Save The Sandspur!

Help preserve a century of Rollins' tradition.

The Sandspur is in danger of being shut down for the remainder of the semester unless at least 30 students step up to help produce the fledgling campus newspaper.

Sandspur editor-in-chief Teresa Greenlees announced the shutdown of the Publications Board (PBU) following the election of a majority of the staff. The weekly newspaper started out this semester with 40 members but that number has since dwindled to seven or

less. Unless we receive student applications for employment with Sandspur within 30 days, then we will not publish Sandspur for the remainder of the semester," Greenlees, a junior, said.

"It's impossible with the current staffing," Greenlees said the staff initially "gung ho" about the newspaper.

Everyone wanted to be on the paper. They were vying for positions on the paper."

But interest soon started to wane. Staffers found the job more of a larger responsibility and more difficult than they expected. The staff began abandoning the paper, leaving positions to resort to offering money to people to write stories. Those who wrote entertainment features were routinely sent to Sandspur offices, said Greenlees.

Finding someone to write news stories was harder, and no one wanted to do it. There are no reward systems (news writers), and it's time consuming," Greenlees said that persuading students to commit their time

is a campuswide problem.

"It's an issue that extends far beyond the Sandspur," said Greenlees. "I've talked to leaders in the Greek community and SGA and everyone seems to be having the same problem. People want activities and social opportunities, but they

don't want to be responsible for them."

Greenlees said it has been a taxing first year as editor-in-chief. She said she had counted on providing leadership to students experienced in newspaper production since she did not have such a background herself. However, she has had to perform a number of different functions due to inadequate staffing.

"Whoever is the editor of the Sandspur takes a vow of sleeplessness and inattention to academics. I got my first C's at Rollins last semester because I didn't have time to do anything else."

"I think I did some good work for the Sandspur, but I'm not proud of the fact that I had to sacrifice everything else."

Greenlees said the current situation should serve as a "wake up call" for students. Anyone interested in preserving the student voice on cam-

pus should act now by returning a Sandspur application found elsewhere in this publication and mail it to box 1324, she said. If enough students volunteer to help produce the newspaper, Greenlees thinks three to four more issues could be published before the end of the spring semester.

"Students who've wanted to get involved for whatever reason or who feel a deep-seated need for a forum should do something about it and take responsibility."

In an effort to resolve the problems with the newspaper, the PBU agreed to form a committee to evaluate the situation and come up with long-range solutions. Greenlees said the administration could help out by providing incentive programs or even assigning work/study students to assist production of the paper. The paper's problems are exasperated by the fact that it is not supported by any academic department, she said.

Penny Schafer, director of student activities, agreed that

the college should consider compensating leaders of student organizations like the Sandspur in some manner. Key positions could evolve into part-time jobs or earn academic credit, she said.

Schafer said that while she believes faculty and staff would sorely miss the publication, she is not sure what impact it would have on the student body.

"I'm not certain whether students are interested in the newspaper or other media. It's the change of the times. You can get The Orlando Sentinel on the Internet now."

Schafer said students are missing an opportunity to get a taste of life after Rollins.

"It's a great trial ground; I'm not sure the students see that."

Taking a stand: *The Sandspur* in crisis situation

In the excitement of the J-Term crisis, the new semester, and Spring Rush has anyone noticed what's been absent? From where has everyone been getting their information? January 18th was the last time this campus saw the *Sandspur*, but was it even missed? Unfortunately, I don't think so.

I have been a member of the *Sandspur* staff for 5 semesters. During that period, I have observed a rapid decline of interest in the paper. Yes, some students still read an article here and there, but does anyone ever wonder from where the paper comes? Each week two or three of the most devoted students spend about 10 hours on Monday and all

night Tuesday to put together the Rollins College *Sandspur*. As the only compensation for their efforts, the printed paper is found in the mail room every Thursday afternoon. This time consuming process has left our publication with an overworked editor and a "burnt out" staff of less than four people.

After observing this pattern for two and a half school years, I think the absurdity should stop. Why is a staff of four putting together a newspaper of information for a campus of 1400 students (in addition to the faculty and staff of Rollins)? I cannot understand the lack of involvement. After all, this is a student run newspaper meant to be for the students. Regardless of any explanation, the few remaining staff

members should not be expected to produce a quality newspaper with these limited resources, especially when there are so many ways to remedy the problems.

For example, the students would be greatly supplemented by the presence of a full time newspaper advisor who would be able to guide a staff in the weekly production. We value the support of faculty and staff for the newspaper, and I am positive we could be better rewarded in the experience of newspaper production if offered the guidance of a teacher. If the *Sandspur* is meant to encompass the entire Rollins community, I believe we should be supported by the whole of the college in this way.

Additionally, the *Sandspur* has been a tradition of

Rollins College for many years. As with all major components of this college, I believe the newspaper would benefit from a board with shared positions by faculty and students to protect the longevity of this publication.

Aside from these two suggestions, the lack of student interest in this newspaper remains. For the past three years, there have been one or two applicants for editor of the *Sandspur*. What happens the day there are none? My hopes are that a specialized advisor and a revitalized staff might help us to begin anew.

In a meeting two weeks ago, the remaining *Sandspur* staff members approached the Publications and Broadcasting Union in an effort to explain our position. We

have compromised with the final issue as a plea for the *Sandspur* cannot survive without contributions and support of the students, the management and support of the faculty and staff, and the understanding that this newspaper will not continue without these elements. It seems that problems were difficult to recognize.

*Please remember that the *Sandspur*, there are other publications reliably issued every school year that also continue to be severely understaffed. So, the problem does not sit only with the campus newspaper. We are merely the ones who decided to voice our concerns and take a stand.
