Orlando's Own Astronaut To Be Graduation Speaker

Astronaut John W. Young will be commencement speaker for the June 14 graduation of FTU's charter class, President Charles N. Millican's office announced this week.

President Millican said that he is "delighted" with Young's acceptance. "John Young epitomizes the philosophy we stress to our students," Millican said. "His professional and personal outlook shows a dedication to duty, and an appreciation of the good things in life, that set apart the man capable of sharing with others."

Young, an Orlandoan who has literally "reached for the stars," was born in San Francisco, but moved here with his parents, who are still here, when he was two years old. He graduated from the old Orlando High School with the highest senior honor, the Guernsey Good Citizenship Cup.

He received a Bachelor of Science degree in Aeronautical Engineering from Georgia Tech and an Honorary Doctorate of Law degree from the Western State University College of Law.

After graduation from Georgia Tech, Young served in the United States Navy flight training program, where he became program manager in the Navy's F4H (Phantom) jet project. From there he applied for the second team of astronauts to be chosen by NASA.

Young's NASA experience has been extensive—he was in the first manned Gemini flight - Gemini 3, he served as backup pilot for Gemini 6, he was command pilot for Gemini 10; and he was assigned as the backup command module pilot for Apollo VII. With Thomas P. Stafford and Eugene A. Cernan, he was command module pilot for Apollo X, the first comprehensive lunar-orbital qualification and verification flight test of an Apollo

lunar module. Besides demonstrating that man could navigate safely and accurately in the moon's gravitational fields, Apollo X photographed and mapped tentative landing sites for future missions. Young was also assigned as backup spacecraft commander for Apollo XIII.

The late "Gus" Grissom said of John Young, "The way he walks you would expect him to be holding onto a couple of plow handles instead of a control stick. But he's sharp. He often gets impatient with the progress we're making. He also has a fine sense of humor. He knows how to ease the strain." Other associates have said that Young has "a keenly analytical mind."

Young has spoken to various groups, including the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, the Society of Experimental Test Pilots, and Toastmasters International.

Alumni Association To Form at Tech

Plans are now being formulated to organize FTU's Charter Alumni Association.

The association will be created to serve Tech's first graduating class of seniors and others that will follow.

An organizational meeting has been scheduled May 21 at 11 a.m. in the Science Auditorium. At that time, FTU President Dr. Charles Millican and FTU Foundation Administrator George King, Jr. plan to speak to interested seniors about the advantages of an alumni association. Registration cards will be passed out during the meeting, and those who join will be given membership cards at graduation time next month.

The idea for an Alumni Association has been a joint venture of students, student government and the office of Student Affairs.

One of the first steps of organization will be the formation of an Advisory Board for the association. Board membership will be comprised mainly of graduating seniors.

The association does not plan to solicit dues from students joining the organization.

According to Student Affairs Vice President W. Rex Brown, the association is designed to:

- Provide former students with an organization with which each student can be involved and maintain personal relationships with the university.
- Create a pool of interested former students from which information and volunteer leaders can be drawn.
- Assist in serving the university with a degree of objectivity without being formally involved with the management or administrative functions.
- Provide an organization for honoring individuals who have performed outstanding services to the university.

"This will be an alumni organization, not merely another function of the university," Dr. Brown emphasized. "We hope the association will be an active force for the betterment of the university, and that the university, in turn, may be able to maintain a closer relationship with its graduates through the organization."



Someone called a secretary in the College of Education Thursday morning before 8:30 a.m. and said a bomb had been planted somewhere in the General Classroom Building and was set to go off. Jones Says Job Vacant, Faces Ballot Problem

Will Jones, an FTU student and a member of the Black Students Union this week declared himself a candidate for president, not of Student Government, but President of the university.

Jones told the FuTure he was perfectly serious about his candidacy for the position of university president, although he admitted he wasn't sure how official the challenge to Dr. Charles Millican would be.

"I'm trying to get a place on the ballot," he said Monday. Jones said he did not have the official backing of the BSU, but "a number of the members, and as well as some other students have said they would support me."

Why had he decided to run for the top spot at FTU?

"Past events have re-enforced my thinking," Jones said. He added that he was "not ready to reveal my platform".

Did he feel qualified to be president of a state university?

"I think qualifications such as having a doctorate are overrated. Who is to say who is qualified to do the best job for FTU?"

What did Jones feel were the duties and problems of the president's office?

"Did President Nixon know what

the problems of being president were until he became president? I would face the problems and make decisions on solving them when I got into office," Jones said.

"A lot of people have been telling me that I was not serious about this," the self-proclaimed presidential candidate said. "But I'm perfectly serious."

