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From Nottingham 12: <sup>th</sup> May 1696

Landing, besides after my kind love & remembrance unto thy self and children, & longing of your  
Health, I was as far as Wm Dicks House, without intent to see thee at home, but being caught by  
Joseph Hurby, of my disappointment, if at this time I should venture down, thy self being as far as  
the ferry house. And I had not much courage to venture over the sea, but over this day heard don it upon  
some occasion with W Dicks, but cannot now spare time, to come so low, so much take the Will for the Dead  
But this comes at this time, upon a further Suit, than this last information, and tis to solicit a Sum of  
£1000 a Sum of Parliament accordingly, and when canst do more that favour us to help me, I not  
only will give, what thou please for it, but as I knowe thy regard therein - my occasion at present  
is present is something urgent, and if I cannot get a little Parliament I shall lose it - And if at any  
time hereafter, when an opportunity presents, I might offer for sale, if will be so kind as buy  
for me 3 or 4 shillings a  $\frac{1}{2}$  doz of the Quaint Will board it - and half a doz of Royal paper  
at any time when need is without at Philadelphia, shall hand thy moneys again, and thy kindnes not  
forgotten, I cannot now write any more, the post goes on my Dicks Will

Deare Dick will need to remember his love to thee & thine. And desires opportunity serving to send  
him his two little Books viz: Seder Olem, & Paper - he had thought to have hand some  
over, but something or other, always intervenes

I Am now dead thy kindnes for sending me T Edward, but send my best wishes - till  
to thee, - and now no more but so: thine Love, from thy friend W Dicks

May p Capt to favour me with a line  
whenever it comes to hand
