ting this time is to signify to thee y^e. it hath
pleased the Lord who ordereth all things in his
wisdom to take away my dear father from us to him
self out of this troublesome world; blessed be the Lord
his god who hath Caried him through many exercises
to griefs and suffering for y^e. blessed with his sake
and I know it was the delight of his hart to
serve & entertain friends; and I am satisfied he is
Gone to his Rest w^{ch}. is his great gain, although
wee that are left behind shall greatly miss him
and now seeing the antients are going of the
stage even those that have been the brethren
in y^e. heat of the day; and now this Cry arises
in my hart O that y^e. Lord would raise up and Establish
even the serving generation that wee may
serve the Lord y^e. god of our fathers; and not
forget him as some did of old - My dear father
was taken sick at New York y^e. about y^e. 5th day mo
and being very desirous to get to his own house we bro-
ught him over y^e. river safely but not finding him
fit to be Caried farther he remained in the house of
Richard Gibbs hat maker where wee tended him day
and night till y^e. 20th day of the same month an^d.
he finished his Course and is gon to his Rest & his good
works shall follow him; soe wee brought him to
his own house and his body after a good meeting w^{ch}.
s. accompanied with a great Company of friends
and neighbors to the burying place where his body
was decently buryed by his father.

which I suppose will beas no will he having since
