Then off to their slumbers they go.

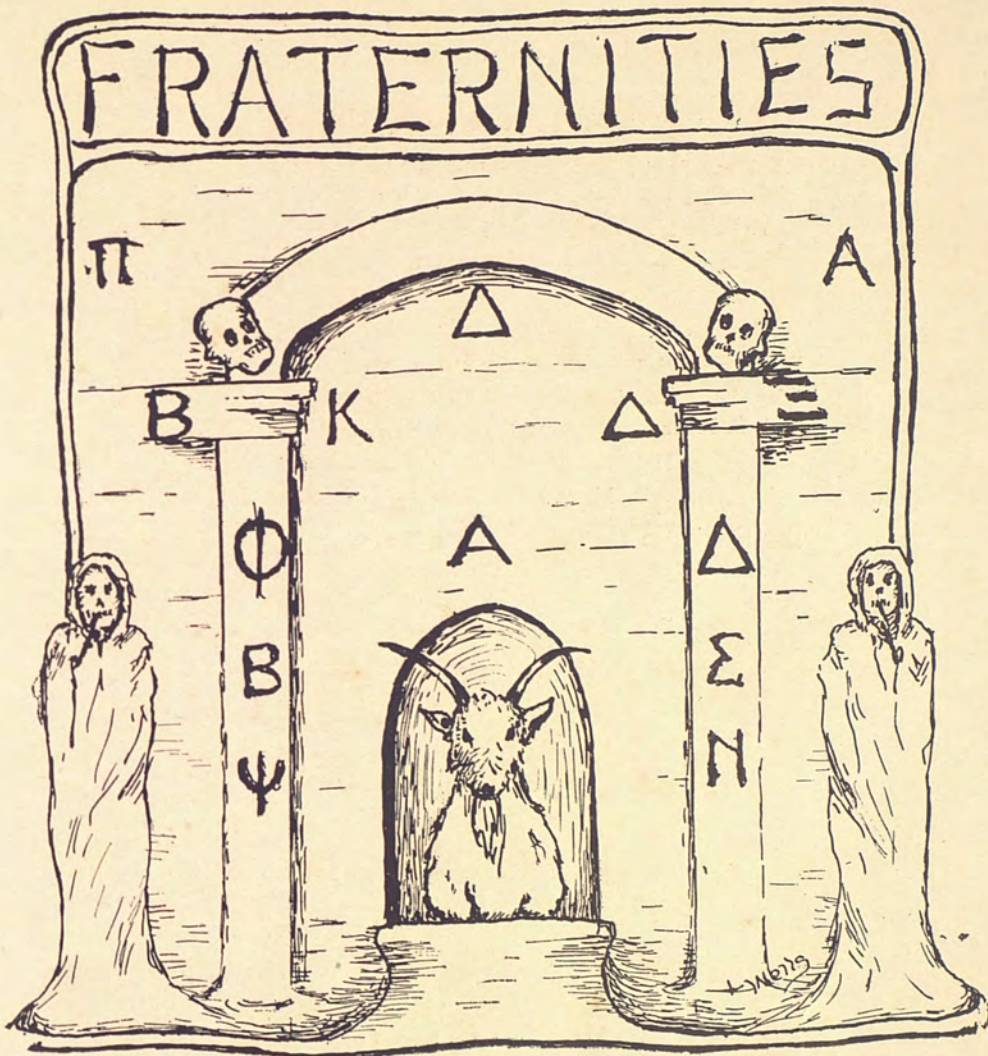

When this country became involved in the greatest war the world has ever known, the Young Men's Christian Associations in the colleges throughout the nation were called upon to render a service in their respective college communities, and to the nation, under circumstances hitherto unknown. At the nation's call to the colors, a great many of the older college students answered the call of duty, and thereby left the Y. M. C. A. handicapped by having a number of young, poorly trained leaders to take their places in the work of the Association. Not only in this respect were they handicapped; but we find students in such an excited and unsettled condition due to the war, that it became very hard to focus their attention on the work and service of the Young Men's Christian Association.

