Dear and well beloved, friend and Brother, whom  
the Lord hath honored, and Crowned, in his eternal  
power, and who shall take it from thee, blessed be his  
name for ever, my life is bound up with thee, and  
some flowers unto thee, and I am knit unto thee <sup>in</sup>  
inseparably, in that life and fellow-ship of the  
gospel, of grace which the Lord hath made us  
akers of in which our unity stands, and we are  
fellow feelers one of another, and in the strength  
of my fathers love, I dearly embrace thee, and cord-  
ially salute thee, thin I did and was verie glad  
to hear of thy dear wife Edward, whom I  
dearly love, the Lord prolong her days with my  
soul, and all for was glad to hear of thy good  
earnings at Liver pool, a amongst friends things  
thou art very quiet, and we have had a blessed  
heavenly meeting for six days now together  
and it is not yett ended, the Lords power has gone  
over all, I did not know that ever I saw such a  
multitudes of people, last first day it was reported  
that all our meetings would be broken up  
by 11. and 12. and I was at graving street, where  
there was said to be more 4 thousand people  
and not a tongue lift up against us, Roger Hay-  
was at dawn five hours, and officers took him  
out, of the meeting and told him go, and at the  
same time took some names, and that was all,  
and ever day since we have had meetings  
quiet, and the Lord is with, and who shall set  
nails against us, magnified be his power for  
our word, Roger Haydock and I was with William  
this morning, and he read thy letter, and gave it to me  
again, to give to shillcocke, and said if there were  
any place yett left. y<sup>e</sup>. y<sup>e</sup>. should have a place, and  
if he came to him he should not want a place, he was  
in hast going to wingworth, and desired us to come



to him again when he came home again, and this day I have  
brought with me a board and given him the letter, and he has  
promised that he shall have a year, and that his year  
should be the floor board, and with Gibson to him on his  
account, and also to James Clay, you'll that he should  
have a year, I have bought him, a grove of buttons of the  
best I can get the price is five shillings six pence the will  
come in Robert Haydock's goods, I have not been with George  
Green, as yet, I may take an opportunity on the fourth day  
and give him account, and thus far I have answered your  
letters, and what further I can give me account, I am will-  
ing to serve my friends, in what I can, I think to stay in  
town till the later end of the next week, and then go  
towards Colchester, it may be I may go over to Holland  
I do not know of any secret. Geo. Green for I have not mind  
time if I go there yearly meeting begins on the fourth day  
come two weeks, let me hear from you, direct to Stephen  
Criss at Colchester if not before, for with my love to  
you all in the good that blest for ever, I remain
