Dear & well beloved Mr. H. whom I wish well, every way &
 that consolation in my inward man may abound
 of your dear & unaccustomed you meet with the sweet
 springs of immortal love will sweeten & sanctify & mellow
 enough us to eternal life, our true witness & water of life;
 I hear my friend Mr. H. dear wife & little babes salute me. I can not
 faintly by father's & mother's Cydia Bro: Waltham & sister Hon: of
 Jo: Wood with his wife & well other friends though I do not mention
 to you. I have had the wife's letter dated the 20th of Sept: in
 the year 1784. I have had the letter to hand. I was glad of it
 more to hear of your satisfaction in that so remote part of the world
 & least to hear of your contentment in all your ill. Altho some taken
 away & that your meetings are fresh & attended with the goodness &
 good performance of the Lord, God Almighty bless you sweet & saucy to
 him self, that your beginnings may be in humility, your growth & maturity
 in love that you be no dull. that in you let providence take made out
 to you. you may make a good improvement to the honour of that work
 wherein salvation only depends, & my beloved friend great is
 the concern of you day in that part for many are towards you, some
 for good, some for evil, some wish well to your undertakings, others
 infamy & disgrace, & this is observed by the abundant in the heart
 the tongue speaketh, but still to him that wish & watch for it, will
 & hopes come when not expected, drawed up for the next page
 for all your want for still & desire to be after shall certainly at some
 time be in hands filled to you. But the desire after God & his
 will be to be long & labour, God alone will answer the prayer of whose
 will be in the will of the place, with the place outward faith to him. Confess
 drawed to one I wish it enough. I was a few days ago at London
 where various things I heard, but I sawed ground, that is, black
 with some difficulty we had our early meeting & was not broken
 altho hunted for. I was at several public meetings & was received
 some whereof was brought out of friends meeting. Doubtless it will be
 for great good meeting near taken 130 as yet & had to be for the more
 some whereof near sent to prison & was freed by payment of 50
 by acquaintance & others. I had not of one friend yet. but as some
 many will be so freed. I find for good was sent to prison for being
 at a public meeting in the city, & suffering of the same in the Nation
