CROONING HARD COLBERT FINDS, CALLS FOR HELP

Claudette Colbert has discovered the difficulties of crooning.

Paramount's popular star, in "Torch Singer" playing at the Beacham Theatre Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, has found that it takes lots and lots of experience to modulate a singing voice to the microphone.

Accordingly an old hand at the art, Bing Crosby, was called in as technical adviser for a day during the filming of several of the radio sequences in the picture.
