Holy Truth  
Judgement must thow know. thundersings & Earth-  
quakes & gret troubbles such as thow never know yet,  
O Judgement is pressious Lov it never desyre to be  
feeld from it. for ye y<sup>t</sup> flyse Judgement flyse  
from Gods Mercies for his Judgements are Mer-  
cies; And Lion I redeemed thorrow Judgement; there  
is noe way else to Lyfe but thorrow death: soe yeeld
