CLINTON WINS RE-ELECTION

The country has spoken once again. William J. Clinton was easily re-elected as the President of the United States on Tuesday. With the victory, Clinton became the first democratic president to win re-election since Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Americans voiced their faith in the current economy and turned a deaf ear to Bob Dole's cry that Clinton had violated their trust.

Two years after storming into power promising revolution, Republicans battled to extend their hold on the House and the Senate. Their power was not challenged. The Republicans retained control of both the House and the Senate for at least another two years, setting up another two years of a bipartisan government.

At the time of printing (late Tuesday night), Clinton had officially won 24 states and the District of Columbia, giving him 284 electoral votes - some 14 more than the required 270 necessary to be elected. It was projected at this time, that a larger victory would occur, once the Western states' polls closed and the results reported. Victory in hand, Clinton was looking for an electoral landslide and hoping, against tough odds, that Ross Perot's candidacy would not again cost him a majority of the popular vote. Perot was gaining about 8 percent of the national vote, less than half his 19 percent of 1992.

After four decades of involvement, tonight's results, disappointingly to Dole, ended his life long quest and desire for the presidency. "Bob Dole has completed his last political mission with courage and honor," GOP campaign press secretary Nelson Warfield said. "Even in defeat, he has much to claim in the way of success."

Locally, it was a big night for Clinton in Florida, where he became the first Democrat to win the state in 20 years, when Florida supported Jimmy Carter.

The election of '96 will be remembered for many things: Bob Dole's willingness to put it all on the line, the constant attacks of the candidates by each other, the "character issue," and so on. Nevertheless, the people of America have spoken. And at least for now, they support President Bill Clinton for another four more years. Rollins Committed to Diversity Affirmative Action Only A Technicality

Rollins College will not file a plan with the government, concerning Affirmative Action, for the 1996-7 school year. "Some legal definitions have changed," said President Rita Bornstein, "but they have no bearing on our commitment to diversity."

The only employers required to file an Affirmative Action plan with the government are government contractors and those employers that have been found guilty of discrimination in a court of law. A government contractor is a business or corporation that buys from, sells to, or receives funding from the government.

Rollins does not fall under either of these categories, because student financial aid and faculty grants are not contracts, and the college has never been found guilty of discrimination in a court of law. "The college has always been committed to diversity," said President Bornstein.

Many liberal arts colleges have recently adopted this new legal interpretation, and are no longer filing

plans.

"Rollins is in full compliance with the law," said Bette Tallen, Director of Diversity Programs and Affirmative Action, "the college has not changed." Tallen's job will remain the same.

The plan is a tool created by the government to analyze an employer's jobs, the population from which they recruit, and how well those groups are represented in hiring. The plan also presents options of how to rectify a lack of representation in any specific hiring group.

"Many people have misconceptions about the nature of Affirmative Action," said Tallen. "Affirmative Action is not about quotas, and does not mean that unqualified people get positions over qualified people. It does mandate that it is important to recruit from as wide a pool as possible, and to make sure to represent qualified people."

"One great irony of Affirmative Action," said Tallen, "is that, although many white males complain that it hinders them in procuring employment, it has actually benefited

white males in a positive way. No longer are jobs advertised only to a small pool of the employer's friends and family. Affirmative Action has increased everyone's hiring potential, by opening job opportunities to a wider pool of qualified applicants."

Rollins will continue to cultivate its awareness of these issues. "Not having a plan," Tallen reiterated, "doesn't mean that the college is not committed."

Much of this information was distorted as it ran its course through "the rumor mill" on campus during the week beginning October 28. Rollins has always been notorious in the eyes of students, faculty, and administrators alike for the uncanny way in which facts can be misconstrued.

"This is a classic example," Tallen said. "I appreciate the student's concern for diversity on campus, but I fear that some bridges may be burned... by student organizations and between individual students."

Said President Bornstein, "I was shocked to hear the rumor and pleased to be able to reaffirm Rollins' commitment to diversity."

The Stunningly Brilliant Rosenweig Sisters at the A.R.T.

The women's movement, the American economy, bisexuality, the fall of the Soviet Union, Jewish identity, relationships between sisters and lovers—an episode of CNN? No, it's just a few of the ingredients being mixed together in the Annie Russell Theater's production of *The Sisters Rosenweig*. Written by the Pulitzer prize winning playwright, Wendy Wasserstein, *Sisters* made its debut in 1992 at the Lincoln Center in New York. Needless to say, the fact that the play is so contemporary is welcomed with open arms.

For those of us who were fortunate enough to see and hear Wendy Wasserstein

speaking last January for "Winter Term with the Writers", we know that, for her, these tough issues of the financial state of the country and sexual preference can not be dealt with the heavy seriousness that the six o'clock news warrants. Last J-Term she stepped onto the A.R.T. stage looking, to my surprise, well, rather frumpy. The very minute she opened her mouth, through, her comedic wit enthralled me, put me into a state of wonder. Her poof of graying hair and untucked shirt then seemed to enhance, rather than detract from, her overall persona.

Wendy Wasserstein is a woman. She writes about women. She is not a woman who has stepped off then cover of *Cosmo* and she doesn't write about women that seem as though they could jump off the

pages of a fashion magazine. Though, in *Sisters* she does make a crack at women who consider *Cosmo* and *Vogue* staples of their reading diet. Though Gorgeous, one of the Rosenweig sisters, Wasserstein shows with her wacky humor how some women can get a little carried away with mud masks, manicures, and a milieu of \$1000 Chanel suits. All of Wasserstein's female characters are bright, sensitive, and real—women that you can identify with. Her plays, of which she's written several (like *Uncommon Women* and *Others*, *Isn't it Romantic*, and *The Heidi Chronicles*) are stories, stories that she shares with both men and women. These three sisters,

like Wasserstein, grew up in a time of the rising feminist movement. AN underlying question or theme of the play is how can these women, if it is even possible, manage to have a professional life while also holding onto a fulfilling romantic relationship. Sara Goode, the oldest sister is not only the head of a worldwide banking corporation. This story deals with whether or not she can break free from years of bitterness and open up to a man, physically as well as emotionally. The youngest sister Pfeni, spends her life secure and settled in the freedom of traveling and being in love with a man who just happens to be bisexual. Sara, Gorgeous, Pfeni could have been part of a trilogy, one play writ-

ten about each of the sisters; they are so very distinct from each other and yet there is a thread that runs through them—a struggle that makes their characters united.

The Sisters Rosenweig takes the conflicts in human relationships and throws in a lot of comedy. Directed by Dr. S. Joseph Nassif, it opens on the A.R.T. stage Nov. 29 with the following cast: Jamie Watkins (Sara Goode), Kimme Donovan (Gorgeous Teitelbaum), Shannon Barry (Pfeni Rosenweig), Brandy Mitchell (Pfeni Rosenweig understudy), Kim Adams (Tess Goode), Marcos Stafne (Geoffrey Duncan), Rob Hunnicutt (Mervyn Kant), William Brock (Tom Valiunus), Bill Klear (Nicholas Pym).
