Settle the 5<sup>th</sup> mo 1682

Dear Brother Longborth, I deeply beloved & every way esteemed  
in the truly my life, greet thee & my love Salutes here  
in the Court of life; & in love my heart is enlarged  
towards thee & I leave and thou come in this my  
separation, this day we are for sailing in vessel  
aboard, I need not have been right glad of thy com-  
pany, if the Lord had so ordered, it but being it is  
otherwise we must be content; we are all  
well & leave the country very rapidly, can say we  
find the Lord's people amongst us, but our melting  
heart breaking love is over & beyond what we  
can express to many friends have been willing  
to take leave of us, & I am glad we are many under-  
=way, & many do declare the satisfaction in seeing  
us; only a desire of our company if it did come  
so ordered, & the seeing of friends is more to us than  
any thing we leave behind us, we shall be glad  
to have a few lines from thee when thou hast an  
opportunity; we desire thy supplications to the Lord  
on our behalf, that we may be preserved in a  
sense of his goodness & worthy of his love; & that  
our exercises both by sea & land may be sanctified  
to us, so we kiss of Andrew & my wife father  
& mother do most dearly salute thee, & in the  
Army of Ireland love do most dearly salute thee  
& in much love & tenderness love our dear love of  
thee; & being in much haste shall conclude thus in  
much love
