The occasion of these lines are to show you how ^{unrespectfully} you have treated me for ^{the} ~~the~~ a letter from you dated the 11th of the first month; 694 wherein thus you write subscribed in all your names [we are much engaged to thee for thy labour of love and if thou have occasion to make use of us in England we are ready to serve thee to ut most of our power] ~~where~~ ^{where} ~~of~~ another letter from you wherein you sent me three warrants from ~~Thomas Hales~~ & orders to take up your lands mentioned in the said warrants with letter bears date the 24th day of the second month; 694 & you say in the said letter if I will answer your request therein you shall not be backward to requite only desire thy patients till you have some return I got the land laid out for you accordingly & sent ~~several things~~ ^{several things} out of what I had done & expected you would have paid me but ~~had nothing from you~~ ^{then I drew on you for what I paid} out of my pocket on your account & about 20^s for my trouble & expense it had cost me money with I never charged you with but what was mollified in the 20^s for my trouble;

• On your letters some of them cost 10^s a letter several forriages over Stholehill river for my self & horse in your buyings besides my expenses in your ~~and~~ ^{and} my being 30 miles distant from my own house whilst I was a doing it & cost me several of those forriages afore it was completed Intermitt with my own buyings; ~~of~~ another letter from fra. Douc dated the 17th day ^{of} 1693 wherein he Complains of my not sending the patents & the buttins & boundings of the land & thinks much of the charge ^{pp.} & concludes we have ~~the~~ ^{the} wrong but have done ^{none} ~~as~~ for thy bill we refuse to pay it because Wm. Wait & saith it is paid already in another letter ^{dated as aforesaid} subscribed by you all you desire me with Robt Turner to sell your land & pay my self out of it for you are not willing to be at any more charge, ^{pp.} & then you write thus we desire you will do as well as you can for us according to truth with it to be a guide to us all — I hope I will do as I would be done by in another letter from Wm Wiggans with out date ~~the~~ ^{the} with the last mentioned to write he does not remember he gave me any order to take up your land but gave Langhorn but that ~~words~~ ^{words}

from for get full nos for the letters show otherwise of the
warrantly came with orders to me enclosed
before the warrants came to hand I had done service
for you as why were you more engaged to me if I
still on receipt my service, not only so but disbursed
several pounds on your account ^{several years ago} having ^{no} profit nor benefit
there in but out of true respect & kindness to you where
then do you protest or refuse to pay my bill & give me
opportunity of being truly be good & to do as I would be
done by I doubt you are wedded to your money as you
would see you have either willingly or unwarily mist that rule
I never ~~to~~ see of John East Bourne money neither is in
any capacity to have you been content with ^{5th} of that money
I told him had it but he told not take it for your order to
me was to the ^{5th} start. with it appeared in writing to be
contrary to the agreement for you were but to have ^{5th} that
Cuntry money I acquainted you of but gave me no order
about it till he was turned by fire I have spoke with grave
Langhorn who says he never heard that I had any of
East Bourne money I have spoke with Wm: Waite he says he
