understand that I do not forget to write unto thy letter
but I have gotten nothing as yet Robert Watmough I have got nothing
for there is nothing to be gotten except I take his body for the
ground is engaged for deep all day and as for Thomas Hodgson he is
come to live at this Gregorys I have been at him several
times and given him some help he says he will give me some when he
it but he is angry at me for asking it. John and Mary has
Moll Emeline and Jane and he is left with two children
and there is nothing to be had as for Richard Allington
his father has some money and no more who was able
but I have not seen him lately and his condition is but low
for I thought it good to acquaint thee that our landlady Mingley has

I had got books I have found March as bad as ever.

 must have any thing or not for a piece of Jeffrey we have agreed
 over since the last Mitalmas we have said the would provide for
 him but fear not as yet we have great want of James & Phinias
 for we do believe the would have send our friend in this case for
 we have had a very sharp winter & all of us been out of house
 but my father has kept in health all due love remembred unto
 thee & to James & Phinias & his wife to Phinias & his wife
 to both for the remembrance my love to John Alton & desire him
 to send me some Mandy & he is like to prosper things to go
 before with him if he will but in some dome right we are
 glad to hear from thee & so is Hugh Lewis & the rest of the
 neighbours & I desire that you let us hear from thee &
 often as thou canst