Jones has prepared some copies of a declaration of his intentions to run for university president which he hopes to distribute. In the statement Jones says that in his opinion, the office of FTU president is vacant and up for grabs.

In an statement, issued by Jones later in the week, he said, "The university today has a responsibility to its students and an equally important responsibility to society. When a university refuses to take a stand on issues which effect society and abhorrently punishes those individuals who take the stand which the university itself

The group went ahead and spent nearly \$200, only to find that SG wasn't going to reimburse the money. The FTU Art Department had stated that it would take the car and later decided not to. And now the planners are unable to foot the bill of towing away the car.

We suggest that SG stick to its promise and take the car where it belongs: the junkyard.

Memorial Services Held For Dead Kent Students

Student Government President Walt Komanski, during last Friday's Memorial Service, presented to the students of FTU a petition expressing FTU's concern over the deaths of the four students of Kent State University. As the third speaker for memorial, Komanski stated that the four students at Kent State "have joined the silent majority." He then proceeded to read the petition, copies of which he said would be sent to Governor Claude Kirk, Jr., to the Florida Legislature, to President Richard M. Nixon, to the President of Kent State, and to President Charles N. Millican of FTU. The main points of the petition are summarized as follows:

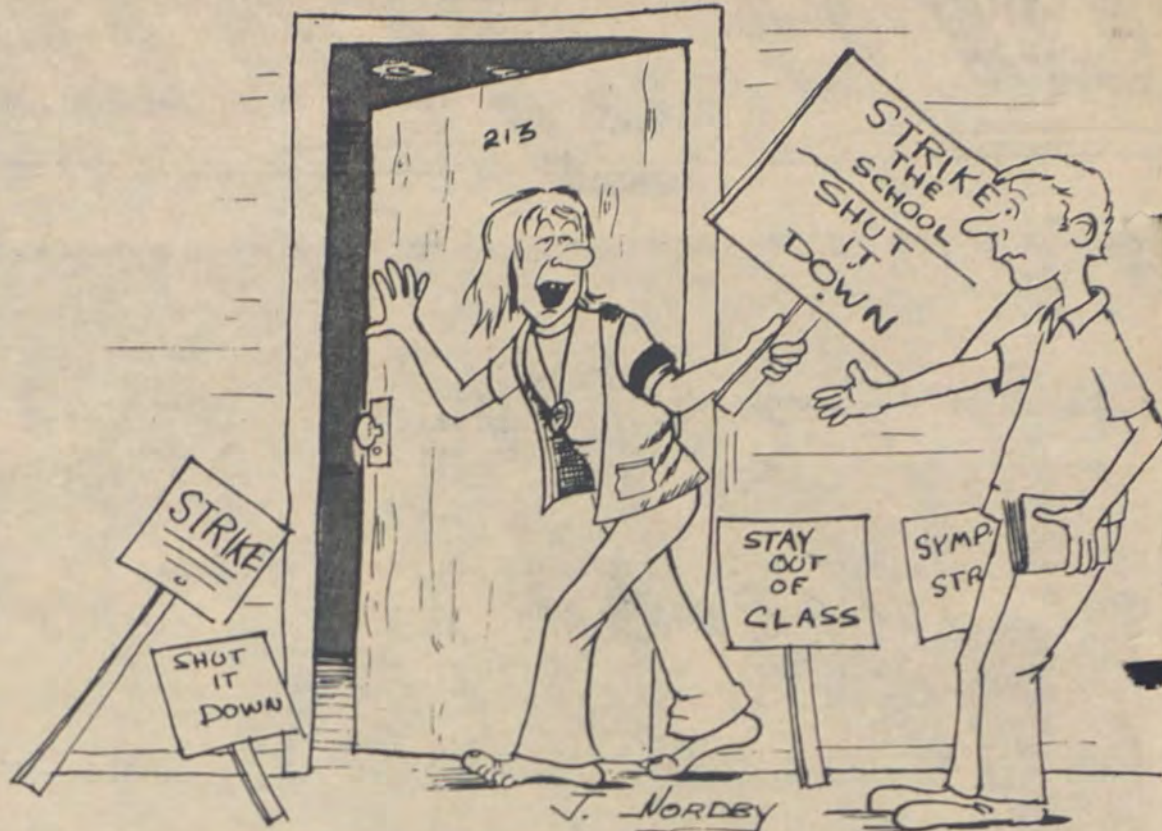
1. The students of FTU express their sorrow for the unnecessary deaths of the four Kent State students;
2. The students of FTU extend their sympathy to the family and friends of the dead students;
3. Although violence must be suppressed, the students of FTU feel that these deaths were unnecessary;
4. The students of FTU insist that steps be taken so that such an incident will not occur again; and
5. The students of FTU demand a full investigation to ascertain the guilt or innocence of those involved in the Kent State shootings. The petition is available for signatures in the main lobby of the library building all this week.