Yet, in spite of these conditions, which characterized not only Stetson University, but perhaps every college throughout the nation, we have been able to co-operate with the other institutions of the South in raising their share of the \$35,000,000 war work fund, to be used in upholding the moral standards of our training camps, and to render an almost indispensable service in the trenches and prison camps of Europe. A service that had been recognized as so important that Gen. Pershing sent back word to the American people: "The very best possible thing that the American people can do at this time is to extend the work of the Young Men's Christian Association throughout the entire French Army."

Further than this, the Stetson Y. M. C. A. is proud to say that out of those that have taken an active part in the work of the Association there have gone several Army Y. M. C. A. Secretaries, who are now rendering their services in the army camps at home and abroad. Men who are unselfishly giving their lives to uphold that moral factor in army life, which Napoleon said was three times as important as the physical.

Perhaps the greatest service that the Y. M. C. A. is called upon to render in the college community in this present world crisis, is to uphold the moral condition of the student body, keeping before their minds those Christian principles as taught by the Master, so that when they are called into the service of the army and navy and are free from the restraints of the college and the home, they will be able to meet the great temptations that they are sure to meet in army life. Temptations that are almost sure to overcome them and wreck both their physical and moral nature unless they are especially prepared to resist them. Had it not been for the Christian standards and high moral ideals of Stetson students, the hearty co-operation of the churches and Sunday Schools of DeLand, the Y. M. C. A. would have fallen far short of rendering this great service.

While the Stetson Y. M. C. A. has not done all that it should have done, yet it has added in some little way to the other instrumentalities and influences which have upheld the moral life of Stetson University. It has kept in constant touch with the International Association, and in 1917 sent six delegates to the Southern Student Conference at Blue Ridge, North Carolina, where over four hundred of the leading men in the Southern colleges met under the leadership of world-wide authorities to learn ways and methods of rendering service in their respective college communities.

## Military Drill at Stetson

When Stetson opened last September we missed many of the boys, who did not return to school, but who had joined various branches of our country's forces, enlisted for the war. Those who came back to school were enthusiastic in organizing a military company at Stetson, to receive training while continuing their studies.

As soon as matters could be arranged an organization was formed. It consisted of about ninety men, separated into two companies of nearly equal numbers. Under the efficient direction of Major Lowe and Captain Shallene, the men were instructed in the rudiments of military tactics. The companies drilled on alternate days, in the afternoons at first. Some of the men wanted to have morning drill, therefore the companies were reorganized, still drilling on alternate days, but one set in the morning and the other in the afternoon.

This practice was soon abandoned, however, and afternoon drill for everybody was resumed. The two companies were then put to drilling at the same time, and a friendly rivalry stimulated the interest in the work. When the men became more proficient in marching and squad formations, they were given good practice in marching up and down the street.

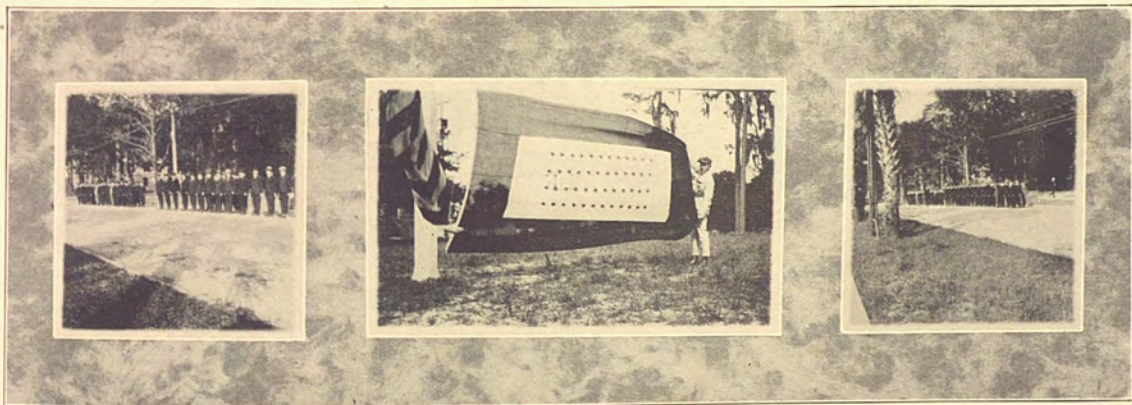
The reputation of the Stetson cadets soon spread, and a request was made by a moving picture concern that it be allowed to take motion pictures of the boys drilling. This was done. For nearly two hours one afternoon the military companies went through their formations and practiced marching, while the camera men took the pictures.

