STAGE IS ALL SET FOR TURKEY DAY STRUGGLE

**Tars and Derbyites to Mix This
Afternoon in the Annual
Gridiron Fray**

The stage is all set for the annual Rollins-Stetson football classic. The game will be started this afternoon out at the Winter Park Golf Course at 2 p. m.

Stetson arrived on the scene of action last evening and from all accounts the Hatters are in first-class shape for today's battle. Coach "Pug" Allen was reticent in making any predictions as to the result of today's game, when he was questioned by a reporter late last night. All that could be gotten from him was "my boys are going to play the game of their lives tomorrow." Stetson has come to Winter Park with the determination of carrying the laurels of victory back with them to their De-Toni home. In the matter of games played so far this season Stetson has played six while the locals have only played five, the last one being staged on Armistice Day while the Hatters played one on November 18. All in all it would appear from first glance that perhaps the Hatters are in better fighting trim than are the Tars, but "dope" is a matter that does not determine football games.

The Tars are all set for the game this afternoon. Going into the battle with the full determination of again ruffling the hat band of the Derbyites the local fighting force is scheduled to really "strut their stuff" in today's battle. If a dry day is the order of events the locals will no doubt use the air game to advantage, for the passing ability of the Blue and Gold squad has been greatly improved since the Southern contest.

For the first time this year the Tars possess a machine-like fighting aggregation. In the Southern contest the local looks like a "set of ham and eggs" as one of the Tar backers noted it, but from the looks of the stiff practice held Tuesday afternoon

gation An Average of 8.3
Pounds Per Man**

A comparison of the weights of the two teams that will battle this afternoon give the following results:

Total weight of Tar team—1,861 pounds.

Average weight per man—169 2-11 pounds.

Total weight Stetson team—1,770 pounds.

Average weight per man—160 10-11 pounds.

Thus the Rollins eleven will out-weigh the Stetson eleven on the average of 8 3-11 pounds per man.

Total weight of Rollins line—1,234 pounds.

Average weight per man—176 2-7 pounds.

Total weight Stetson line—1,129 pounds.