Other highlights of Komanski's speech included a reference to the box erected in front of the Library Building for the collection of money for National Guard ammunition, an action which he termed "abhorrent and unforgivable" because the money was being collected "for the killing of students." Komanski termed the incident at Kent State a "tragic mistake" and cited the uncooperativeness of the state

legislators whom he had encountered. He said that he had been told that to get anything from a legislator he would have to come begging for supplication. In a short review of the history of student demonstrations and protests, Komanski read from the Declaration of Independence and spoke of John Locke's ideas, upon which several points in the Declaration were based. Near the conclusion of his speech, he cited the figures for the expenditures in the national budget to the military and to pollution control, with the former far outweighing the latter.

Black Student Union President Dan Sater introduced the other speakers, Reverend Miles McKey of the Unitarian Church, who gave an invocation, and Mr. George King, Executive Assistant to the President here at FTU, to a crowd of 100 to 200 students and faculty members. Reverend McKey's invocation called for a coming together and an involvement with humanity. He prayed that God "be with us here and our leaders throughout the nation." Mr. King said that he spoke for the administration, and that he and they were "saddened by the loss of any life, whether in Vietnam or on college campuses. He said that there seemed to be little differentiation between battlefields and campuses. He called for all to seek the truth, and together to "turn our differences from an obstacle to a stimulus."

Sater urged that the students become involved, and said of the four students at Kent State, "They went in the name of concern - of humanity."

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No Limit On Frosh Class

There will be no enrollment limitations on next fall's freshman class at Tech, FTU President Dr. Charles Millican said this week.

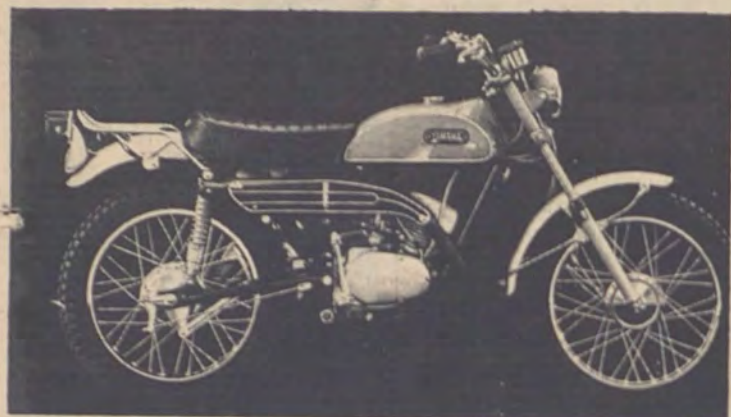
Dr. Millican's remarks came as a result of a widely published survey of the nation's colleges and universities which painted a gloomy picture of overcrowded fall enrollments in general and the woes of state universities in particular.

The survey, conducted by National Assn. of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, stated that FTU and several other state

institutions would be limiting the number of freshmen it would allow into classes in the Fall.

"It's just not true here," Dr. Millican asserted. He explained that the survey actually warned that when freshmen enrollments reached a dangerously high level, 2000 students in Florida's case, enrollment might have to be curtailed.

"But at FTU, we probably won't be facing that situation before 1979," the president said.



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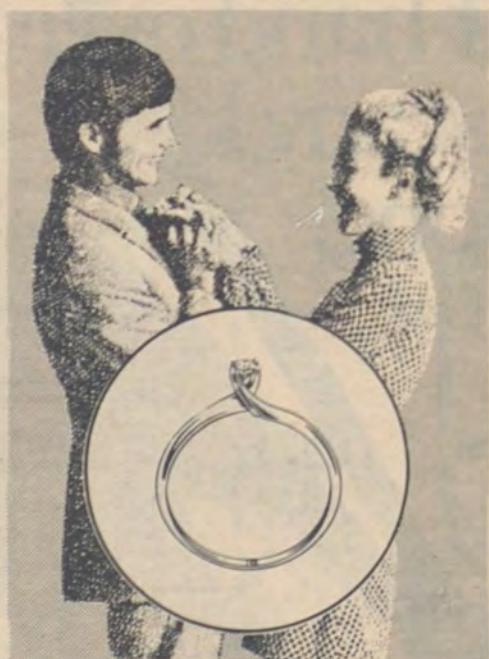

Peaceful Dissent Okay, Cramer Says

U.S. Representative William C. Cramer visited FTU last Friday to speak to a Public Administration class. The Florida congressman from the 8th district (Pinellas and Pasco Counties), urged students and faculty to take an active part in solving some of America's problems.

