Hail to our heroes gone.


Hail to our classmates,


Many students who are not members of the Conservatory owe not a little of their cultural development to the activities of the Music Department.

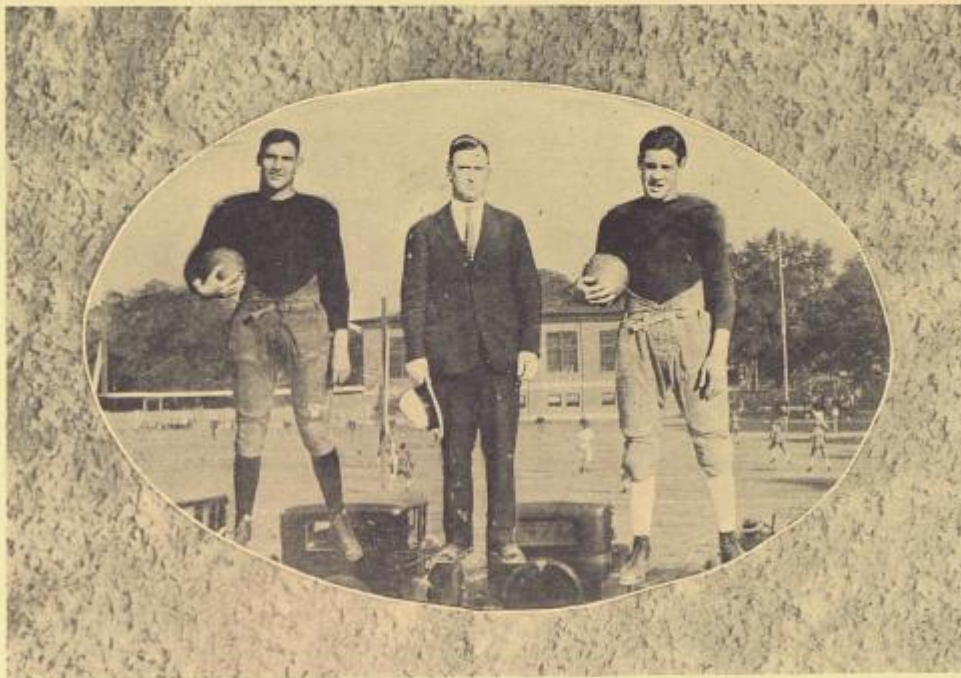
### COACH HERBERT R. McQUILLAN

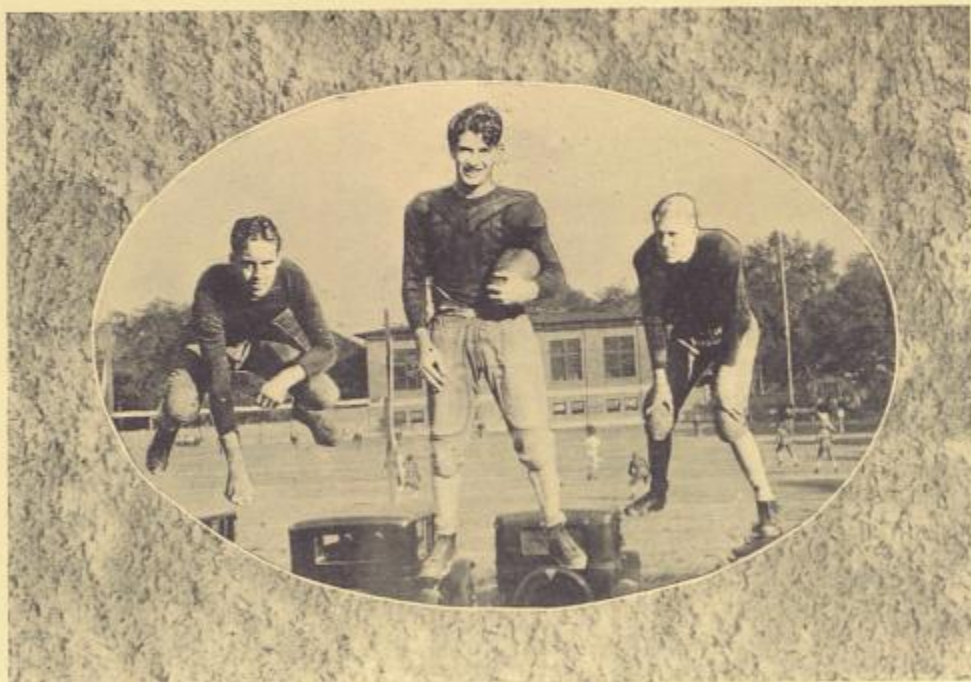


#### LARRY BERNARD (Captain) (Quarterback)

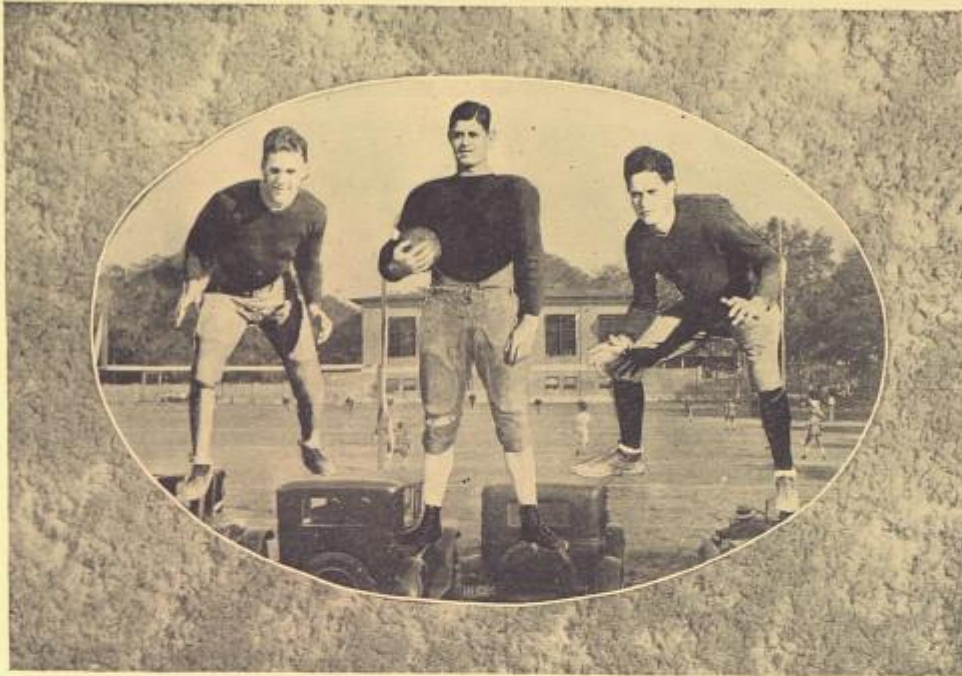
ALVIN "BUTCH" YARGER ((Fullback)

