Dear R. I. w<sup>th</sup> the Salutation of endeared kindness  
I do most dearly salute <sup>you</sup> for in the opening of pure love  
my love in all rowls towards <sup>me</sup> my beloved friend  
I having of an opportunity to send to Barbadoes thou  
being so lovingly brought into my remembrance I  
could do no less then; signify by the few lines of my  
welfare & hope the same concerning mine I have been  
here this I day intend how ward tomorrow morning  
I know my wife dear love is to the thou art often  
in her remembrance often speaking of the  
several letters I have sent from the last from  
London Inquiring thy going into York & from  
thence to Ireland but it came too late to write  
to thee there but hope that may meet why  
thou at Barbadoes we long to see thee I have  
writ several letters to thee some sent to Barbadoes  
afore to England the last I sent from the In-  
mated as if thou had not as yet the any from  
mee dear Bogd I have not time to write  
much at this time but left the lately we  
had our yearly meeting at ~~the~~ Burlington  
where the lords power & presence did greatly  
attend us his loving refreshment were amongst  
& our hearts there were greatly enlarged by thy  
supplication for us & on our behalfs that  
we may be pleased how before him that so we may  
be favored by him, the god will is not comin as yet  
but expect him too long but not to tarry when a  
paper in law is here is love is to thee our families  
were well when we came from home I a paper  
had taken up the land in a place call Wrights town  
in our County its 12 or 13 miles distant from us  
it was the next day do wake up, I have 200 yrs  
by it on one side & of Bad life is comin into County  
the living next on the other side I saw Jon wood here  
yester day his father wife & rest are well friends  
about us is well generally with yardley & Jarney  
& the Bakers families & if thou comes not soon  
I desire thee to keep writing dear Bogd I must  
conclude that if some word should signify must to thee  
of our affaires but in short we are well & rest thyself in the  
true
