Junior Law

This year brought to us a great number of lanky, short, broad, round individuals, deeply coated with the lucid color of bright green, thoroughly permeated with a most profound knowledge of law, but who, sad to relate, have remained to live and learn, to allow the accumulation of long years of egotistical introspection to wear gradually away, and who now humbled and meek before the mighty names of Blackstone and Kent, the sonorous phrases of the legal text-books, have come to the conclusion that the practice of the "Psychology of Education" is the only true solution of the problem of obtaining passing grades. This subject, or rather science, is twice blest; "It blesseth him that gives and him that takes." What professor versed in his "Child Mind," "Principles of Education," "The Intellect," does not sit back with enjoyment and watch his subject flow through the axones, neurones, ganglia, etc., into the cerebrum of the ready pupil, without a feeling of pride?

But it is not with this viewpoint however pleasing, that we deal, but with the opposing side, where there are numerous psychologists. True indeed, they have never published books on the subject but their knowledge is as subtle, as far reaching and as all inclusive as if their laws had been catalogued in text-books.

What psychologist is there of these unprofessing ones who does not know the fundamentals of getting good grades without much effort? Cannot a professor be drawn out on his favorite subject? Consider too, the timely appropriate laughter at jokes. All these and a thousand and one other tricks of the trade are so well known that it would be a waste of time to recount them here. No subject so deep, no professor so hard, but whose rules may be broken by someone who knows the simple art of the psychology of education.

Beware, oh beware, of the pupil who really studies. Let the professor remark of him as Caesar did of Cassius: "Yon student hath a lean and hungry look. He thinks too much. Such men are dangerous."

One thing is certain, the student who disdains to use psychology to get good grades seldom gets them. He is either a genius or a fool, i. e., he has found that he learns more by study, irrespective of grades, or else he has never learned the tricks of the trade.

Everyone has failures. Your favorite line may fail to impress the professor, but, assiduous student, despond not at this. It does not prove the science and the art a failure, because your psychology sometimes fails. Lo, another's works there to perfection. In the end you need never grieve, thinking that the day has come when an infallible professor has been found.

In conclusion, it can be said that education, like a sugarcoated pill, sometimes fails to reach the spot. What is needed is perhaps a little more of the bitter quinine of hard work which is supposed by geologists and historians to have existed in a former age. Both systems have evolved until now professor and pupil are adept in their respective lines. But whether the competition be viewed from one side or the other, let the guiding principle be always: "Caveat Professor."