Cramer, 16 years in the House of Representatives, was known as "Mr. Republican" in the 1950's and early 1960's when he was the only Republican from Florida serving in the U.S. Congress. He is presently involved in a race to succeed Florida's Democratic senator, Spessard L. Holland, who is resigning. Cramer's opponent for the Republican primary is Judge Harold Carswell, recent nominee to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Cramer quickly became involved in a spirited debate with the students of the class, over such recent issues as American involvement in Cambodia, and his own race for the senatorial election.

Of the latter, he said, "I am running on my record as a Florida Congressman for 16 years and the things I have done for the Sunshine State as a whole." Concerning the Cambodia situation, Cramer said that he personally supported the actions of President Nixon. "He has all the facts, and I believe he is doing the right thing...at least, I hope he is," Cramer commented. As for dissent: "None of us—anytime—have the right to burn and bomb — to destroy — and to risk the physical safety of our fellow citizens." However, there was nothing wrong with peaceful dissent, he said.

Cramer also urged FTU students to get involved, to "help others get interested and get to the polls to vote their convictions." He concluded with a comment on the troubles between the young and their elders, saying, "There might be better and more frequent communication and dialogue."

Olga Rodriguez Is A Winner

Four members of the FTU Civinnettes attended the Florida District Civitan Convention in Miami, April 30-May 3. The girls were Janice Miller, President; Olga Rodriguez, V.P., Sheila Painter, Sec., and Marsha Ratterman, Chaplain. They stayed at the Sheraton-Four Ambassadors Hotel on Biscayne Bay.

While there the girls attended a series of social functions and meetings including one on effective leadership. Emphasis was placed on the responsibilities and duties of officers.

SG Offices In Doubt

Three Constitutional Amendments voted upon at last Thursday's Student Government meeting were all handled in different ways.

The Constitutional Amendment concerning changing the limitations of the Student Senate was postponed to a future meeting. Senator Mike O'Mara submitted this bill, Student Senate Bill 2-20.

After a meeting with Vice President Dr. W. Rex Brown, O'Mara learned that under no circumstances will this bill pass the office of Student Affairs if the following sentence is left in the bill: "If said legislation is not acted upon the Vice President of Student Affairs within three weeks after its passage by the Student Senate, it shall become law."

With this new knowledge, O'Mara tried to withdraw his bill, to no avail. The final decision of the Senate was to postpone the bill.

Student Senate Bill 2-21, the Constitutional Amendment for the reorganization of the executive did pass the senate. This bill removes the offices of corresponding secretary, recording secretary and treasurer, and replaces them by a Senate Clerk appointed by the student body president. Before this bill will become law it must be approved by President Walter Komanski and the Office of Student Affairs. Komanski stated, "I will not work without a treasurer or qualified person". With this statement and due to the fact that this bill will affect the voting for the Executive Offices, Komanski indicated he will take all of the ten school days allowed him before he must sign or reject this bill.

The Constitutional Amendment for the addition of Student Senate powers and duties, Bill 2-22, did pass the senate at Tuesday's meeting.

Santry's Platform For SG President

"All experience is an arch to build upon," said Frank Santry, candidate for Student Government president in summing up his campaign. The quote comes from John Adams and was his campaign slogan for the presidency of the United States.

Reworking the Student Judiciary system is at the top of Santry's slate. At this time, according to Santry, it is necessary for the SG president to nominate a student to the Board. Then the Senate and Student Affairs must approve the appointment. Also any finding of the Board or any proposed disciplinary action must be approved by university authorities. Santry would like to see SG have the authority to appoint Judiciary Board members without Student Affairs approval.

Speaking of the necessary qualifications for SG office, Santry said, "It is almost mandatory to have experience in the FTU Student Government. There are a large number of procedures that must be followed and officers must be familiar with them. Student Government has evolved into a sophistication that cannot afford the luxury of on-the-job training."

He would like to see the officers of the Governors of the Colleges and the Senators utilized more in the areas of curriculum committees in the various colleges.

In the area of commuter students, Santry hopes to initiate more activities to allow students to become aware of the organizations on campus. In addition he wants to exert influence to get more housing space available for potential resident students.

