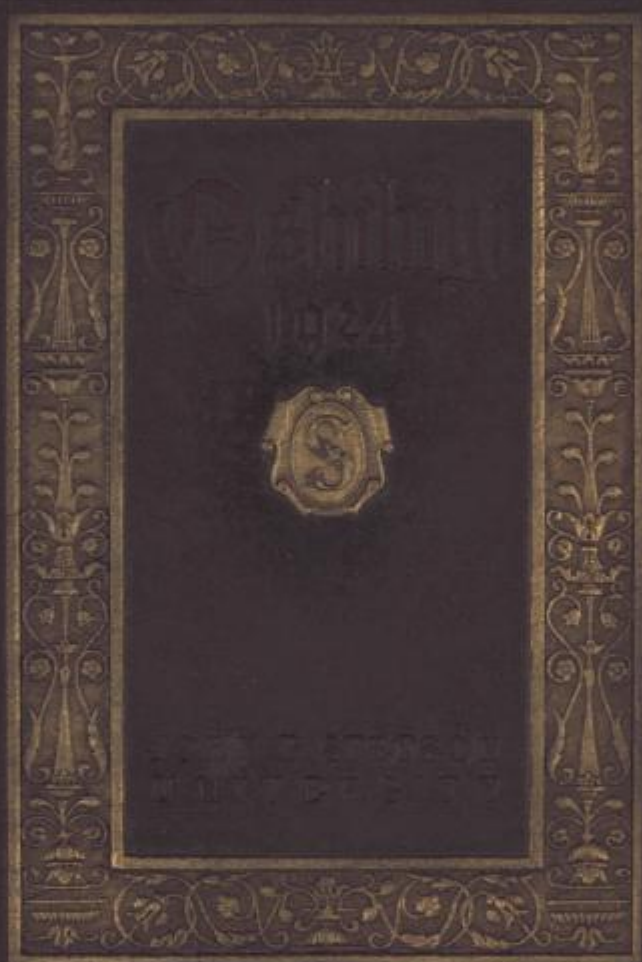

# Oshihiyi

"Oshihiyi" is the name the Red Man of Florida gave to the mocking bird singing of the beauty of the flowers and the loveliness of the breezes and the sunshine.

"Oshihiyi" is the name we give to the book that records the glories of our college life. The flowers and sunlight of Florida vitalize our experiences—but it is the communion of student with student and that unexplainable spirit which pervades all seekers of knowledge blended into one great purpose which gives us the real joy of living; and it is of this joy that our mocking bird sings.

The song that the "Oshihiyi" is singing in 1924 is the chorus that was started when the first class met in this "Athens of Florida" on the morning of November 5, 1883. It began as a single chord expressing the sentiment of Henry A. DeLand who visited this glorious part of our state and visualized its possibilities. The chord took on impetus and force as he called to his side John B. Stetson and others interested in his project. As he called instructors and students, the music began to express itself in their lives and thus to spread over the entire state in a number of harmonious chords.

Now the music is becoming a great chorus, ever growing sweeter, fuller, and more melodious, as it speaks in unmistakable words to the entire South-land "A bigger and better Stetson."

To the above standards all friends of Stetson and of higher education are invited to come. Yearly the college is graduating noble young men and women equipped for service.

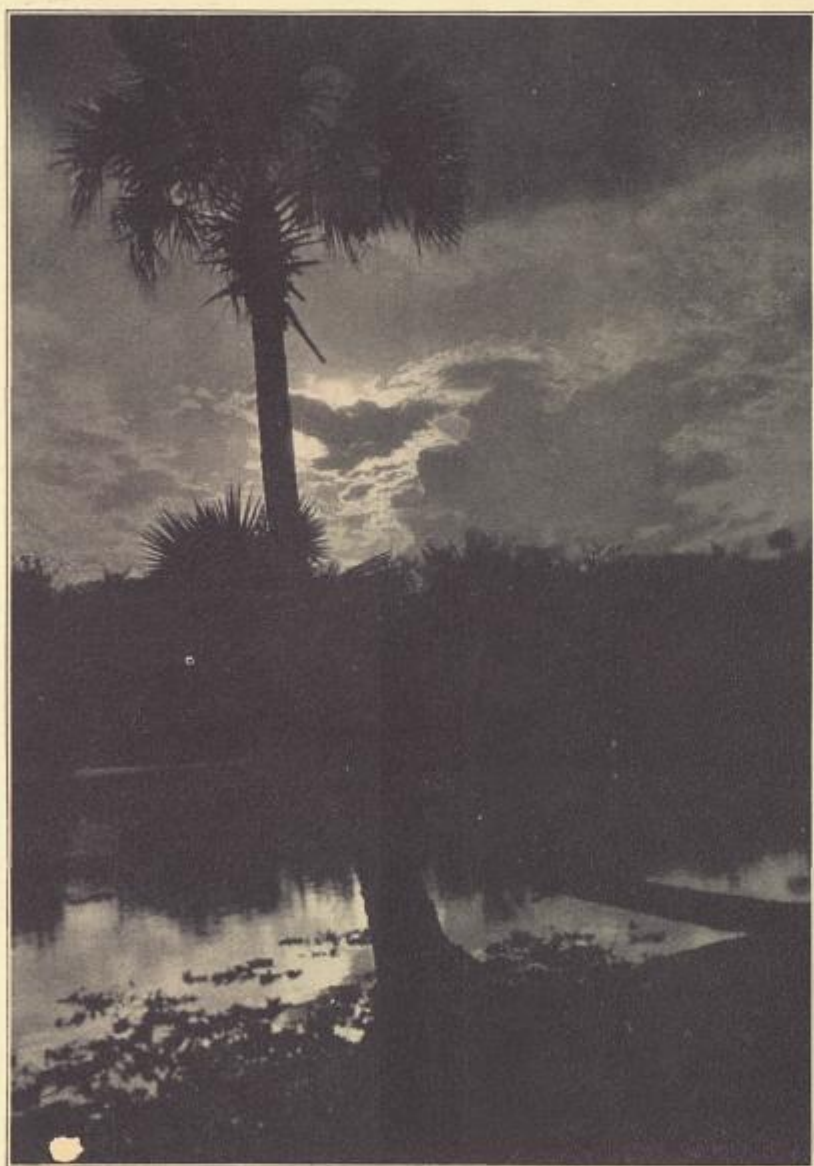
It is the privilege, not to say duty, of all who receive benefit from the college to make return to their alma mater in money or service or enlistment of others.