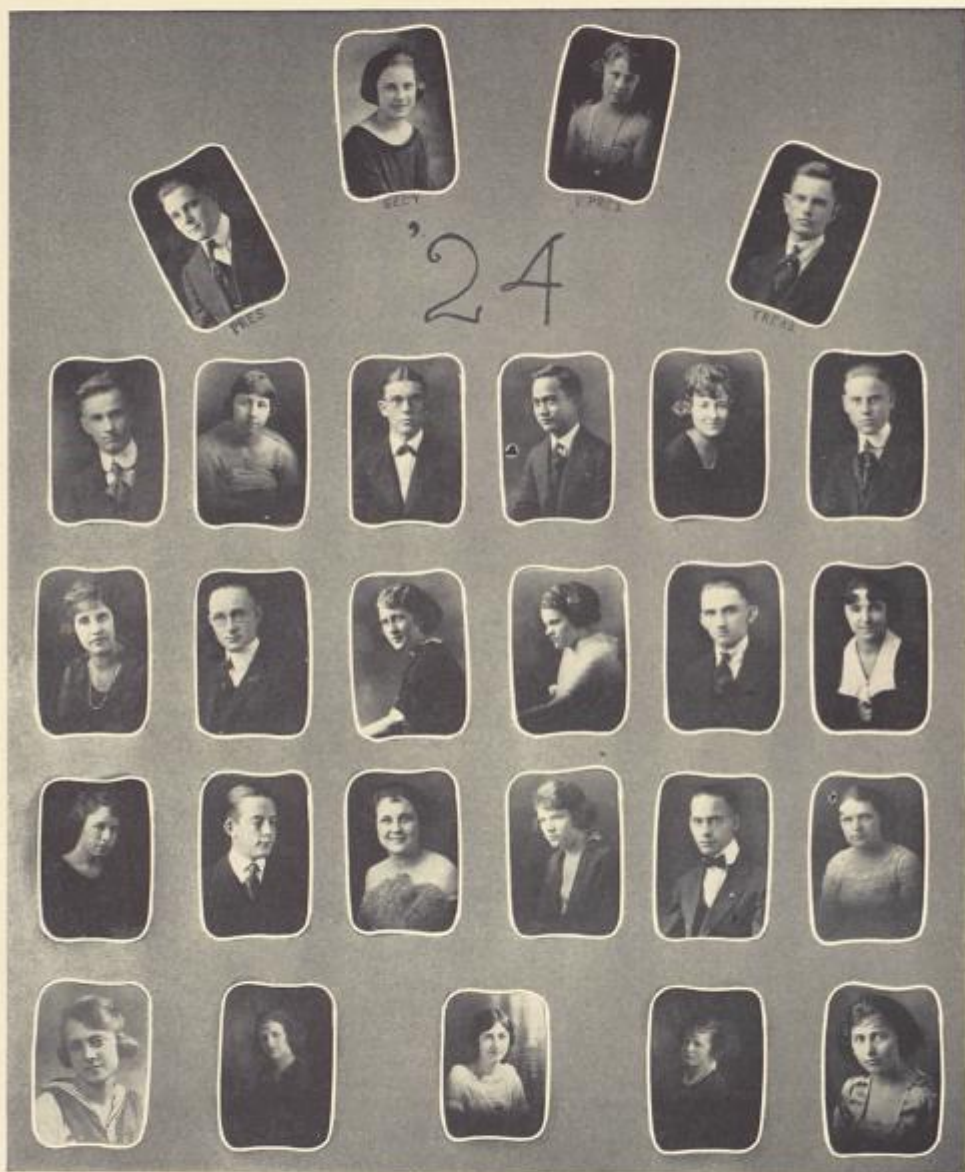

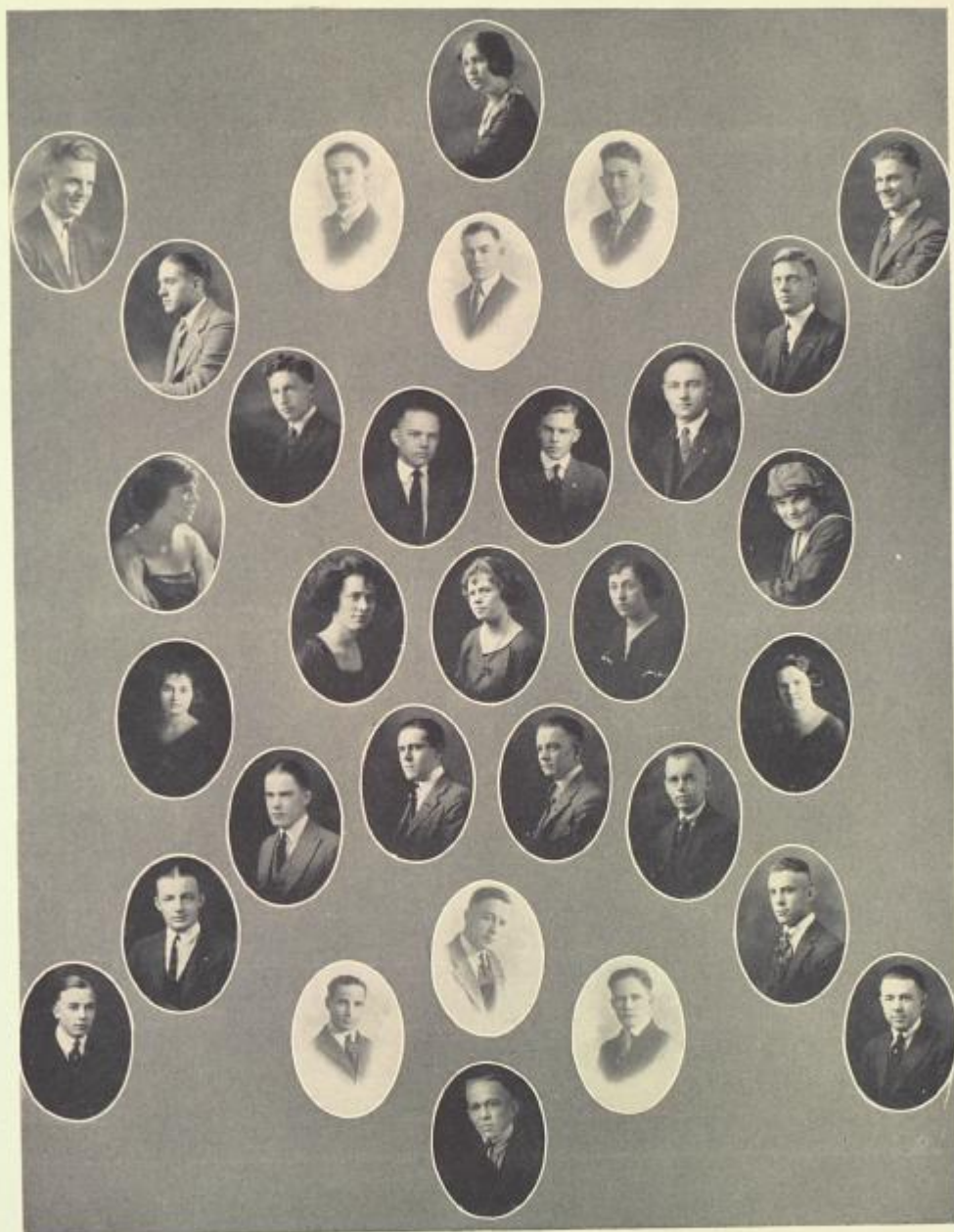

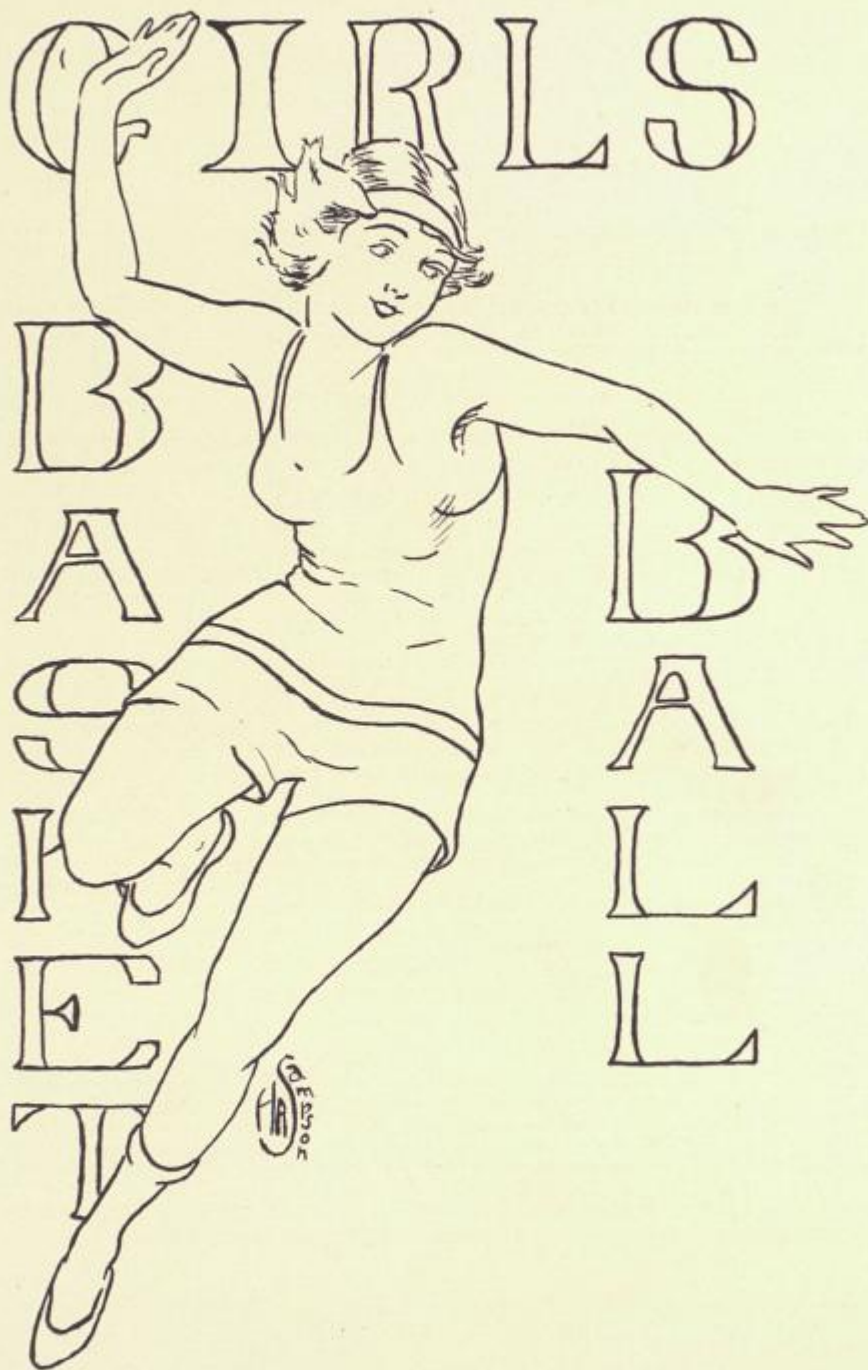
Foot Ball

No man has been brought up at the expense of the school, or anyone else, just to play football. Every man on the team