y^e 27th 8th next. Is with me and truly glad to receive of you
his from me & had knowne we had to adered to judge
Should a written to the King before now to a left that knowne
How thing had beene with you since that departure from my
Great hath beene excessivly hath standed by & I have
prisenment at my miles from home and name of you
writed at our sending you out great and our way of good
of you who do wish and in all our excessivly and to all
see sustained and refused so that wee could down and
weard not weary and wolke and not faint for he not went to
In y^e day wee could althought or desired glory to hit name
for ever so. A little Remnant who hath found him to be
lower and of shore refuge and sea of himing place by which they have
been prepared and up held to this day in which he hath
opened the prisoned doors and set his little remnant free
so y^e way may send him in y^e face of y^e nations and
declean of his goods to the guardians to some who hath
don great thing in our day and brought to pass y^e which
wee weard not in expectation the sense of which brought
my heart and bowels my spirit before and make say with
the good man of old ofore what is man that there a
mind full of him and y^e some of mouth then thou regard
and appearseth for them and hath worked there durians
In despite of their enemies this is that which ~~say~~ say
of Remnant and the ground of their Rejassing y^e of
kept them faithfull in which they have been acquainted
with his goods and mean porters of his young friends
which is more to them than of outdore thing

o my dear friend much is in my heart concerning y^e goods
of y^e love but knowing thou hast had longer acquaintance with
it than my self causeth me to be heard say much more desire
my if we may have worthy of y^e same all our dayes y^e of
may more delight to do it good and y^e in y^e end of all wee
may be with that blessed soltarian y^e of y^e blessed of
my soldier in her will the King can prepare for all
Righteous which will be asufficient Reward for all our labor
So my dear friend I should be truly glad to receive of you
his from me at all times & if you please by pen or
have the dear soltarian of a named you to all our
friends ad names for both y^e names of Dowler John Shellen Richard
youe nicholas peeler Antony Diller James Shillcock & the
family also to dear John Goodson my love is to all friends
A secret amongst friend & generally well and nothing quiet many
friends being glad to hear of thy health my self dearly desired
to see her dear remembred to face which with soltarian
of my love to the wishing thee health at all at this time of year
