## CAMPAIGN BEING WAGED RESTORATION LOUVAIN

Institutions of Higher Learning  
To Be Asked to Aid in the  
Coming Campaign.

(By American Committee for Restoration of Louvain University.)

New York City, Jan. 11.—Hunter College, with a pledge of \$2,500, is the first institution of higher education in the United States to announce a contribution to the campaign for completion of the \$1,000,000 fund for restoration of Louvain University.

New York State College, Albany, also has made a pledge to the fund, \$1,000 for one of the fifty bells which form the carillon in the tower of the restored library.

Renewal of the campaign for America's war memorial in Belgium was begun in New York State December 2. Since that date, both the college of the City of New York University have been making canvasses for the fund which have not yet been completed.

The campaign in New York extends not only into the universities and colleges, but into all the public schools of the state. An estimate made from reports already received indicates the public schools of New York City alone will contribute \$25,000 toward restoring the famous library.

Universities and colleges in other states will participate in the campaign during the early months of 1923.

The national committee is headed by Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, and has as members many of the best known educators of the United States.

## MIAMI "Y" BASKETBALL TEAM DEFEATS LOCALS

### INTERNATIONAL GAME RESULTS IN LOCAL WIN

Blue and Gold Pipskin Chasers Defeat U. of Havana Team by 80 to 0 Score; New Year's Day Landslide in Miami Has Large Audience in Attendance.

Scoring a 80 to 0 win against the gridiron team representing the University of Havana (Cuba) in Miami New Year's Day the locals completed one of the most successful athletic wars ever staged by a Rollins College team.

Before the largest crowd that has ever witnessed a football game south of Atlanta, the Blue and Gold footballers fought their Cuban rivals to a standstill in the New Year's Day clash, though it can only be said that the eleven hailing from the University of Havana stayed with their opponents during the entire fray, never giving up the ship until the last whistle had sounded for the close of the day's hostilities.

The Rollins eleven displayed the best interference work of the entire season in the New Year's Day post-season exhibition. On each and every play started by the Rollins eleven from three to five men would get on interference work for the runner. Then again the defensive work of the local pipskin chasers was just a bit of proof of what the Tar supporters have been boasting of all year long—that the Rollins Tars have possessed a wonderfully efficient defensive fighting force.

International football again reigns in Florida football circles. With the New Year's Day game the rivalry that had existed between Cuba and Florida for football supremacy has again been established and each year will no doubt see the local aggregation fighting with the University of Havana eleven in a test of the prowess of the two institutions' football eleven in Miami on New Year's Day, though the university team was defeated a few weeks before they tackled the Tars by the Cuban Athletic Club by the score of 24 to 6, and the Cuban Athletic Club nosed out the Tampa American Legion team on Jan. 7 by the score of 13 to 0. It will be remembered by local supporters that the Rollins team and the Tampa American Legion team fought for an hour during the 1922 season on the Tampa gridiron with neither team being able to push the oval across their opponent's goal line.

The playing of Seeds and Wulf for the Blue and Gold defenders outshone the work of their partners perhaps, although it was a noticeable fact that the entire Rollins team was there with the goods at all stages of the fray. From end to end in the forward line and the entire backfield squad the Rollins eleven played football as it should be played, sport writers covering the game agreeing that the Rollins team displayed a smooth working combination during the entire contest.

Campanzo, the Cuban fullback, was all the works for the University of Havana eleven. Coming to Miami highly touted as a fast man, this cunning backfield man working for the Sky Blue of the University of Havana, was the only backfielder that seemed to know what to do and what he was able to do came only through his ability to twist, sidestep and stiff arm all "on his own." This star for the Cuban aggregation

### Night of January 2nd Sees Fast Game Go to Miamians by a Score of 21 to 20

Miami, Fla., Jan. 11.—Defeating the Rollins College quintet here Jan. 2, by the score of 21 to 20 the local Y. M. C. A. basketball squad continued on its winning rampage, the locals having been undefeated for the past two seasons. From whistle to whistle the battle was nip and tuck. Neither team could get away to a commanding lead and both were in the first several times during the struggle. Faster pass work and better following through of long shots turned the tide to the Miami squad, which was forced to go at top speed all the way through the contest, however.

Two fouls in rapid succession at the start gave Miami the chance to score first, but Turner missed both goals and then Thomas who starred throughout the contest for the Rollins aggregation, caged the ball for the Blue and Gold quint only to have the score knotted almost immediately. From then on it was thrill after thrill which crowded the Y. M. C. A. court as it never was crowded before, the thrilling events pulled during the progress of the game keeping the local fans on their feet throughout the contest.

Schneidman tossed three field goals for Miami, but Thomas matched every one of them. Ring's two goals and four successful free throws by Turner were sufficient to enable the Y. M. C. A. to end the first half with a 14 to 12 lead.

Center Turner was the Y. M. C. A. star in the second half. He tossed a basket just as the final period got under way and the lead was held throughout the half. Turner added two more field goals and also caged one while the best Rollins could do merely left the "Y" one point in the lead.

Just before the game closed Guard Emery, for Rollins, dribbled down the floor, blocked off a guard with one hand and shot a basket from the side with his other hand, making the score 21 to 20, but the game ended before the five could break through for a score again.

Passing of the Y. M. C. A. featured throughout. Rollins was a bit slower in getting its passing going but soon had a fast attack unleashed.



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

run through the entire Tar team on one occasion, only to be brought to earth by the Tar safety man, Ray Colado, after he had bladed, by a pretty piece of hecken field running, the entire Rollins carbolic defence. This run by Campuzano brought the ball to the Tars' 45 yard line, the nearest approach to the Tar goal line the Cuban squad made during the contest.

Displaying perhaps the best pass formation that the Tars struck during the season's warfare the Cubans a bit surprised the Tars. If the intended receivers of the attempted passes by the Cuban backs had been of a less nervous nature it is an assured fact the Havanians would have gotten away for some nice gains via the air route.

Passes by the Tars and then some more passes, the major number of them of the old stoic-string formation, wrought havoc in the Havana force. Time after time a Tar back or a wingman would creep over to the sidelines "unobserved save by the spectators, the officials and the Rollins team" and would get away for a long gain by the use of the aerial game.

All in all, though, it was a good game, inasmuch as it was the only international game to be waged in the South this season. As the main attraction of the Miami New Year's Day celebration the game was a success, and Cuban backers as well as the Tar followers, who made a pilgrimage to Miami for the game, were well pleased with the game.


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
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