has been a student first and then a football player.

So with the call of Coach "Pug" Allen for candidates last September, there answered a squad of huskies making bids for positions on the squad. With six letter men back, G. O. Rasco, Capt. Bob Davis, Leroy Leslie, Harold Schubiger, Theo Hon and W. R. Gunby, the prospects looked very bright. A great part of the material was green and long hard periods of strenuous coaching were necessary to fit these men for competition with other elevens.

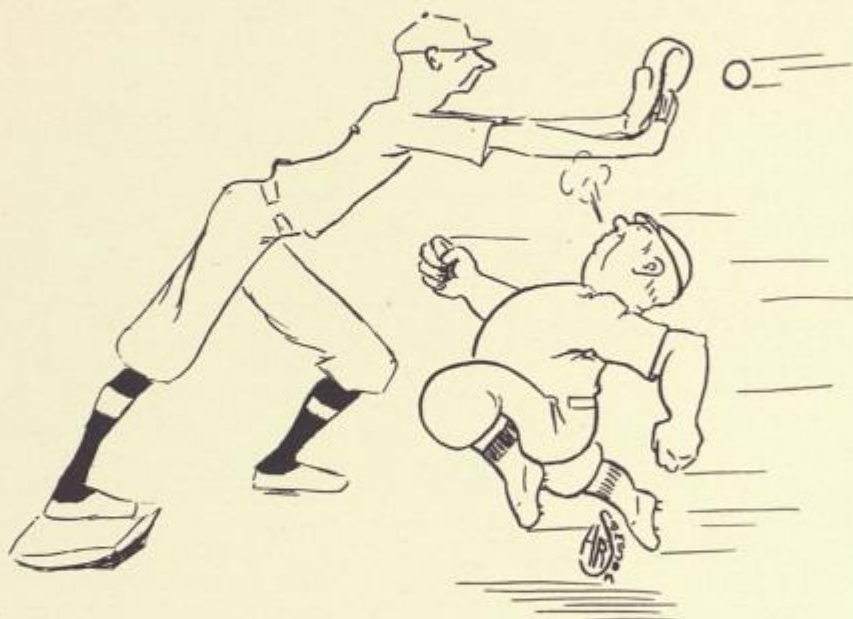
Our defensive play in all games was strong, the shooting of the forwards was exceptionally good, the passing accurate, and the guards could be counted upon to do their part.

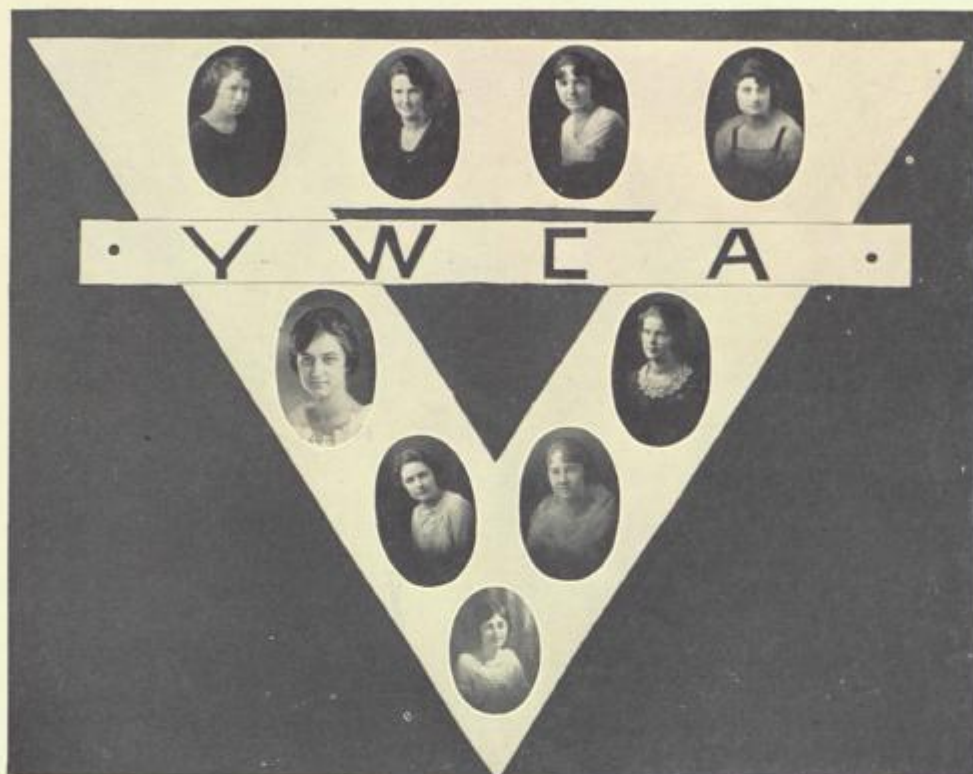
Y. M. C. A.