On the subject of Lake Claire, one of Santry's pet projects, he is and hopes to continue to exert influence through SG to various State Legislators in an attempt to get the Lake hearings further up on the State Road Department calendar. At the present time the Lake Claire project is tied up in the SRD due to the problem of drainage.

When everything is settled, "I want to get students involved because if they participate they will appreciate it more. I'd also like to

solicit community support in the form of donation of materials."

Santry is interested in an increase in the participation of Student Government on the drafting of the student handbook every year. At the present time, SG does have a part in the handbook, "but it should do more."

"Student Government has matured unbelievably this year and has established a working Senate that is educated in procedure and money handling. The committees within the Senate are well-organized now," Santry spoke of a "definite" problem last year in achieving a "workable rapport with the SG's of other colleges", but said

Will 'Get it Happening', Norton and Barnes Pledge

There are two students running for Student Government office who have no program and no platform, yet still believe they could be elected. Greg Norton, presidential candidate said "We just want to see things happen," and vice presidential candidate Pete Barnes, added "We're not going to start off with a set platform, but we're going to remain flexible. Let's just get in and see what's going on."

They do agree with the other SG candidates that Student Government needs to be given real acting power and removed from the situation of "possibly being shut down by a single word from the administration." It needs to be able to make final decisions, and not merely recommendations, says Norton.

Another related action is the, in effect, removal of "advisory" from such things as the Student Judicial Advisory Board. "Let's set up a system," says Norton, "where the Board's decisions are final, but a student can appeal to the administration if he thinks it's necessary."

The changes require "sweeping constitutional revision," according to Barnes, and the intent is to give students equal power with the administration. "The least government is the best government," commented Norton, "but when you have a domineering administration, the students should have equal power." Both candidates have come out in support of Will Jorjes, who is attempting to run for President of the University.

Norton is determined to bring students and SG closer, and fully intends to make himself available to students. "I'll see to it that I can be found when I'm needed...SG is for the students, and officers that students can't see are useless."

Whenever Norton and Barnes were asked for specific moves they

would not suggest such detailed action. "Let's get into office, and see what's happening, and then we'll handle problems as they come along."

The pair did talk about their views on controversial subjects, such as Norton on demonstrations: "Fine. I am a pacifist, however, and cannot condone violence. However, as long as they're peaceful, they should be allowed." About Kent State: "I definitely must come out against the National Guard, since I am non-violent. When I hear the argument that the National Guard was young and scared, then I say 'Children should not play with guns.'"

Norton is firmly against campaign promises. "Anybody can make those." He says, "Put me in office and then I'll do the best I can. I just want a chance to make things happen around here."

Barnes does have SG experience at Daytona Beach Junior College, where he was senator from the sophomore class and vice president of the sophomore class. He's 27, has done four years of military service, and this is the first year at FTU for the psychology major.

Norton, 22, has no previous student government experience, but laughingly commented,

"Considering FTU's current inactive SG, this is an asset and not a liability." He is Student Judicial Advisory Board Chairman and serves on the Advisory Committee to the President on Admissions and Standards. This is his second year at FTU, and he is a senior communications major.

When questioned about their election chances, Barnes grinned. "At least we offer a bit of variety to the students." Norton added with a laugh "At least maybe we'll encourage people to get out and vote against us." The pair went on

to seriously comment that they do expect a large percentage of the votes from students who want a change to somebody different, and to someone who is going to initiate action, and not just make promises.

The only real change the pair wants to make is the correction of the absence of activity. "Nobody really gets involved in anything out here," complained Barnes. "Let's get something, anything, happening," says Norton.