## The Business College and Department of Business Administration



Since the establishment of the Business College, its history has been one of growth and progress. This is evidenced by the fact that when first instituted all of its departments were housed in the room now occupied by Professor Stover's Department of Public Speaking. The next move was to the south wing of Elizabeth Hall, now occupied by the Music Department. These quarters soon proving too small, the next step was to the second floor of the north wing of Elizabeth Hall, the space which it now occupies. The present quarters are beginning to be too small and if the registration for the next two years increases as much as it has in the last two, provision for more space and more teachers will have to be made.

To keep step with the demands of the age the scope of work offered has been greatly enlarged within the last four years. Courses not only in Elementary Accounting and Shorthand are given, but a three-year course in Cost Accounting and also a four-year course in Business Administration leading to the degree of B. S. have been added, also special work in Banking.

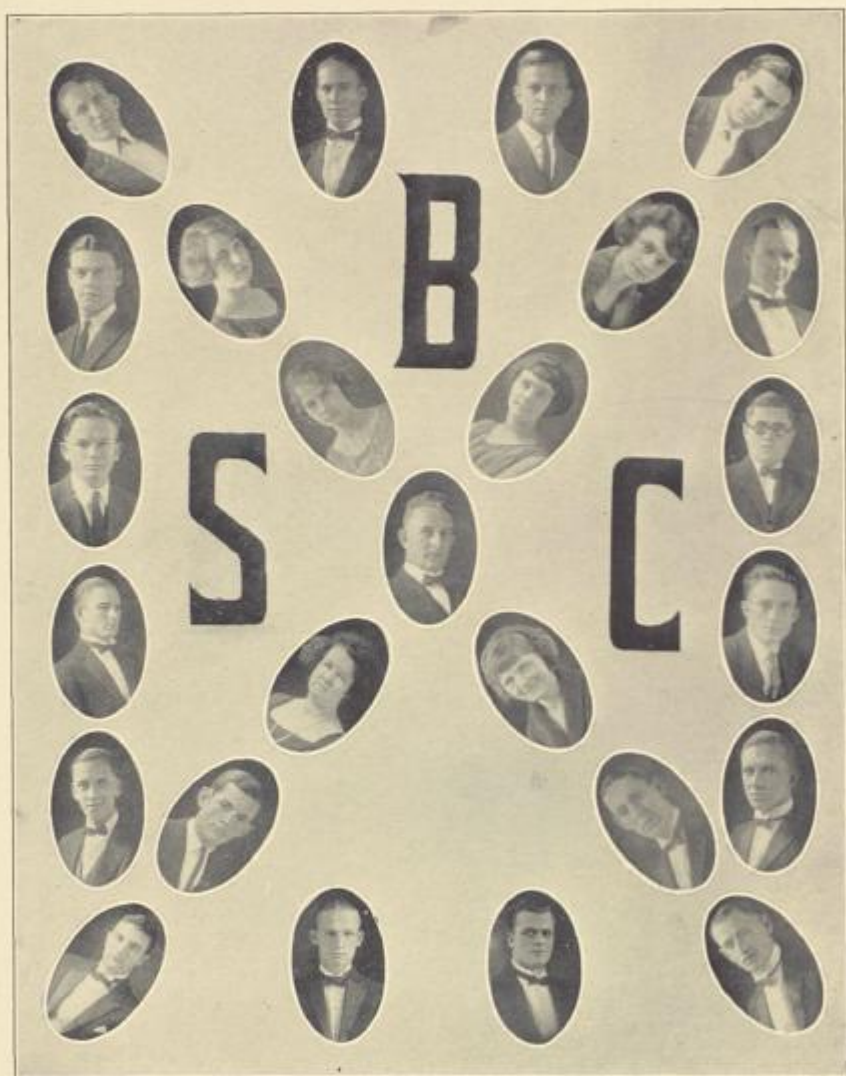
No effort is spared to make the work up to date and effective.