#### CLARENCE "C. O." WRIGHT (Tackle)

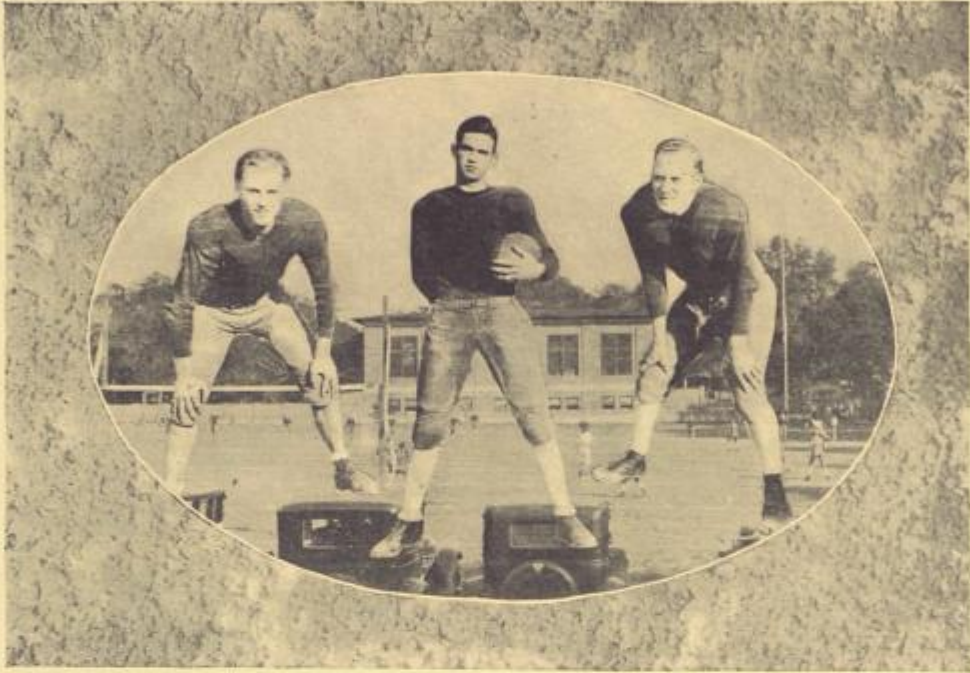

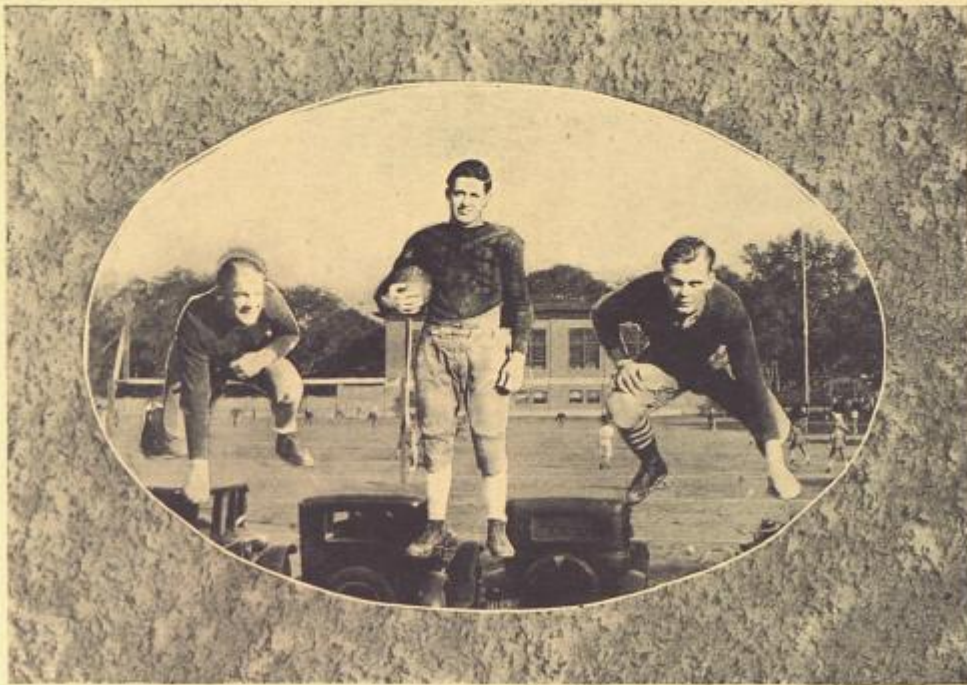
#### TOM SMITH (Halfback)