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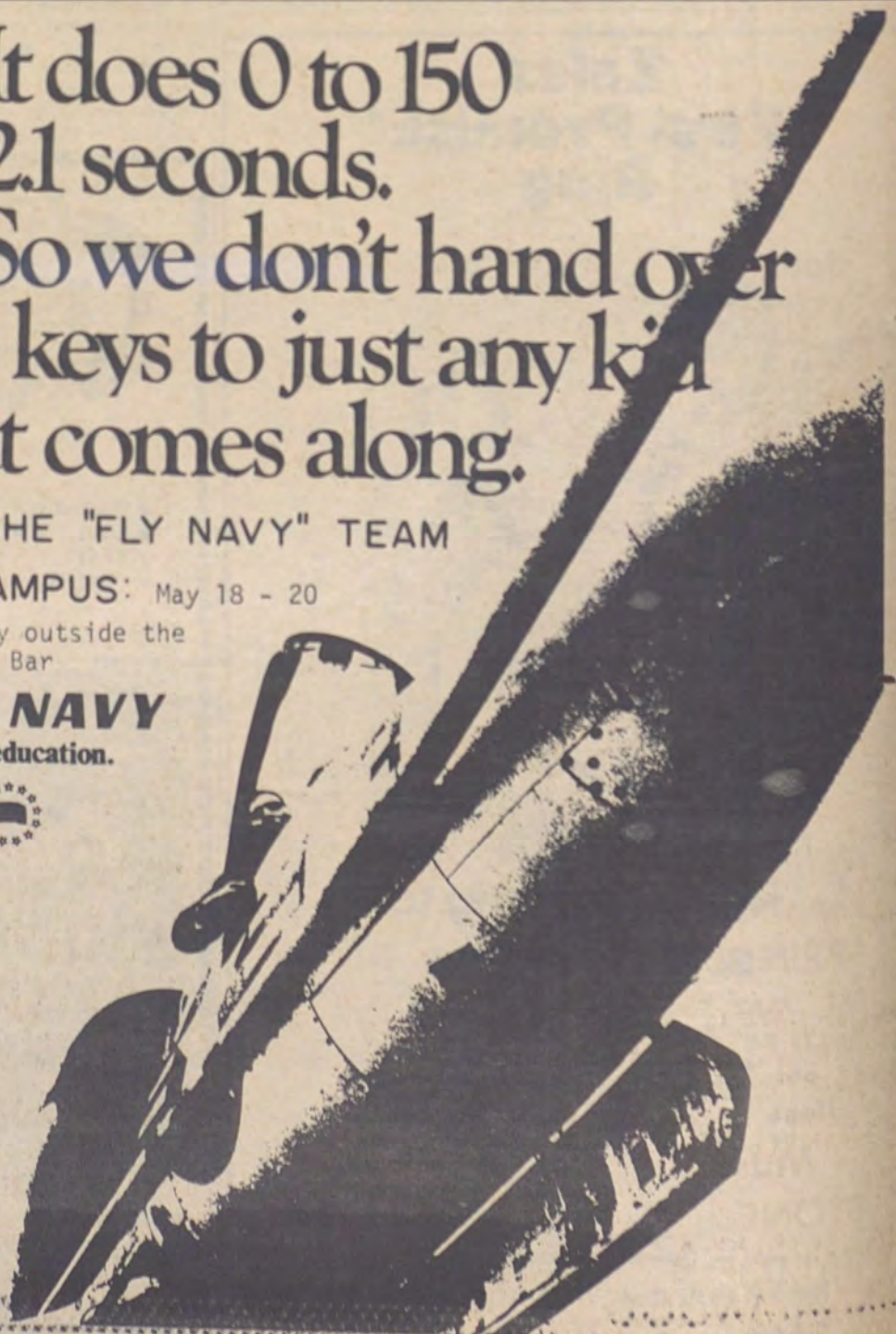

Flag Waver Has Job Suspended

Rumors continue to circulate at FTU about whether Melissa Lee, the student who was arrested last week for improper display of the flag, remains an FTU student or has dropped out of school.

When rumors first began to circulate that Miss Lee had dropped out, investigation brought forth the fact from the Dean of Women's office that she had filled out a withdrawal form and gave her reason as "change of employment." Further investigation showed that Miss Lee had been suspended from her job in the personnel office of FTU until resolution of the court action against her. Personnel Director J. Thomas Simmons, Jr., said that Miss Lee had carried out her duties in the office for more than a year in "a satisfactory manner," and she was suspended "pending clarification and resolution of legal actions brought against her while she was on campus involved in activities in which she was a principle participant." He emphasized that Miss Lee was not asked to resign, and that one reason for the suspension was the "critical nature" of the duties in the personnel office.

However, Miss Lee was then seen on campus Wednesday with her textbooks, and rumors were circulating that she was back in school. Calls to the Dean of Women's office, Admissions, and Student Affairs were fruitless, and no one seems to know Miss Lee's actual status at FTU. Miss Lee could not be reached for comment.

