As August draws to a close, it is time once again to begin the new school year. A fresh crop of freshman are stepping onto the grounds and changing the landscape of the school. Four hundred ninety new students are entering into our midst on August 20. According to the Admissions Office, the new class is the largest, most talented, and most diverse class in the history of Rollins.

The students come from varied locations throughout the United States and throughout the world. Of the incoming class, 40 percent are from Florida, while the other 60 percent represent 31 states and 10 countries. Sixteen percent of the

freshman class are minority students. The class of 2007 is 60% female.

The incoming class is the largest Rollins has ever had and they will represent approximately 30% of the total student body.

Academically this class is equally gifted. The SAT average is the highest ever, up 35 points from 2000 and 80 points from 10 years ago.

David Erdmann, Dean of Admission and Enrollment, is very pleased with this new class. "For the past 10 years we have been pushing the center of the entering class," says Erdmann, "strengthening the academic profile and diversifying the student body. By all counts this year's entering class sets new records."

Financial aid was awarded to over 55 percent of the incoming students, with the average award over \$14,500. The percentage of students awarded financial aid con-

tinues to rise, increasing by over 20 percent during the last 10 years.

Nine percent of the new students were also accepted into the Accelerated Management Program, giving them the opportunity to earn a BA and a MBA in five, rather than six academic years. Thirteen percent of incoming students were accepted into the College's Honors Degree Program.

As for this year's freshman class, it is easy to say that they have continued the trend of strengthening the Rollins student body each year. This class has more ethnic diversity, economic diversity, and geographic diversity than any of the classes that came before them. This year, along with a bright cast of new students, the school is experimenting with the Nexus "Living Learning Community" where students live in the same building as their RCC

classmates. The RCC program continues to be innovative and very diligent in preparing students for their

## Extreme Darkness

■ Northeast crippled by largest blackout in North American history.

Wide scale power loss hit the Northeast at 4:15 p.m. on Thursday, August 14. The power company experienced a freak blackout that crippled much of the Northeast with loss of electrical power. The blackout is the largest in North American history with its effects reaching more than five states and even up into Canada. The power remained off in most cities throughout the night. When dawn came, lights started returning sporadically in most cities. The New York and Toronto Stock Exchanges returned to a normal trading day after the abrupt halt the previous day.







## Extreme Darkness: Blackout Cripples Northeast

New York, New Jersey, Ontario, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New Hampshire were the places most affected by this large-scale disaster. Water shortages, heat strokes and looting were among the side effects of the power outages. This also left the cities' emergency crews scrambling to keep order and rescue people who were trapped in elevators. The cause of the power loss was still not determined by press time and has been falsely attributed to things such as a large lightning strike or fire. The location of the original

power outage has also not been confirmed to be in the Niagara area, it is also reported that the Lake Erie region in Ohio is also suspect. A large scale power failure similar to this was also the cause of a blackout in the 1960's. The blackout affected as many as 50 million people in the wide area that it inflicted.

Citizens generally remained calm and civil during the emergency, with the only reports of looting coming Ottawa, Ontario. Throughout the day Friday power was expected to slowly return to the inflicted areas, but was expected to remain out in areas until the end of the weekend.

## SUPER sTARS

Rollins claimed both the men's and women's SSC Mayor's Cups.

The 2002-2003 school year proved to be one of the best in the more than 100-year history of intercollegiate athletics at Rollins. The Tars not only dominated within their own conference, but also on the national level securing two National Championships and finishing second in another.

When the dust settled on the 2002-2003 athletic season, the Tars emerged as the leading program in the Sunshine State Conference. The Mayor's Cup is the award given to the school in the SSC with the best athletic showing in the year. Last year, through their terrific achievements, the Tars came out on top as the winners of this prestigious award for both men's and women's sports. Rollins won conference championships in men's golf, women's golf and men's basketball while finishing in the top four in the league standings in all sports.

Along with winning the Mayor's Cup, the Tars also finished twenty-fifth out of 283 Division II schools for the Director's Cup All Sports Trophy. This is the third straight year that the Tars

have finished in the top 30 in the standings for that award. With nearly 1,700 students, Rollins was the second smallest school among the top 30 programs in the country.

Seven Rollins teams reached NCAA tournaments in the year. These teams included men's and women's golf, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's basketball and women's rowing.

The Tars also captured the 2003 women's golf NCAA Division II National Championship. The waterski team won the Division I title at the Collegiate National Championships. The men's golf team finished second at the NCAA Division II National Championships.

Individually, many athletes received conference and national recognition. Charlotte Campbell was named the NCGA "Player of the Year" and "Freshman of the Year" as she led her team to the NCAA Division II Championship for Women's Golf. The Sunshine State Conference also named her "Female Athlete of the Year."

Four athletes also received Sunshine State Conference "Player of the Year" honors. Matt Williams for Men's Basketball, Alex Smith in Men's Golf, Jennifer Beames in Women's Golf and Lindsey Manz in Softball.

Student-athletes at

Rollins were equally as strong academically as they were on the playing field during the 2002-2003 school year. Senior baseball star Jason Cloar was named as a first team Verizon Academic All-American. Jennifer Beames, Carla Prieto and Clayton Chesarek were all honored as second team Academic All-Americans. This was the first time that Rollins has had more than two Academic All-Americans in a single year. Six other Rollins athletes were recognized as All-District Academic selections. The GPA of the 285 Rollins athletes was above 3.0 for the third straight year. The final GPA of 3.071 was the highest recorded by Rollins student-athletes.

Rollins coaches were also recognized for their achievements. Women's Golf coach Julie Garner was selected as the NCGA and Golfweek National Division II "Coach of the Year" as well as the SSC Women's Golf "Coach of the Year". Men's golf coach Kyle Frakes was selected as the Division II Men's Golf "Coach of the Year" by Golfweek. He also received the SSC "Coach of the Year" honor for the second straight year and fourth time in his career. Men's basketball coach Tom Klusman and Men's Soccer coach were also named the SSC "Coach of the Year" in their respective sports.

## WOMEN'S SOCCER

Former Rollins standout and new women's head coach Tony Amato returns a veteran group as they look to climb to the top of the Sunshine State Conference. Last year, the team posted two wins over perennial league power Lynn and registered several other strong showings on their way to an 11-7-2 record, good enough for third in the SSC. Nine starters are back, including 2002 leading scorer Keri Dye. The junior tallied 11 goals and 28 points to earn All-SSC honors. Junior Annie Fink is back this season after sitting out all of 2002 with a knee injury. She, along with fellow defenders Dakota Fiori and Stephanie Stein, will lead a Tars defense that posted four shutouts last season. Junior transfer Alexis Sutton and freshman Lindsay Taylor head a talented group of newcomers who will vie for playing time this season.




# 2003 ROLLINS COLLEGE FALL SPORTS SCHEDULES