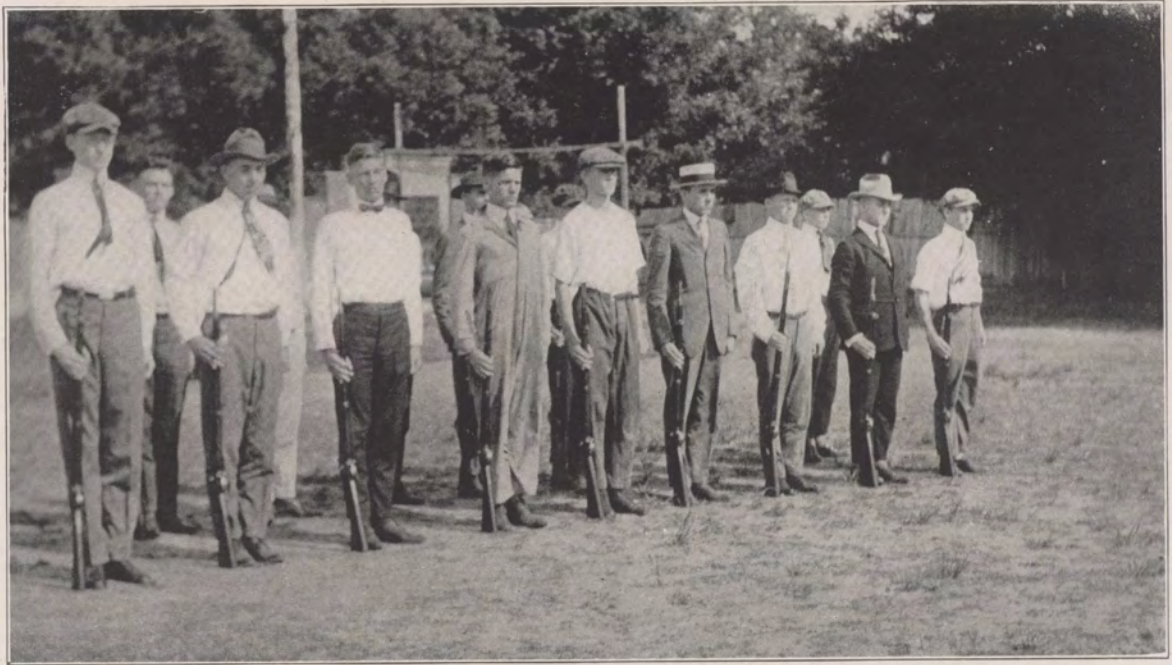
As soon as more skill was acquired, the men were put through fanning-

out movements and setting up exercises. Day after day the students marched, along the boulevard and across and around the athletic field. Word was received from several of the boys who left during the year to join the army, that the military training they had received at Stetson was of the greatest value to them in the training camps.

Finally, the manual of arms was taken up. The boys were taught how to handle their guns, and to develop quick and accurate thinking in carrying out the commands. Many of the boys left Stetson at various times during the year to join our country's fighting forces, and among those who remained, a strong spirit of patriotism prevailed, and a determination to fit themselves for the time when they, too, might be called upon to fight for their country.

## BASEBALL

Owing to the fact that Stetson followers have always ardently supported baseball, an inter-Fraternity league was immediately organized after the Christmas Holidays. Four clubs composed the league, namely, a team representing Phi Beta Psi Fraternity, one representing Sigma Nu Fraternity, one representing Phi Kappa Delta Fraternity, and a team represented by the non-Fraternity students.

According to the schedule each team was to play three games with each of the other three teams, making a total of nine games for each club. Also the games were to be played two each week, every Tuesday and Saturday, so as not to interfere with military drill.

The first game of the league was played by the teams representing the Phi Kappa Delta and the Sigma Nu Fraternities and resulted in the close score of 12-10 in favor of the former. This game proved a surprise to all for instead of seeing a lot of inexperienced players who had never before thrown a ball, the fans were treated to a clever game of baseball between players six of whom later became members of the Stetson Varsity.

The second game was played between the non-Fraternity and the Phi Beta Psi Clubs, resulting in an overwhelming defeat of the latter by the score 14-3. The non-Fraternity team was then picked by many to be the real contender and final winner of the pennant, but such was not to be, as events later proved.

