Dear George Longworth very warmly & lovingly
wth the kiss of David & heavenly love do I salute
thee & pray for thee very often & thou in our
view & very lovely art that of more than
demonstrate & I know thou canst read me
in the book of life & is beyond all other
honour where thou canst see things as the
law is. A letter from thee about 10 days ago
came from thee dated but a few days before
from John Edmundson; giving an account of thy
passage towards Virginia; I would thou had had
had time; but I know best why thou who do make
hard things easy & uphold thee in all thy
travels & hardships who is the god of our lives
to whom be the praise ever all hail my spirit;
I know that ye who do dearly love thee
wth the dearest love & very soon so
wishes; I am now very well
not the way I had had a good time for this
Several weeks in my last & am but glad
we are all indifferent well if this come
to thy hand I desire thee to remember her
dear; I have a letter from John Clark
who gives an account many friends proposed in
the country, we shall be glad to hear from thee
when thou hast opportunity; I have long
abundantly wth love freely flowing to thee
wth I am ever wth love & affection wth the
paper in law paper & I know dear love it to thee
my paper is not very hard but I think it
worse of the bad paper if thou write to England
wth any of our friends remember us to them I am
somewhat in haste but must conclude thy
friend in the truth