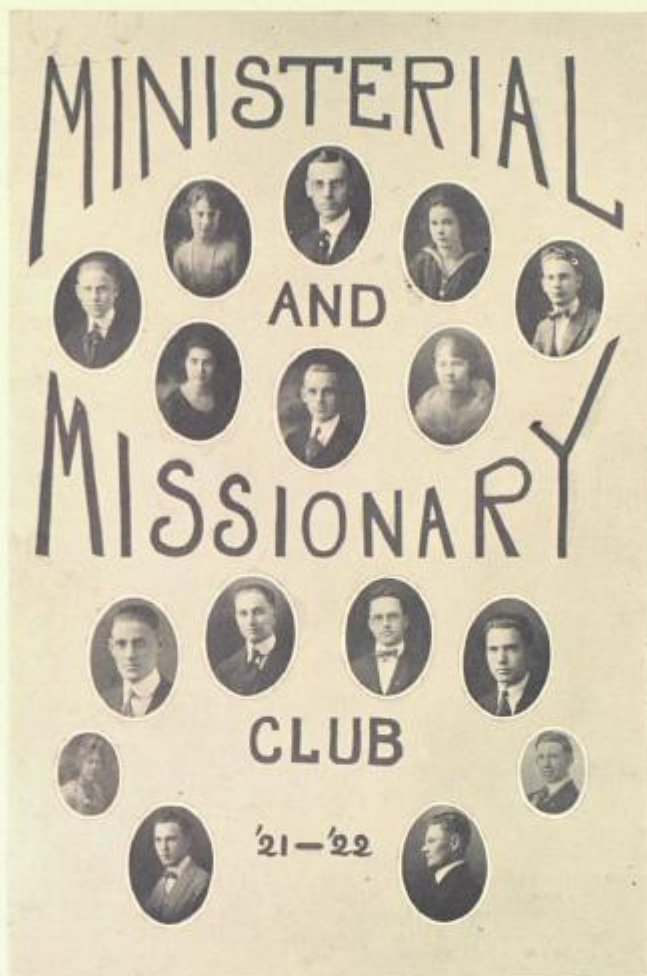

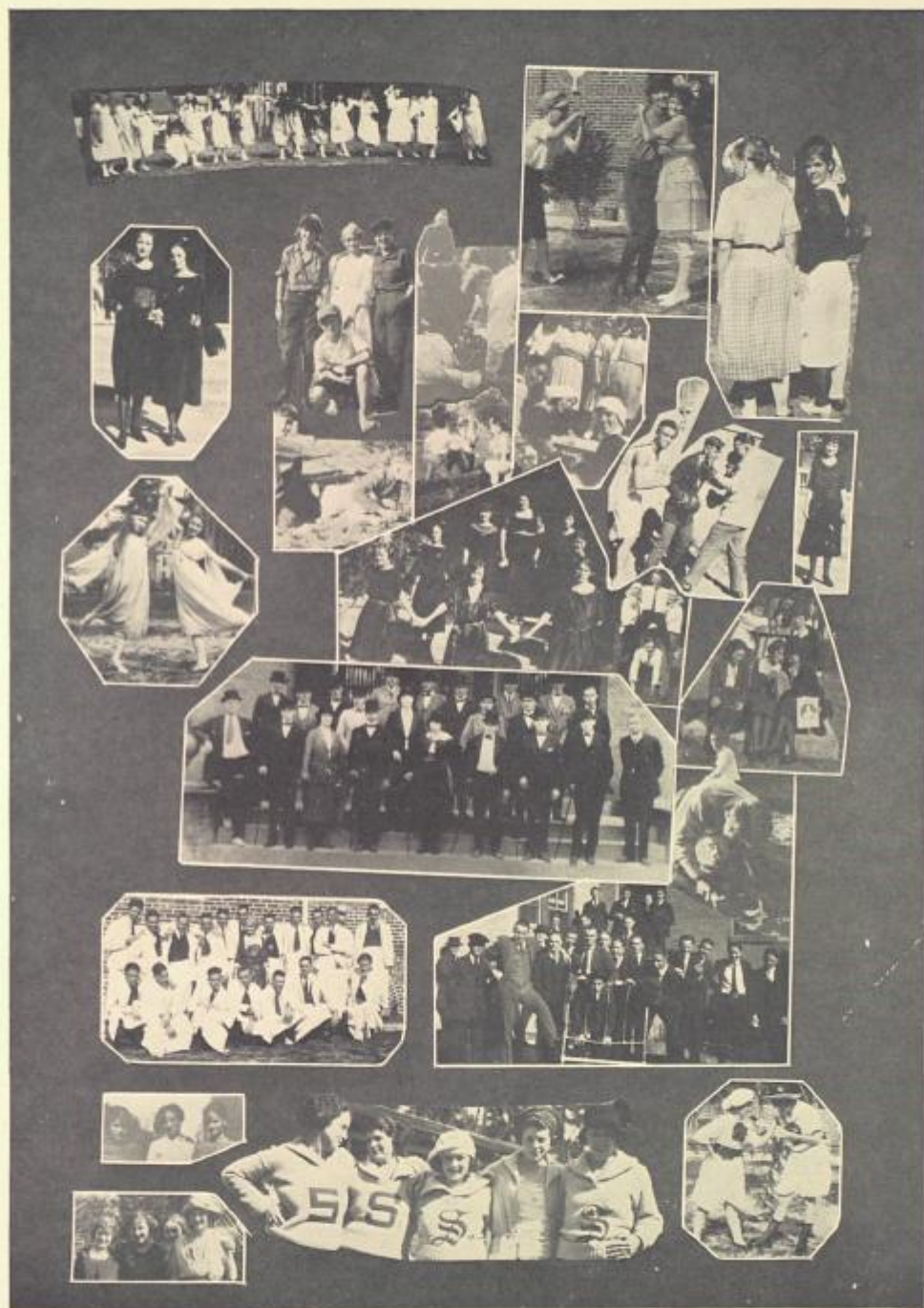

You see before you "Tony the Wop." Though he has the form of a man, he has scales like a fish.

