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PERCENTAGE LEASES

"The percentage lease" has solved one of the vexing problems of merchandising for both landlords and tenants. Both have been benefited thereby in obtaining a fair basis of returns for this new form of partnership. Less moving and inability to pay high rents when business was slack have decreased the hazards for both.

This depression born partnership between landlord and tenant is the inevitable result of shrinkage in dollar volume, in selling prices, reduced mark-ups and smaller profits if any, which have wrecked many retailers and forced others to move to less expensive and desirable locations.

Landlords have thus found themselves with empty stores on their hands which produced no income while still necessitating upkeep, interest on investment and taxes. The "percentage lease" is the natural and almost inevitable answer to this double problem and it is gaining rapid popularity as a practical solution to a vexing situation.

The tenants potential sales volume, the average annual turnover for the line and the customary mark-up taken are the chief factors for determining a satisfactory % lease for both parties. The landlord sometimes requires a minimum guarantee, which if not earned by the business must simply be made up by the tenant.

Real estate owners, brokers, agents, etc., will have to familiarize themselves more fully with business fundamentals under this new plan, all

STATE DIAMONDBALL TOURNAMENT

The big event of the year in Diamondball will get under way Wednesday night of this week when the North District Playoff in the State Championship will start at Exposition Park.

Two teams from Orlando, two from Jacksonville, one from Winter Park, one from Daytona Beach, one or two from St. Augustine and one from New Smyrna as well as several others from this section of the State will be entered in this tournament and the winner will qualify for the semi-finals in the State playoff.

Every game in this tournament promises to be a real battle as only the champions of the cities and the runner-ups will be entered.

The Jacksonville teams will be outstanding competitors outside of Orlando as the Florida Motor Lines defeated the Poinsettia and Sentinel-Star a week ago Saturday.

The Poinsettia club who won the first half championship in Orlando will be one of the teams to represent us in the State play-off while either Datson Dairies or the Sentinel-Star will be the other team. Both teams will be strengthened with the addition of some players from the other two class A teams.

Games will be played Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday and the tournament will be

an elimination affair.

In order to give the class A teams a rest before the tournament starts the games scheduled for Tuesday night have been moved up to Monday and in case the tie between Datson and Sentinel-Star for the leadership of the A league is still in effect the winner between Datson and Sentinel in the game Monday will be the other representative for Orlando in the State play-off.

The schedule for Monday night will be Jackson Sport Shop vs Poinsettia at 7:45 and Datson Dairies vs Sentinel-Star at 9:00.

In order to arrange the schedule this way the Civic Club games have been changed to Tuesday night of this week with the University Club playing the Jaycees in the first game and the American Legion playing the Exchange Club at 9:00.

The tournament also makes a change in the class B league the games scheduled in the Wednesday Commercial League have been moved to Tuesday night and will be played on the No. 2 diamond.

In the Commercial league the Florida Public Service plays Dr. Phillips at 7:30 and the Orlando Ice Delivery play the U. S. Post Office at 9:00.

The other class B games for the week have been postponed as the No. 2 diamond will be used for the out of town teams to warm up during the District Tournament.
