## S. A. E. CHARTER TO BE SOUGHT BY PHI ALPHA

### CONVENTION AT DETROIT

**Oldest Fraternity on Campus Continues Efforts Towards Nationalization.**

During the Christmas holidays the Phi Alpha Fraternity will present a petition for a charter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon at the National Convention to be held in Detroit, Michigan. The dates set for the convention are December 27th, 28th and 29th. It is expected that Phi Alpha will have at least one representative at the Convention and possibly more.

Phi Alpha was founded at the Florida State College in 1904 under the name of The Seminoles. The following year The Seminoles petitioned Sigma Alpha Epsilon for a charter at the National Convention held in Nashville, Tenn. The Seminoles were given favorable action although the charter was not granted, however, the name of Phi Alpha, a part of the S. A. E. emblem, was given to the Seminoles to be used as a name for the fraternity. The next year, the Buckman Act, passed by the Florida State Legislature, prohibited all appropriations for State institutions of learning, so Florida State College passed out of existence. The following fall, Phi Alpha was established at Rollins, since most of the students of Florida State College entered Rollins.

As the time progressed the fraternity grew in strength and the alumni became incorporated under the state law. A beautiful site for a fraternity house was purchased on the shore of Lake Virginia and a sinking fund was begun for the erection of a thirty-five thousand dollar home for the fraternity.

In 1920 it was thought that the time was ripe for a petition to be sent again to Sigma Alpha Epsilon for a charter. Accordingly, two representatives of Phi Alpha appeared at the National Convention in St. Louis and presented the petition. The charter was not granted but the work of the fraternity toward nationalization was encouraged.

#### CORRECTION

A large audience was in attendance upon the presentation of the program and the entire performance received rounds of applause from the seemingly enthusiastic audience.

The local Conservatory each year attempts to bring as a Concert Course to Rollins College and the surrounding territory the best musical talent available. Florida located as it is, is not usually included in the itinerary of the largest of the musical companies, but when by chance companies of the higher type make engagements in this state the Rollins Conservatory heads off their best to give the citizens in

## EMORY GLEE CLUB TO BE IN ORLANDO JANUARY 5

**Rollins Students Will Have Opportunity of Hearing Male Chorus at The Beacham.**

Rollins students will have the privilege of hearing one of America's leading male choruses when the Emory Glee Club appears at the Beacham theater on January 5.

Last year the Macon Telegraph called the Atlanta aggregation "the greatest glee club in the south," and that commendation has stuck to it ever since. Its nation-wide reputation has brought grand opera offers to two of its principal soloists.

In the club this year are 30 trained musicians, including a chorus, orchestra, and mandolin club, all trained by a professional director. The repertoire includes grand opera arias, classical favorites, novelty jazz, original college melodies and skits, and a tuncful interpretation of Sheridan's "The Rivals."

The goal of the Emory singers on this trip is Havana, Cuba, where it will appear for the first time in the

## RESEARCH PRIZE OFFER-ED COLLEGE GRADUATES

### \$5,000 FELLOWSHIP FUND

**General Electric Company Makes Announcement as to The Foundation.**

Part of a fund of \$400,000 to be set aside by the General Electric Company and to be known as the Charles A. Coffin Foundation, for rewarding and encouraging service in the electrical field, will be devoted to an annual prize of \$5,000 to be awarded graduates of American colleges of technical schools with which to continue research work in this country or abroad.

Announcement of the prize and the terms of award has just been made by the General Electric Company as follows:

"Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) is to be awarded annually for fellowships to graduates of American colleges and technical schools who, by the character of their work, and on the recommendation of the faculty of the institution where they have studied, could with advantage continue their research work either here or abroad; or some portion or all of the fund may be used to further the research work at any of the colleges or technical schools in the United States. The field in which these fellowships and funds for research work are to be awarded are:

- (1) Electricity.
- (2) Physics.
- (3) Physical Chemistry.

"A committee appointed by the Foundation Committee will award such fellowships and funds for research work, with the advice and cooperation of a committee of three, one to be appointed by each of the following:

National Academy of Sciences.  
American Institute of Electrical Engineering Education.

This committee is to be known as the "Charles A. Coffin Fellowship and Research Fund Committee," and the Fellowships are to be known as the "Charles A. Coffin Fellowships."

"The committee to co-operate with the National Academy of Sciences, American Institute of Electrical Engineers and the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education will consist of:

- E. W. Rice, Jr., Honorary Chairman.  
A. H. Jackson, Vice-President.  
W. R. Whitney, Director and Re-

## "THE SMALL COLLEGE" SUBJECT OF BULLETIN

**Resume Given of Recent Rollins College Bulletin; Acting President Sprague Writes on "The Small College—The Ideal Educational Institution."**

In a recent Rollins College bulletin on "The Small College—The Ideal Educational Institution," Acting President R. J. Sprague wrote as follows:

"President Harding, speaking recently of higher education in America, said: 'It is the small college that democratizes the higher education; that brings it within the vision and the means of the average man and woman. Here, too, the student finds that intimate association with his instructors which is impossible in the greatest universities. We hear much of the traditions of famous universities, but if we look into them we commonly find that they concern men, men who have stamped their personalities, who have given of their generous natures, who have colored the intellectual atmosphere about them. And men who are big and strong enough to do that are as likely to be found in the modest as in the impressive environment.'"

"Andrew Carnegie, whose great gifts to colleges, libraries, and foundations have doubled the worth of educational training many fold, has the following to say regarding the ideal form of college work: 'I have been looking largely into small colleges of late. I think that a young man who goes into a small college receives a better education than in a large one.'"

"Let us outline a few of the advantages of the small college, which is at the same time large enough to constitute a good working unit for collegiate progress.

#### (A) Student and Professor Meet

"In the small college the student usually comes into direct contact with the professor or head of the department and gets experience from men of experience; whereas, in the big universities the actual class and laboratory work is carried on by young instructors, while the older and experienced

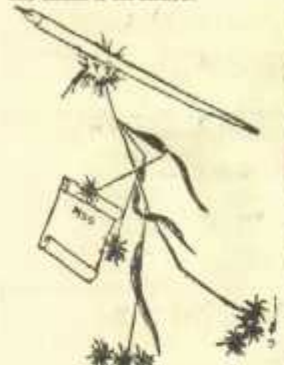

 Other prizes to be awarded under the terms of the Foundation are as follows: \$11,000 in prizes for the most signal contributions by employees of the General Electric Company toward the increase of its efficiency or progress in the electrical art; a Gold Medal for the public utility operating company within the United States which, during the year, has made the greatest contribution towards increasing the advantages of the use of electric light and power. The company receiving the medal will also receive \$1,000 for its Employees Benefit or similar fund. There will also be a gold medal for the Electric Railway Company, which has made similar contributions in its field.

The foundation is being established in recognition of the services to the electrical industry of Mr. Charles A. Coffin founder and creator of the General Electric Company, who recently retired from its active leadership at the age of 78.