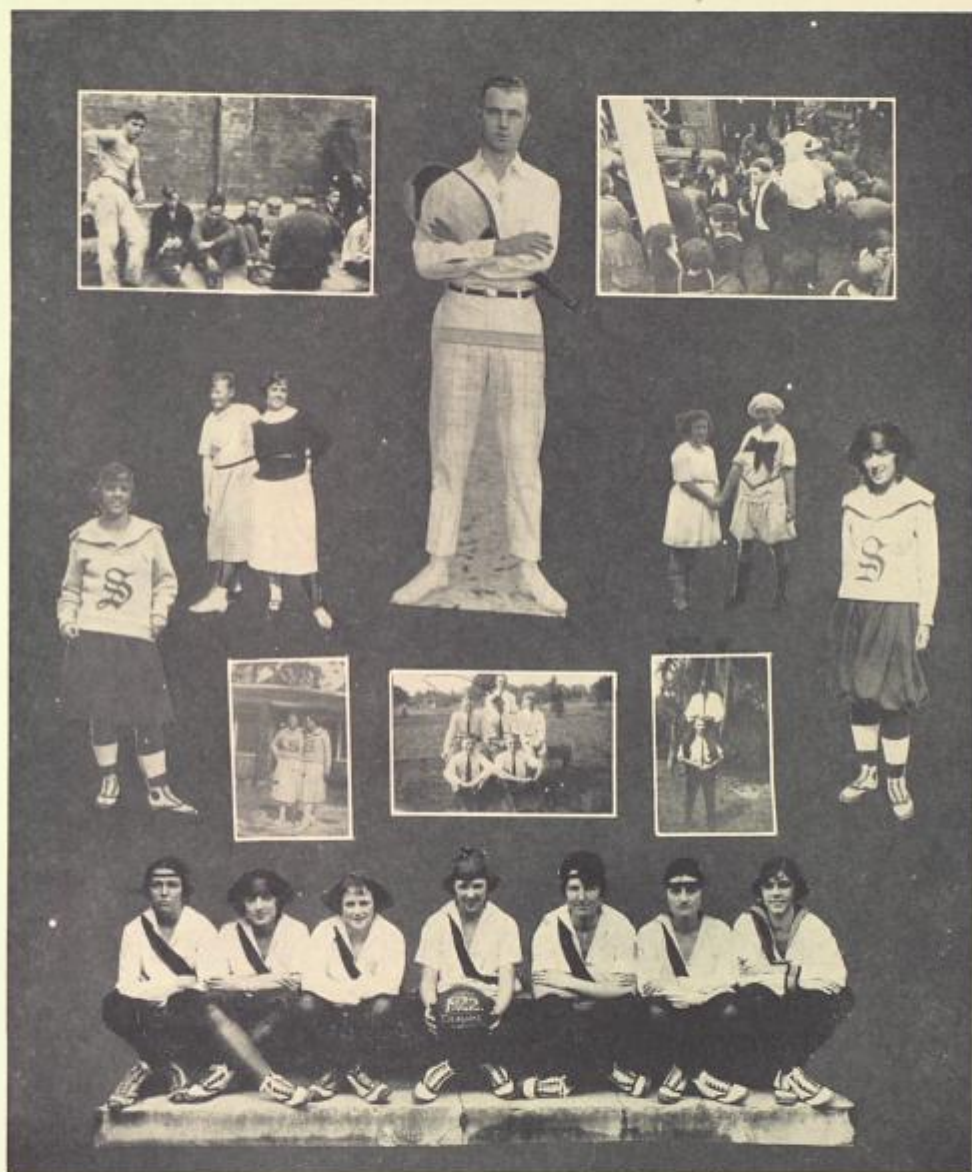

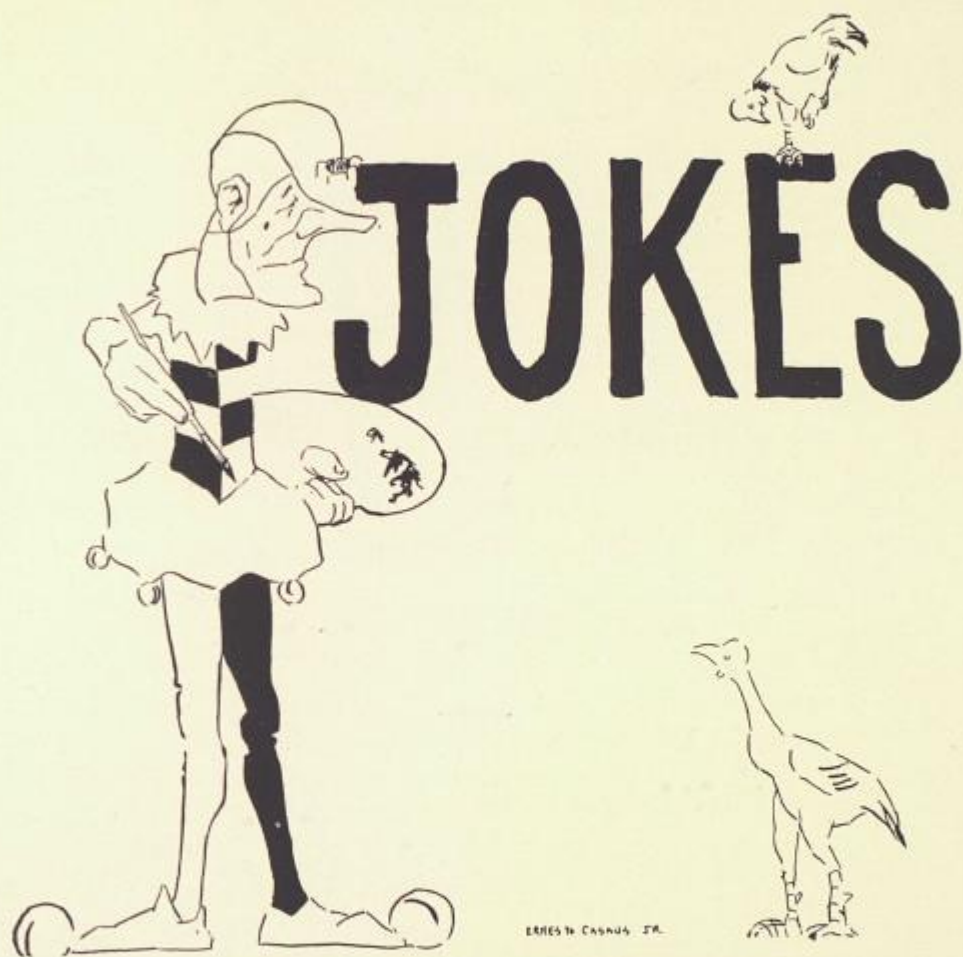

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