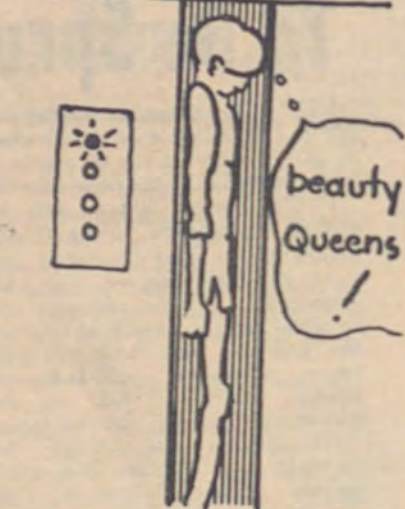
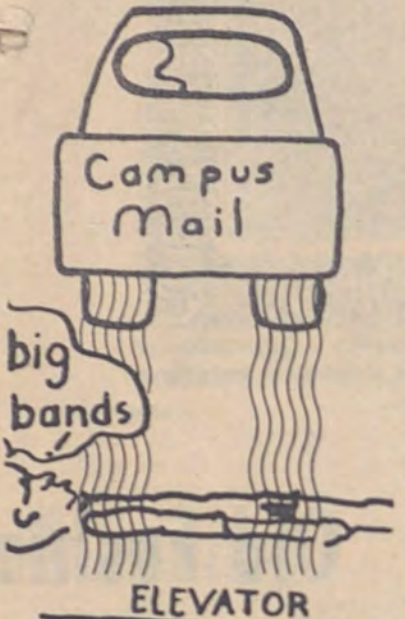

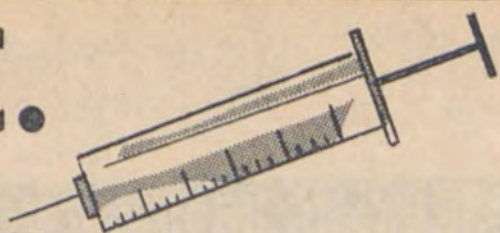

CC took a vacation last week to prepare for the Big Fla. Federation of Young Republicans convention held on the 8, 9, and 10th at the Robert Meyer. It's all over but the shouting now, with FTU's delegation playing an important part. The first race to be settled was the 5th District Chairman's Friday night. This district includes FTU as well as Orange County and several Brevard County and Volusia clubs. Steve Argalas, one of the founders of the FTU club, defeated Ron Thornton on a second ballot vote 25-12. Steve's election means an important role for FTU in the district this year.

Saturday morning saw the most important race of the convention: state federation chairman. The candidates were incumbent Dennis O'Grady and challenger Dr. Ric Porraro. There was much discussion over this contest within the FTU delegation and it was finally decided to pass on the first roll call. This was the case, and when the passes were repolled, FTU cast the 5 votes necessary to put O'Grady over the top. The other delegations quickly followed suit and Dr. Porraro called for a unanimous vote for O'Grady, to unify the federation.

Many people see this victory as a defeat of the Kirk-Gurney-Carswell forces by the Cramer forces since Porraro was supported by Gov. Kirk. It is CC's opinion that this was more of an indication of the federation's approval of O'Grady's administration rather than a rebuttal of Gov. Kirk. O'Grady's choice for national committeeman, "Sonny" Coane, defeated U of F's Stu Hershey, but the college division of the federation installed the Parraro supported Doug Killy slate, rather than O'Grady's choice. Evidently, then, the federation was concerned more with the proper man for the job than for the tactics of faction politics.

The college elections brought further honor to FTU. Paul Gougelman, current chairman of FTU YR's was unanimously elected without opposition to the state college treasurer's position. As a result of his election, Paul will be resigning his chairman's post, necessitating an election to fill that position. The candidates are Dennis Keeler and Bob McMillan. The election is to be held (at this writing) at the Thursday, May 14 meeting.

The convention provided an opportunity for delegates to meet and talk with many important state officials. This columnist talked briefly with Governor Kirk as well as Lt. Gov. Osborne. CC also met Senatorial candidate Harrold Carswell and spoke with new state senator Dave McLain. Presidential aide Harry Dent spoke at the Saturday banquet and other notables such as state legislators Bill James, Tom Slade, Lew Earles and Leonard Wood were present.

Florida Federation of Young Republicans is an important and influential group within the GOP especially in the area of election campaigns and FTU is already establishing itself in this organization. The number of convention delegates is determined by membership so the larger the club, the more powerful and influential. FTU is new enough to be free of domination by any faction of the party (as was proven at the convention) and any student body that applauds when lawbreaking demonstrators are arrested SHOULD have a strong interest and influence in this conservative, patriotic organization.

FTU YR's will hold a membership drive in the fall and students who oppose the flag defacing, shouting demonstrators and their techniques should take an active part in the organization which determines policy and CAN get things done — through the Florida GOP.

Sweet Sound of Good Music

Are there budding opera stars at FTU? Mrs. Virginia Sayre says it's a possibility, and she should know. She herself is a well-known opera star who teaches two days each week at FTU.

Mrs. Sayre, a mezzo-soprano (low soprano) launched her singing career on the West Coast and has since given recitals in ten states, appearing in Operas and Oratorios of the University of Southern California, the Riverside Opera Company, and at theaters in Redlands and Fresno as well as in Houston, Texas. She has also sung under Robert Wagner.

