This play had a most successful and lengthy run in New York, and is always well received. It will be presented by members of the graduating class of the college of Liberal Arts. The plot hinges on the activities of a young doctor who attempts, with the aid of a pretty young nurse, to cure a patient of jealousy. In due time the doctor finds that he is himself in need of the jealous cure, but "all's well that ends well" and everyone is made happy. The comedy is of the contagious kind and it is believed it will be thoroughly enjoyed by all those who attend.

A large factor in the success and growth of the Stetson Conservatory of Music during the college year 1926-27 has been the addition to the Faculty of Mr. Paul Geddes for the Voice Department, and of Mr. John Rosser in the Violin Department. These gentlemen are well-known both for their success as performers and their ability as instructors.

The ever increasing activities of the Conservatory of Music are further indicated by the fact that it is giving thirteen Recitals during the present Spring Term. There will be three candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Music this year, one in Piano and two in

Organ. Each graduate will give an entire Recital, playing in an artistic manner such compositions as Schumann's Symphonic Etudes, Chopin's Nocturne Op. 48, No. 1, and the Fledermaus Paraphrase by Strauss-Schutt, for Piano, and equally representative compositions for the Organ.

The programs to be given on May 26th and May 27th will equal if not surpass the artistic standards of the past, all departments being well represented. In the Piano Department there is keen competition among the students of the Elementary and Intermediate grades for the honor of a place on the program. This year the following piano Concertos will be heard: Haydn's D Major, Mendelssohn's g Minor and Poldini's Venetian Scenes (for Piano and Orchestra). By request the Tschaikowski b flat Minor Concerto will this year be repeated, Professor Duckwitz at second piano. The Violin students will play the Seiss Concerto in g Minor and the Ninth Concerto by De Beriot.

Never has the Voice Department been so well represented. The Arias—Il Prologue from I Pagliacci by Leon Cavallo, Mon Coeur s'ouvre a ta voix from Samson et Dalila by Saint Saens, Vissi d'Arte from Tosca by Puccini and also selections from Schumann, Brahms, Massenet and Debussy, which will be sung this Spring, give some idea of the strength of this department.

Stetson's new Organ, in which we are justly proud, will have a prominent place on this program.

Music Certificates will be presented at the close of the Recital on May 27th.