The third game resulted in another overwhelming defeat of the Phi Beta Psis, this time at the hands of the Sigma Nu boys.

The next game naturally drew much attention and interest for the non-Fraternity and Phi Kaps had each won its only game played and were therefore earnestly desirous of maintaining its perfect record. After a hard and tense struggle the Phi Kaps finally demolished their opponents by the score of 3-0. This was the first shut-out game of the season. Hary Katz, pitching for the Phi

Kaps in this game, registered the first and only no-hit game of the league and incidentally one of the only three shut-out games, each of which were won by him.

The second milestone was the second game between the Phi Kaps and Sigma Nu. A glance at the Club standings at this time would have revealed the two leading clubs as follows: Phi Kappa Delta won 3, lost 0; Sigma Nu won 3, lost 1. In this game the Sigma Nus got away with an early start, scoring seven runs in the first inning and one run in each of the second, third, fifth and seventh innings, making a total of eleven runs. The best the Phi Kaps could do was to score seven runs and naturally went down into defeat and at this same time dropped from first to second place.

In the meantime the Phi Psis and non-Fraternity Clubs were battling hard for third place. The second game between these two teams resulted in a reversal of the decision, for the Phi Psis under Captain Joe Laing this time made his former victors bite the bitter pangs of defeat although the opposing pitcher received miserable support. At the playing of the third game between these two clubs a glance at the league standing would have revealed these two clubs recorded as follows: Phi Beta Psi won 1, lost 4; Non-Fraternity won 1, lost 4.

In the third game between these two clubs Orin Bassett and Eddie Gilliland opposed each other on the mound and each pitched splendid ball but again Gilliland failed to receive the proper support and again met defeat at the hands of the Laingites.

The announcement of the third and last game between the Phi Kaps and Sigma Nus created an immense amount of interest among both fans and players, for the winning of this game practically meant the cinching of the pennant for either team. At this time the Sigma Nu team had won five and lost one, while the Phi Kaps had won six and lost one, each team having lost one game to each other. But to can the frivolity we might just casually remark that the Junior Class is mighty well pleased with the records made by these boys, both in school and in that bigger field of activity to which they have gone.



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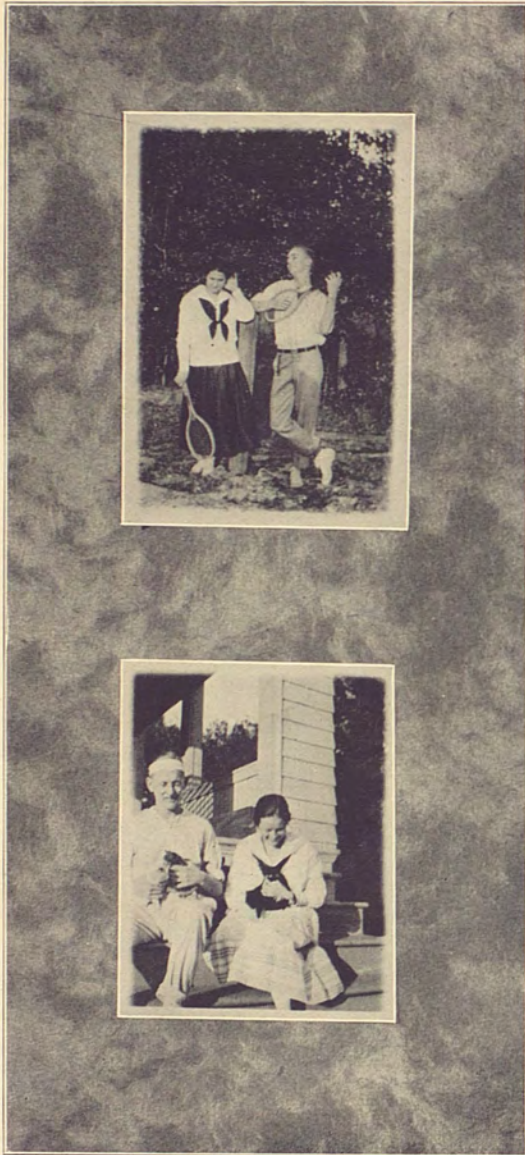
## Description of a Memorable Week-end
