Arson Suspected in Lyman Hall Incidents

Two arson-related crimes were recently committed in Lyman Hall, the home of the Rollins Outdoor Club.

At approximately 4:55 a.m. the morning of Wednesday, March 22, students in both Lyman and Gale Halls were awakened by the fire alarm, which was activated by a lit firecracker left in the hall on the second floor of Lyman. The responsible person may have gained access into ROC's house through the first

floor bathroom, which was found with its screen pushed in from outside.

That Saturday, March 25, at approximately 5:35 a.m., Gale and Lyman students were awoken again. This time, a damp cardboard box had been placed in the Lyman Hall oven, which had been turned up to 500 degrees.

Matt Masem, a Gale resident, said, "There was so much smoke; it was unbelievable... you couldn't see a thing on ROC's first floor."

Masem also heard heavy footsteps in the hall above his

first-floor room moments after the alarm went off for the second incident. He, along with others, believes the perpetrator, after setting the fires in ROC, ran through the second floor hall connecting the two dorms and exited Gale on the Pinehurst side.

Campus Safety, the Winter Park Fire Department, and the Winter Park Police Department responded to each event. The police spoke to a small number of students and snapped some pictures as a part of their ongoing investigation into the crimes.

Campus Safety Director Brad

McKown said there were "no leads yet... but both we and the police department are actively investigating the possibilities."

ROC House Manager Liz Sharpe has responded by making arrangements for more fire extinguishers to be installed in the halls, and by organizing fire safety programs in an attempt to educate residents about how to respond to any further threats. Gale residents discussed the possibility of an early morning "dorm watch" program.

Deputy Fire Chief Jim White said that judicial response to

these type of crimes "varies; it depends on the intent and results of the fires... a fire started by a box in an oven in an occupied residential hall would be felony arson."

Masem said: "Members of both dorms are very upset with the recent fires. This is the third consecutive year I have been a resident of Gale Hall, and this has been the first time a fire alarm has ever woken me up in the middle of the night."

Two New Reference Databases

Starting this month, two new reference databases, the *Philosopher's Index* and the *Mental Measurements Yearbook*, are available to all Rollins students, faculty and staff via the campus network.

The *Philosopher's Index* provides indexing and abstracts from books and journals of philosophy and related fields. It covers the areas of ethics, aesthetics, social philosophy, political philosophy, epistemology, and metaphysic logic, as well as material on the philosophy of law, religion, science, history, education, and language.

The range of the database is

from 1940 to current, and users can conduct searches by author, title, subject, document type, language, and publication year, etc.

Mental Measurements Yearbook, produced by the Buros Institute, is widely used by professionals such as counselors, guidance workers, psychologists, personnel directors, and educators. It contains full-text information about and reviews of all English-language standardized tests, covering educational skills, personality, vocational aptitude, psychology, and related areas, as included in the printed *Mental Measurements Yearbooks*.

For each test, the database provides the name of the test author, publication information,

scoring information, and the number of the *Mental Measurements Yearbook* in which the test was originally described. The full text for each record includes an overview of the test, a description of the test materials and time needed, and one or more reviews of the test.

J-Term in Israel

My trip to Israel in January was one of the most meaningful and enjoyable trips ever. Since my last visit to Israel nine years ago, I had forgotten how amazing the nation was. While the country has become more cosmopolitan, it has retained its spiritual splendor and physical beauty.

In the ten days I was there, my relationship to the Holy Land was rekindled and my love for it intensified. I was reminded of the Holy Land's importance and its magical hold on the soul of people from so many religious cultures.

As a Jewish Studies minor, I was excited to have the opportunity to have a "hands-on" experience with the land, its history and its people. Over the summer and fall, I spent time preparing for the trip by paying close attention to one of the most disputed political topics—the future of the Golan Heights.

So, with ten female students and Dr. Greenberg, we ventured into this tiny land's magical history and rich, spiritual traditions. I found the trip to be moving, particularly in Jerusalem. There we visited the Wailing Wall, and I was touched by its simplicity and magnificence. I also found Rachel's tomb to be spectacular with its symbolism and its meaning, especially for Jewish women.

However, what intrigued me most was the Golan Heights. I did not know what to expect from this disputed land I had heard so much about. Give up the land for peace or retain it—I could not take a stand on this debated issue prior to the trip. I had decided that my mind would be at ease when I could actually see the Golan, touch its soil, and observe the physical distance between Israel and Syria. To my dismay, it was not that easy.

Further into the Golan, Israeli "espionage" sites were pointed out to our group. We were not allowed to take pictures, but the bus slowed down for us to look. Even more shocking than the "espionage" sites were the mass numbers of land mines and trenches. They coated the roads with signs and barbed-wire fence; I felt it was a shame that a land so beautiful had to be monitored in such an ugly way.

I must point out that I have never been that involved with Israeli politics, but my attention remained on the Golan Heights. At this point, I cannot see how the land could be given up. The land seems crucial to the security of Israel's future and resources.

Realizing, too, that hatred and fighting do need to be abolished from this part of the world, I am in favor of furthering a peace process. In my opinion, though, making unfavorable compromises, like returning the Golan Heights, might be detrimental to Israel's
