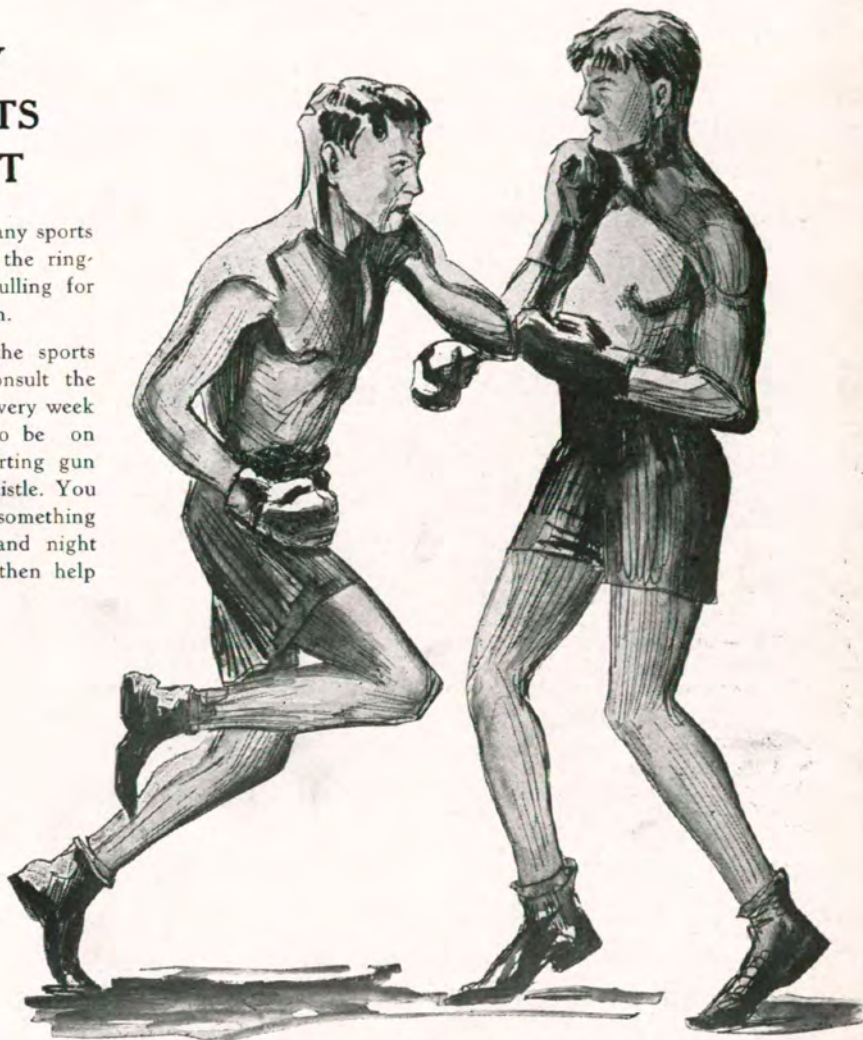

Rollins, battered after their hard game at Newberry Friday, will be forced to show a lot of class in order to set back the Teachers. The kickoff comes at **8:30 p. m.**

Rollins College debaters will stage their first public debate of the season Monday night, October 30, in the Annie Russell Theatre where a question of international interest will be argued with a team representing Cambridge University in England. The Rollins debate is announced as the first for the British students on their American tour.

Cambridge, which will be represented by **Alastair Sharp** and **Michael Barkway**, will uphold the affirmative side of the proposition "That the League of Nations is the only secure guarantee of world peace." **Bernard R. Dralove** and **Maurice C. Dreicer** will speak for Rollins. The debate is announced for **8:15**.
