friend Roger, Haydock & dearest beloved, with undisturbed unchangeable and
Chap low, we ~~At this~~ as well as many other times (I believe will
never be extinguished) both abound & flow towards thee, then
my dear friend art more esteemed by me, than I can express,
but thou art an object of love & the almighty hath made thee
An honorable instrument in his hand & hath given thee favor
& great esteem amongst his people, the gracious testimony that
hath dropped from thee, to the bringing down of that w^{ch} was in
the blood & rebellious, to the supporting & Consoling of the
lowly that the pangs of pain might be made in, hath taken such a
deep impress upon the hearts of some, that it can never be forgot-
ten, thou hast taken the weak by the hand & helped forward in
the places of difficulty, therefore I cannot but truly love and
esteem thee & be engaged in love unto thee; I saw a letter from
day last came to ~~Robert~~ Furner from within matters giving
us an account of thy weakness, the on the recovering hand for
thy illness I was very sorry, but for thy recovery right glad
& thy health & prosperity is truly travelled for by me I feel
desire I might private with thee to consider the weakness of
thy body & have a care of spending it all at once take such
things as may be for its preservation the contrary to thy appetite
& labour not over hard as I know very well thou hast done
many times heretofore, I had purposed to have com^d to thee &
had provided a horse, but being we have no further use of
these are in hopes thou may be still on the recovering hand there
fore was afraid I should miss of thee, I knowing thy willingness
to be going on in the work, I came from home 23rd Mo & landed
here 31 of the same & am very well & friends are generally well
brothers & sisters in Italy only ~~thin~~ ~~the~~ was brought to
bed here some weakly but comes through it by degrees I hope.
The German has taken a wife w^{ch} the priest & is gone quite from
us & will not reform at present neither is there much hope
w^{ch} is so bad, Roger Longworth can give thee a further account, I
have been very glad to have seen thee before I had re-
turned if possible but I do not see now how it will be except
I have above I go thou dost not get well on in thy distemper
that so I may have hopes to find thee if I come, I have intention
some ward if wind & shipping serve & nothing else I know
not of beginning of the next week therefore if possible let's
know of the first opportunity of the post after Roger comes to
thee that so I may bring to friends some certain tidings
concerning thee, direct to me to be left at the Atterbury
I have not else to add but as before I am thine in true
love