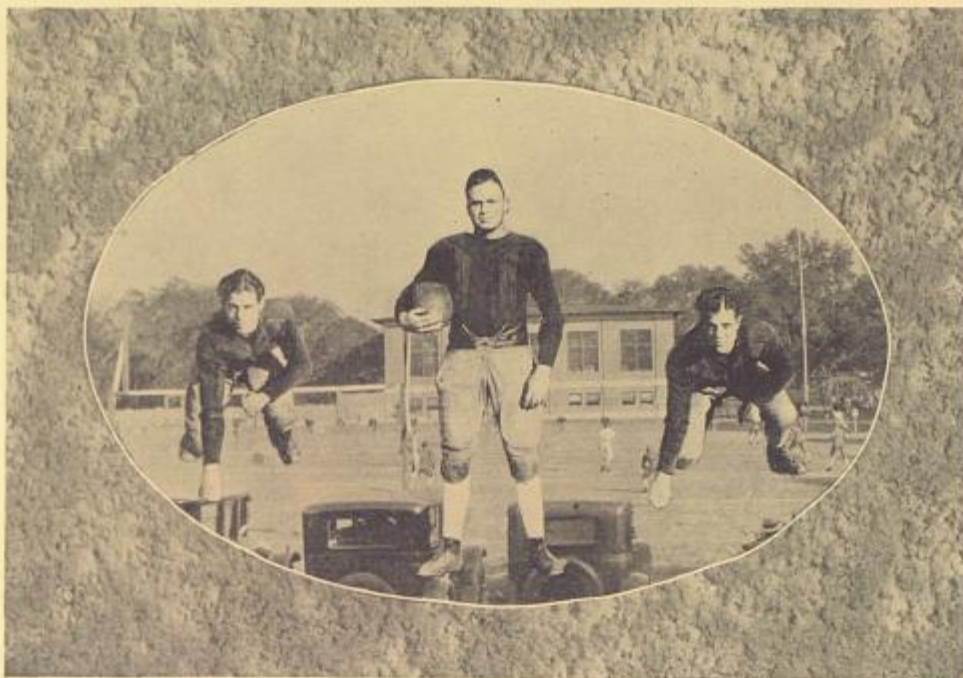
CHARLEY BOOTH (Halfback)

#### PETER FRISCIA (End)

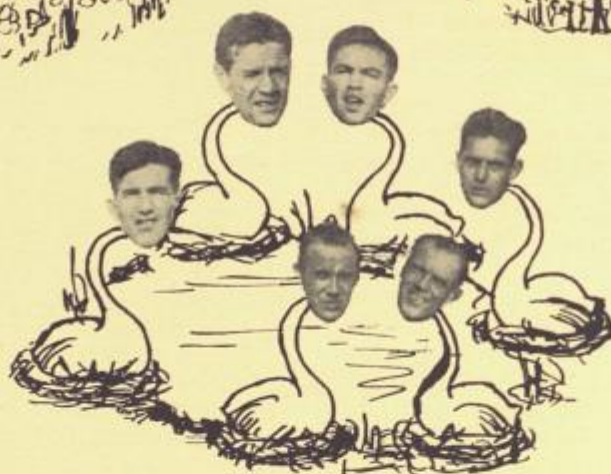
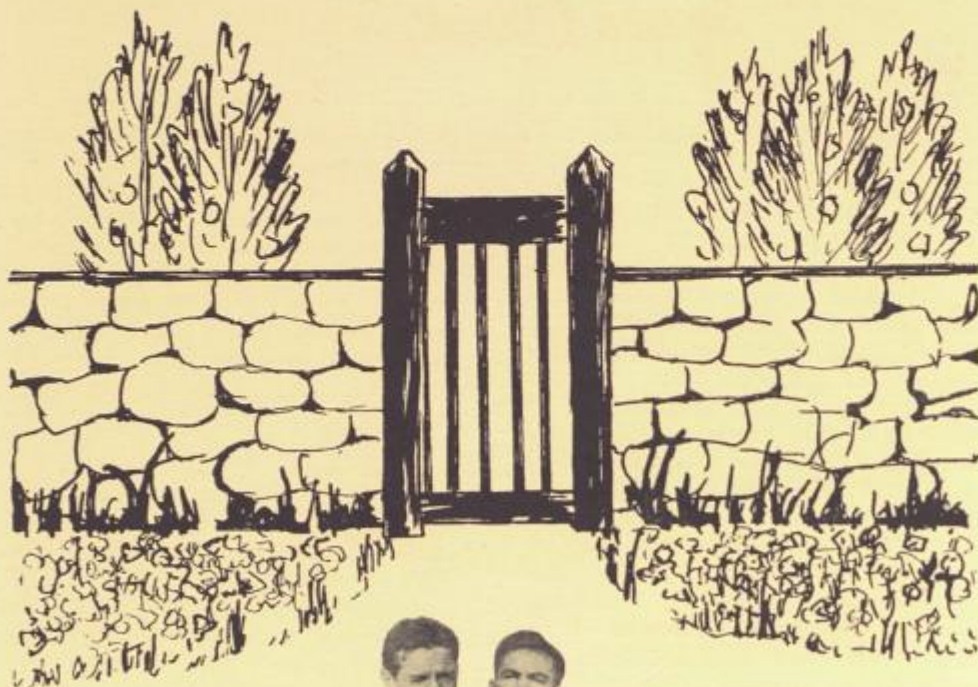
"Pete" certainly showed determination and fight this year, but he was handicapped by his small stature. He plays a hard game and is always ready to get into the fray and do his utmost.