The last four years have appearances in Canada, Maine and Massachusetts at many colleges and with orchestras. She is married to Major George Sayre, Stratofortress Commander stationed at McCoy Air Force Base, and she usually performs in the area where her husband is stationed, so Florida can expect to see a great deal of this

well-known operatic singer.

She says she has some very promising students at FTU. They are "unusually ambitious" and could possibly have the talent to go with opera themselves, but whether they have the ambition is yet to be seen.

"Are they willing to be away from their families for nine months at a time? I can't tell about this," Mrs. Sayre questioned. She explained that opera singing is a very demanding profession and she, herself practices two hours a day, sometimes six when she is preparing for a role. "When a new role is assigned the voice does not fit it as perfectly as it should...some notes or passages are difficult and must be worked out over and over to become right."

Singers must also have a great deal of self-confidence. "If a singer says 'I can't make that note, I can't make that passage,' then he will not be able to make that note, that

passage," states the singer.

Mrs. Sayre has also performed in concerts as well as opera. However, she prefers opera because the performers "work as a team. Everyone is determined to do a good job. Everyone pulls together." She has sung roles in "Madame Butterfly," "The Pirates of Penzance," Handel's "Messiah," Beethoven's "Ninth Symphony" and many others. Her latest performance was in "Carmen" in

Cocoa last March, and she is not really planning another until this fall. "Two each year is enough."

Mrs. Sayre thinks Florida is a good state for opera. She would like to see an opera group organized in Orlando, and believes there are plenty of talented people living here. She would like also to have state-wide operas and musical performances presented to children as part of their educational program.

Scholarship Sports Not Seen in Future

FTU officials have decided that the university's athletic program will continue on without a scholarship recruitment system, the FuTUre learned this week.

But, it was also learned that plans have been approved to initiate a new "service awards" program for prospective, athletic-minded students in need of financial support.

FTU Athletic Director Dr. Frank Rohter denied that the "service awards" were grants-in-aid in disguise. Dr. Rohter also said the financial aid program was not the first step toward a university athletic scholarship system long in debate.

"We have no plans now to initiate a system of scholarship athletics," Dr. Rohter stated. "The service awards will be given to students on a basis of need."

The athletic director said that the awards will be initiated through the athletic department, but that the paper work would be handled through the Student Affairs Dept.

He said there would be various amounts of money available to athletic students, and that the program might not be limited to prospective athletes.

"We now have the where-with-all to offer needy students an opportunity to come to FTU," Rohter said.

Dr. Rohter was cautious about recruitment as such, explaining, "We try to tell students that it would be a privilege for them to play for FTU since we believe we have the best educational facilities and the best coaching. If they feel they can get a better program somewhere else, they are free to try."

There has been considerable discussion within the university in recent months concerning scholarship athletics. Those in favor argued that the university would not be able to maintain a competitive athletic program unless it were able to compete on the athletic market with those schools that did offer scholarships and grants-in-aid to talented athletes.

Those against the scholarship idea argued that the emphasis at FTU should remain with academics and that athletics should be kept on a sport level and out of the realm of big business.

FTU will probably add one more team next year, Dr. Rohter said. "We have committed ourselves to the establishment of a tennis team," he said.

The director said that sports clubs on campus presented formal progress reports during a meeting with members of the Education College and coaches last week.

The clubs represented included golf, wrestling, weightlifting, baseball and soccer.

"All the reports were very impressive," Rohter said. "The interest is really there. Now it is a matter of evaluating their progress and trying to find the money to support them."

Dr. Rohter stated that only the tennis club would be named an official FTU team next year under present plans, but the evaluation will continue.

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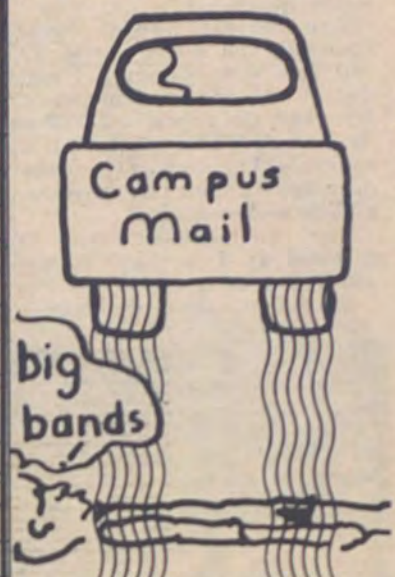
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