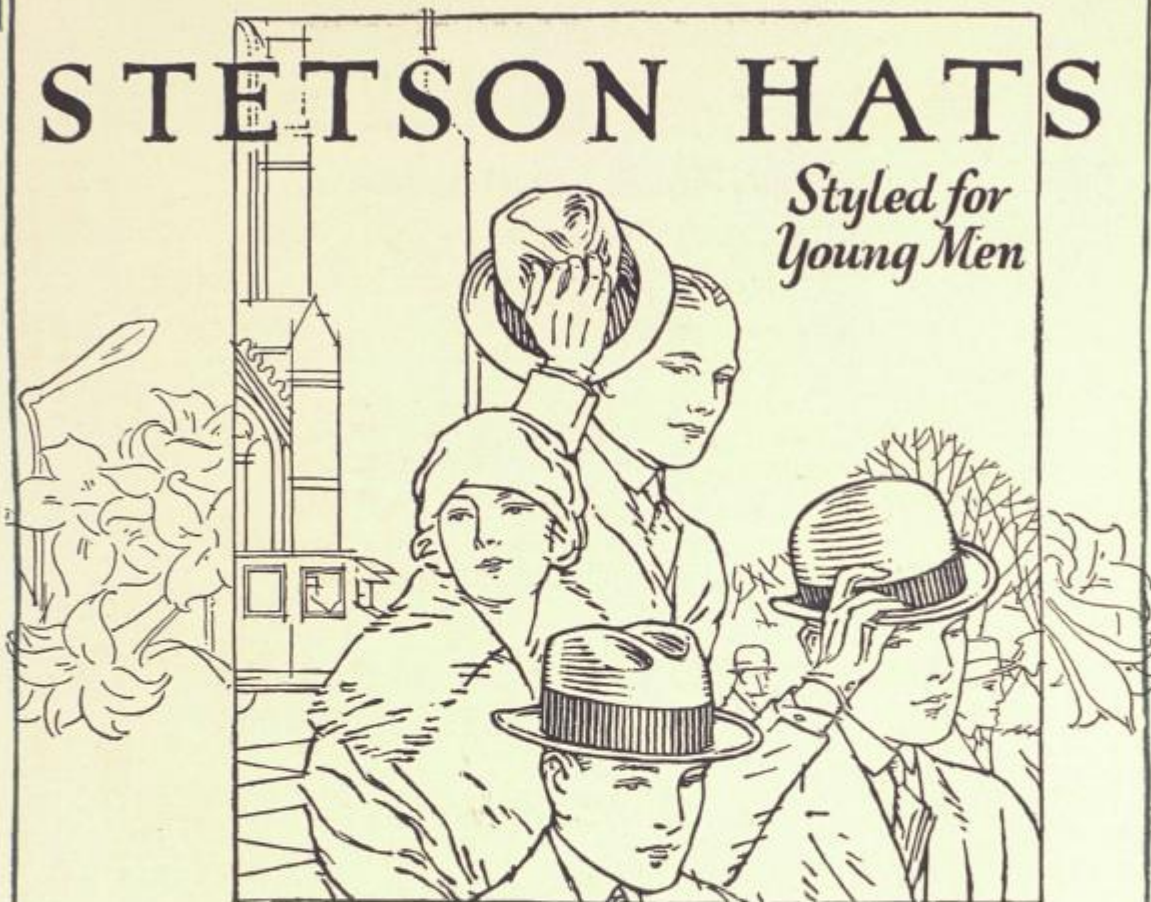
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
