MANY NEW COURSES OFFERED THIS YEAR

Rotary Club of Orlando Makes Gift to Business Department

The world today is demanding men of general education and culture with efficiency in business. These men must have not only knowledge of principles and theory, but training in office practice and methods. Rollins has adopted a policy and developed a department for meeting this demand for a highly efficient training in business administration based upon a general collegiate education. Such fundamental subjects as English, Economics, Mathematics, History and Sociology are consistently interwoven with and constitute a background for the technical subjects of Law, Accounting, Insurance, Banking, Salesmanship, Foreign Trade and Transportation along counting room practice.

Class contact with actual business is maintained by special lecture courses by active business men and bankers, also by the use of the "Problem" method whereby the students go out into actual commercial and industrial enterprises and put the class room theory to the practical test.

The increasing modern equipment made possible by the generous gift of the Orlando Rotary Club will soon make the department a great benefit to the state in furnishing industrial surveys, reports, etc., and by turning out students with the latest methods of efficiency in business administration and office practice.

New courses are also offered in citrus culture and grove management, under the direction of Dr. J. C. Th. Uphof, who has had many years of training in this work. These courses are considered a great asset to the college because of our location in the midst of the orange growing belt.

Formal Opening of Rollins College Occurred on Thursday, September 28; Dean Sprague in Charge of Exercises; Addresses Appreciated by Large Audience Attending; Treasurer O'Neal Principal Speaker.

Genuine and wide spread interest and enthusiasm characterized the opening exercises of Rollins College which were held Thursday morning. For thirty-seven years Rollins College has done work on the shores of beautiful Lake Virginia and today marks the initial step of the institution upon its thirty-eighth year of educational work in the state. Rollins as the oldest institution of higher learning in Florida has as alumni and former students men and women who are prominent in all lines of work today, each of them as a testimony that the college is doing work of great value not only in Florida but in the nation at large.

The large college chapel, situated in Knowles Hall, was completely filled with students, members of the faculty and friends of the college and that spirit of co-operation and good fellowship that is significant of the brotherly feeling of persons interested in the success of the college was at its highest point of enthusiasm as shown by the addresses of welcome given by business men of prominence in this section of the state.

After devotional exercises in which the ministers of Winter Park participated, the long time friend and supporter of Rollins College, William E. O'Neal, treasurer of the college, a prominent business man of Orlando, gave a short address. In his well worded talk Mr. O'Neal was very optimistic over the prospects for the scholastic year. He said the opening prophesied of large things for Rollins. In continuing he stressed the point that all people interested in Rollins should keep in mind the sacrifices made by the people who have made Rollins possible, and in keeping this in mind he further said, every one should hold Rollins as a sacred thing.

In closing he said: "The men who are behind Rollins have a firm basis for the hope that the institution is destined to be one of the greatest colleges of the Southland."

Following Mr. O'Neal's talk men representing the city of Winter Park, the Business Men's Club of Winter Park, and the Winter Park Board of Trade gave short addresses of welcome to the student body. Each of these talks was of the enthusiastic type, proving to all present that the business world of this section of the state is very much interested in the welfare of Rollins College.

President Sprague was in charge of the exercises held this morning, introducing each speaker with five remarks, which are characteristic of his speech. On account of the limited time the president's address was omitted from the morning's exercise. This address will be given at a later date.

Rollins College as usual has as its faculty a company of well-trained Christian men and women. The value of the small Christian College has always been a point stressed by College authorities, and so in arranging the faculty Rollins always picks men and women who are fully competent to do their work.

Optimism Reigns Supreme in the Local Camp Over Prospects

Blue and Gold should be the predominant color when the football banners of state champions in inter-collegiate circles of Florida is awarded after the season closes, for if the Tars continue to improve as they have done in the first week of practice this year's squad will easily outclass the wonder team of '21. Coach Ashburn, who is a new comer on the campus is very confident that his proteges will make a mark for themselves this fall.

Coach hails from Texas and he had a very successful year last fall down in the Lone Star State where he was the mentor of the athletic endeavors of Baker College. Tar followers are well pleased with the manner which Coach Ashburn uses in training his men, and they believe a capable man is at the head of the Rollins athletic attempts this year.

Six letter men reported for the first practice held last week. These men—"Cotton" Thomas, "Big Ken" Warner, Captain Max Wolf, "Red" Shishy, Jack Yeare and Charlie Ward—should form the nucleus for a winning combination. Rollins supporters will be pleased to learn that Colado is to return in a few days; the "little general" will no doubt be the commander of the Tar attempts this fall—folks say he was a wonder last fall.

The backfield of the Tar club will be an A-1 combination. "Cotton" and Jack are out for the backfield, and so is "Red" Shishy. These men, assisted by such persons as "Mickey" Baumgardner, George Zemls, "Bing" Hoeflinger, "Bo" Kalbach and "Em" Emery should be able to get a wonder ground gaining squad together.

A beefy line is the prospect as the Sandspur goes to press, and then the wing positions will be the fastest in the state, if present conditions hold true.

Manager Wright is at the present hard at work getting the schedule in shape. Beside the games scheduled at the present date, games with Birmingham-Southern College, Howard College, Charleston College, Mississippi College and Mercer University are under consideration.

Which Type of Research is of Greatest Value?

A stove burns too much coal. A man familiar with the principles of combustion and heat radiation makes experiments which indicate desirable changes in design. That is research.

You want to make a ruby in a factory, a real ruby, indistinguishable by any test from the natural stone. You begin by analyzing rubies chemically and physically. Then you make rubies just as nature did. Your rubies are the result of research—another type of research.

While melting up your chemicals and experimenting with high temperatures, you begin to wonder how hot the earth must have been millions of years ago, and what were the forces at play that made this planet what it is. Your investigation leads you far from rubies and causes you to formulate theories to explain how the earth, how the whole solar system was created. That would be research of a still different type.

Research of all three types is conducted in the laboratories of the General Electric Company. But it is the third type—pioneering into the unknown—that means most in the long run, even though undertaken with no practical benefit in view.

For example, the Research Laboratories of the General Electric Company are exploring matter with X-rays in order to discover not only how the atoms in different substances are arranged but how the atoms themselves are built up. The more you know about a substance, the more you can do with it. This work may enable scientists to answer more definitely the question: Why is iron magnetic?
