Richard Comberton after my dear Love Remembred to
thee and thy dear wife, father and mother, whom
I dearly salute you all, in the good hope that is
over all sea and Land god blessed for ever, and now
found by this thou may understand I have recd from
dated: y: 8: of: y: 9: mo: which I was very glad of
it being the first time that I had recd from I say they said
it came by way of Barbatoe, I recd it the last night
and I understand thou was short of time to give me
account of things, only thy wife's family had been
sick, but I have heard by some that young Ann Harri-
son writes to thee, first from Barbatoe, then from London
then from Ireland, then from London again, and once
from Ireland when I first came here, for that thou may
know I have not been unmindfull of you, I have been
through this nation, and have had good sayings, meetings
all dayes and nights, I am to goe towards Cork, about
two weekes hence to see for shipping to Barbatoe or some
as the Lord shall way, I hope in a monthes time to
leave this nation, I have given thee an account all
along how it was with me concerning my travell
and of writing to thee from thee, for now, I desire
to hear, if this come to hand, write to Joseph Sedon
in Bridge town Barbatoe by the first, I am glad of this
opportunity, which I have met with just now
and I am in haste to goe to meeting, so with my dear
Love to all friends, and Brethren, who may inquire
after me, my Love is to them all, as if I did know
them, god all mighty be with you all, a man
for in brotherly Love.
