dear and well beloved bro: in the Lord Jesus
Christ: in whom our unity standeth, ^{and} lasting fellow-
ships in which we are nearly related, and brotherly
love that floweth forth one towards another
in which I dearly salute thee, with thy dear wife
son and daughter, and the rest of thy family by
these thou may understand I am yearly, at present
blessed to the name of the Lord, I have had a room
for some time but now better, we came into the
Citty last evening, we think we may stay here
a week or ten days, and then to London the Lord
will I desire thee to send me some cloathes that
I could thy dear wife off, chiefly a coat and
a yard of broadness, I would have them sent by
the first, I am troubled with my cloathes now
the weather now being hot, I hope to be at
London in three weeks time, I visit and where
I may find them, fustian millers I think to
budge I need not say more, but my love to
all friends that may inquire after me, friends
generally are well, as we have travelled
we hope that the Lawes is to be yet in en-
quiry, but the Lord judges and knows all these
things, and what ever he may permit to come
to pass, it will work to gather for good to them
that love him, and his name, and ye shall
be exalted, and his glory renowned, throu-
ghout, and many shall be gathered to the
brightness of his rising who is over all god
blessed for ever, so with my love to thee
and friends I rest thy friend and Bro:
