MORE DISCUSSION OF HONOR SYSTEM

HONOR COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT. STRAW VOTE SHOWS MAJORITY OF STUDENTS IN FAVOR OF IT

FINAL ACTION WILL BE TAKEN IN THE NEAR FUTURE

Thursday the 26th, the Honor System was again discussed during Student Assembly hour. Mr. Thompson, chairman of the committee, which was chosen the week before to consider the situation, gave the report of the committee. His report was to the effect that a class room honor system, in their opinion, was the most practical. The committee also suggested a plan, in effect as follows: That all students be placed upon their honor to refrain from cheating during examinations; that any student seen cheating should be warned by those seeing him cheating that he had been seen, and to report before the honor committee.

There followed active discussion in which several amendments were proposed to the plan, none of which were adopted. No action was taken regarding Mr. Thompson's suggestion except to refer it back to his committee for further consideration.

The Dean pointed out that a pure honor system, that is, one making no provision for punishment, is what every criminal wants. An honor system, to be practical, must be restricted—while granting freedom, it must provide for immediate punishment if that freedom be violated.

A straw vote was taken to determine how many were in favor of some form of a restricted honor system. There were ninety-six for, and thirty-three against, such a system. The meeting adjourned, and the question will be taken up more fully on the twenty-seventh.

INTER-FRATERNITY COUNCIL IS FORMED

The first meeting of the new Inter-fraternity council was held in the president's office last Thursday night.

Pledge day was changed to October 28th and later a new pledge day will be made for the coming year.

Rollins has long needed this new organization as it has been evident that sometime or other the boys and girls would be in a position to manage their own affairs, as is now the case.

Old Rollins tramped all over the Hatters and when the final whistle had blown the score stood 13 to 0 in Rollins' favor, and Captains Wright burned the wires with that same old "Veni, Vidi, Vici" stuff.

It was a real game from the very start with the best playing and interference ever seen on the DeLand field. Even "Pug" Allen said that it was wonderful.

Rollins Takes Fall Out of Stetson

The first period started out with Stetson receiving the ball on their twenty-yard line. Starting out with the famous Minnesota Shift the Hatters made things warm for the Tars during the first few minutes of the game.

Two first downs were made in rapid succession by the Hatters after which the Tars held for downs. With the ball in Rollins' territory the Tars, by a series of end runs and bucks, put the ball on the Hatters' thirty-yard line. The first play, a long end run by Thomas, brought the ball within striking distance of the goal, but an off side play by Rollins caused a five-yard penalty putting the ball on Stetson's ten-yard line.

Two bucks by Dow and Thomas put the ball across the goal line for the first marker of the game. Thomas missed the goal. On the kick-off Davis received the ball on Stetson's five-yard line and added with wonderful interference returned the kick-off twenty-five yards. Two end runs and a pass failed to gain ground for the Hatters and Davis punted to Rollins' thirty-yard line. Colado made a great return of fifteen yards of the punt and on the next play Teare went through the line for three yards. On a buck through center Thomas seven yards and first down. An end run netted Rollins fifteen yards and first down again.

Rollins 6; Stetson 0.

Second Quarter

With the ball on Stetson's twenty-five yard line the Hatters held the Tars, getting the ball on their own seventeen-yard line. Hughes on a criss-cross took the ball for seven yards while Davis lost three on an end run. Nased tried a buck through tackle netting the Hatters' first down on the twenty-seven-yard line. On the next play Hughes, after being viciously tackled by Bender, dropped the ball. Rollins recovering on Stetson's thirty-yard line. A buck by Thomas netted the Tars three yards. Dow going through tackle for six. On the next play Thomas injured his leg, being replaced by Griffith.

Dow gained three through center, Griffith making it first down on an end run. Wright made ten off tackle on a shift play, placing the ball on the Hatters' fifteen-yard line. End of first half.

Score: Rollins 6; Stetson 0.

ROLLINS TARS WALLOP STETSON HATTERS

"Pug" Allen and His Crew Still Dixey From Defeat Administered to Them Saturday at DeLand

being made. Two end runs made it first down for the Tars. On the next play Teare went through the line for six yards while Colado repeated for first down. Stetson fighting hard held the Tars for two downs, but slipped on the third when an end run by Thomas netted Rollins fifteen yards.

With the ball on Stetson's ten-yard line a series of bucks put the ball on the six-yard line from which point Dow backed it over for the second marker of the game.

Thomas kicked the goal making the score stand 13 to 0.

Rollins kicked to Stetson, the kick being returned ten yards before Leslie downed. At this time the Hatters opened up with forward passes the first two netting them forty yards.

Rollins broke up the succeeding passes, Bender intercepting one and returning the ball forty yards before being downed by Leslie. On account of the referee's whistle being blown as the pass was being made the ball was brought back. A line buck netted the Hatters nothing, the ball going to Rollins on Stetson's forty-yard line. Quarter ended, Rollins 13; Stetson 0.

Ledinsky replaced Teare at right half for Rollins. On the first play Ledinsky carried the ball for five through tackle. Dow made two through guard, Thomas going around end for first down. Colado made six on a fake through center, Stetson smearing the next play for a three-yard loss. Dow carried the ball five yards, Thomas punting to the Hatters' ten-yard line.

Stetson tried more passes without completing one, kicking on the third down to Rollins' forty-five-yard line.

With the ball on Stetson's ten-yard line the whistle blew with the call in
