Whereas I intended to have waited on  
you to morrow at yo<sup>r</sup> Cell but being prevented  
by busineses which came to me & supported  
I am constrained to give you this trouble.  
As to what matters may happen relating to  
me as Att. Gen<sup>l</sup>. I pray you would be so good  
to supply my absence if any of yo<sup>r</sup> affairs  
shoulder last Cell should come to pay or  
secure yo<sup>r</sup> fine in order to be discharged  
of yo<sup>r</sup> imprisonment & otherwise be pleased  
to secure such fine as my feet in your hands  
& instead as in yo<sup>r</sup> prudence you shall see  
as for Gilbert whether he ought to have  
considered me as last time or whether he  
neglected, I refer my self wholly to  
yo<sup>r</sup> self to allot me what seems reasonable  
to you.

I have also sent a note to be given to  
widow Pownall, If you should see her  
I would desire you to give her at yo<sup>r</sup> rate  
as you talk for ordering such ~~business~~  
regarding the quality of her pay, I ~~will~~ <sup>first</sup>  
would desire ready money (if to be had)

I have no news but we are very well &  
quiet here. I have had most of yo<sup>r</sup> papers belonging  
to yo<sup>r</sup> Court & spent some very kindly  
we we breakfasted yesterday together  
at Cho. Hollibaugh's: he takes his liberty  
as to any imprisonment. he seems very free.  
I have not had all yo<sup>r</sup> minutes from Capt.  
Marshall relating to Ben. Chamberlaine's  
I could not make any progress in drawing  
up yo<sup>r</sup> orders or not else but my  
love to yo<sup>r</sup> self & all of yo<sup>r</sup> family.
