I. Course Description and Overview

Students will develop their understanding of leadership as well as documentation of skills and learning across multiple contexts, within and beyond the classroom. Through the creation of an e-portfolio, students will reflect on their academic and co-curricular experiences in leadership to develop confidence in their skill set and readiness for their post-graduation goals.

Students are required to complete a **minimum of 15 hours of community service with one chosen organization** in addition to completing assignments and participating in the U-LEAD Social Change Showcase. Service agency matching can be done through Volunteer UCF or via your instructor if you do not already have an agency in mind. **Only non-profit organizations will be considered. You must volunteer with the same nonprofit organization for the 15 hours of community service.** Credit will not be given for paid positions, regardless of the organization. You must obtain instructor approval for your service-learning experience.

II. Student Learning Outcomes

Students who complete this program will be able to:

- **LEARN:** Explore leadership topics and identify personal areas of growth related to their leadership style while discussing the Social Change Model and how to make an impact in their communities. Students will develop personal, professional, and leadership perspectives and values.
- **LEAD:** Develop basic leadership skills and establish a strong leadership foundation that can be passed on to other students. Students will analyze the components of leadership and how to apply them in student or professional organizations.

• **SERVE:** Provide student leaders with opportunities to serve their community while reflecting on how their leadership experiences have contributed to the development of their character and awareness of self. Students will be involved in service-learning opportunities that support the importance of community values and the promotion of the UCF Creed.

III. Knights of Distinction: Leadership E-portfolio Program Competencies

As a result of participating in this program, students will be expected to demonstrate competence in their ability to:

Personal Leadership Development

- Reflect critically and deeply on themselves as a leader in the community.
- Connect the student's leadership roles to their future, goals, and/or other experiences.
- Showcase and reflect on artifacts included in the student's e-portfolio that relate to their relevant leadership experience(s).

Analytical & Critical Thinking

• Demonstrate thinking strategically about experiences engaged in throughout the student's college career thus far and how these experiences have been shaped by and/or impact their leadership development.

- Analyze how the student's leadership skills have been adapted in different contexts.
- Create a narrative of personal and professional goals and think critically about the steps that can be taken to reach these goals.

Leadership Development

- Express their personal values, passions, and individual style of leadership.
- Demonstrate the ability to engage in conversations and respect diverse perspectives.

Required Course Materials

The materials for this course are built into the individual modules. Students are not required to buy any materials for the course. Any supplemental materials required by the instructor will be provided to the students free of charge.

IV. Course Requirements

Student Introduction Discussion Post (required first week activity) (10 pts.): Students will introduce themselves to their classmates in a Webcourses discussion forum during the first week of class. This required activity must be completed by Friday, August 25 at 5:00pm to document your academic activity. Failure to do so may result in a delay in the disbursement of your financial aid.

Two Student Introduction Replies (10 pts): Students will reply to two peer posts. The responses will demonstrate active listening and contribute positively to the discussion.

Verification of Service Hours (150 pts): Your 15 hours of service must be documented to pass this class. <u>Students must volunteer at the same service site for all 15 required hours of service.</u> Seven (7) hours will be submitted by mid-term and eight (8) by the final week of class. Please use the <u>LEAD Service Verification Form</u> and upload it to the U-LEAD portal to document your hours. Your service site supervisor must sign this form, or you must attach a separate agency verification form with the supervisor's signature to the verification form in lieu of a signature. Service Hours will be submitted to the U-LEAD Portal at <u>https://ulead.sdes.ucf.edu/students</u> by **December 1, 2023 at 11:59pm**.

Knights of Distinction: Leadership e-Portfolio Pre- and Post-Tests (40 pts): Students are required to take a pre- and post-quiz in which they will assess their level of understanding of the Knights of Distinction: Leadership ePortfolio Competencies listed above. Each assessment quiz is worth 20 points.

Two (2) Impact Events: Students must submit two completed <u>Impact Event Forms</u> after attending approved Impact Events. Impact Events can be educational workshops, presentations, and more. For approved events, please refer to the calendar at <u>https://lead.sdes.ucf.edu/home/calendar</u>. Impact Event Forms will be submitted to the U-LEAD Portal at <u>https://ulead.sdes.ucf.edu/students</u> by **December 1, 2023 at 11:59pm**.

Personal Statement (55 pts):

Think about your Personal Statement as a cover letter for a job or a personal essay for your graduate school application. You will write a personal narrative (350-500 words) in which you introduce yourself to your reader. In other words, it's your chance to make a great first impression! This personal statement should be geared toward your target audience and synthesize all your experiences and that envisions how you will build on these experiences in the future. You may want to make an appointment to review your personal statement at the <u>University</u> <u>Writing Center</u> if you need assistance with your writing.

E-portfolio Project (385 pts)

Students will complete an e-portfolio that documents and showcases their work and accomplishments in leadership and beyond. The e-portfolio guidelines will be available in the assignment's module and rubric. The first submission is worth 185 points, and the final submission is worth 200 points. Your e-portfolio will be presented at the U-LEAD Social Change Showcase.

Milestone Reflections (90 pts/30 pts each):

Students will complete a total of three 350 to 500-word reflection papers for the five milestones in Knights of Distinction at the end of the semester. This assignment is an opportunity for students to think back on their service, leadership, academics, and co-curricular experiences and the impact that they have made on the community they served as well as the skills they have developed as a result. The reflection guidelines will be available in the assignments' module and rubric.

E-Portfolio Artifact Submissions (100 pts/20 pts each):

Students will submit a minimum of five artifacts that can be incorporated into their ePortfolio. Artifacts demonstrate the student's experiences, skills, knowledge, and qualifications to build a visual and textual representation of how their experiences have helped them develop transferable skills. Of these artifacts, at least one artifact must demonstrate experience in a leadership role or activity. Artifacts should be meaningful, and some examples of artifacts include images, videos, presentations, research projects, blogs, and capstone projects, but are not limited to those listed.

U-LEAD Social Change Showcase Participation (150 pts.)

Students will be required to create an e-portfolio. The student's e-portfolio should showcase their work and accomplishments and provide relevant information surrounding analytical and critical thinking of their leadership development. E-portfolios will be judged based on creativity, the overview of their leadership experiences, and the strength of their artifacts and reflections. You will be required to present your e-portfolio at the Social Change Showcase on **Tuesday**, **November 7, 2023**. You are expected to stay for the duration of the event and should let your instructor know if you are unable to attend the showcase.