Homecoming was the next date on the Stetson calendar, and glancing down the list the Hatters found that they were scheduled to meet the Rollins Tars from Winter Park. Not much was known of the Tars in the Hatters' camp, so Coach McQuillan put forth his best efforts to give the neighboring college a real reception, and he fulfilled his task in fine shape. At two-forty-five the sponsors were welcomed by the colorful crowd—Miss Frances Darby and Miss Clara Louise Robinson for Rollins, and Miss Lois Hon and Miss Robin Gaumer for Stetson. From then on the Hatters scored almost at will. In the third quarter the backs

ran wild around and through the Rollins' team. This quarter had hardly started before Lowenthal received the pass from center and raced forty yards for another score. Unable to run the ends or gain through the line, Rollins resorted to the air to gain, but here too they were unsuccessful because the alert Hatter backs intercepted pass after pass—two of them resulting in touchdowns. There were no individual stars—the team as a whole playing heads-up football. Captain Bernard was forced to witness the combat from the sidelines, as was Tom Smith, due to injuries from the Southern battle. The Rollins lads put up a game fight, but the odds were too heavy for them to cope with.

*Stetson 19      Louisiana  
Poly 7*

The American Legion of Jacksonville made arrangements with Coach McQuillan to sponsor a game for the Hatters in that city, so it was arranged to have Stetson meet the strong Louisiana Polytechnic Institute team on Armistice Day at Fairfield Stadium. The opponents came to Jacksonville with an enviable record of victories to back them up, and a crowd of three thousand fans turned out to witness the struggle. It was Stetson's initial appearance in the northern city, and the Hatters prepared to "Strut their Stuff"—and they did. Stetson received the kick-off and returned it fifteen yards. Then on the first play Freeman received the pass from center, and, behind perfect interference from his team mates, dodged and ran through the Louisiana team for sixty yards and a touchdown. Bernard kicked the extra point. It all happened so quickly and smoothly that the spectators were awe stricken. But from then on it was a struggle, and Stetson played remarkable football to pave



the way for the galloping Freeman to score two more touchdowns by plunging the line. Captain Bernard's excellent generalship was responsible in a large measure for the victory. It was in this game that the mettle of Stetson's line was put to the test and it stood. In the second quarter the big Louisiana eleven was within one yard of Stetson's goal with four downs to make it in. But four times the opposing backs found a stone wall confronting them, and the fourth time they were thrown for a six-yard loss, and Bernard punted out of danger. It was late in the fourth period that Louisiana returned a punt to the ten yard line, and plugged it over for a score. The Hatters put up a great battle, and won admiration from Jacksonville fans.

*Stetson 36      Miami U. 0*

Shifting scenes from one end of the state to the other, the Hatters confronted the Miami University Hurricanes the following Saturday in the "Windy City" stadium. Confident of victory due to the fact that they had defeated the "Baby Hatters" the year before, Miami fully intended to send the Hatters back home defeated. But true to Stetson style, the tables were turned, and the "Hurricane" was like a soft spring breeze at the end of four periods of struggle. As the Miami papers put it, "There was too much Freeman and Bernard combination." Nine passes were attempted, and only one failed. The Hatter line played havoc with Miami's plays—stopping the ball-carrier before he reached the line of scrimmage. The backs gained through the line, around the ends, and via the air route almost at will. Lowenthal

played his best game that day, being responsible for one of Stetson's touchdowns.

Kentucky 0*

To end up a successful season so far, the Hatters returned to the home camp to close the season with the "Praying Colonels" of Centre College, Kentucky—one time conquerors of Harvard. This game created widespread interest in and around De Land, and a colorful crowd gathered at Cumming's Field to witness the struggle. Four popular Stetson young ladies were chosen to act as sponsors for the teams—Miss Barbara Hines and Mrs. Lloyd Layton for Stetson, and Miss Judy Bohon and Miss Myrtle Franklin for Centre. This game was of peculiar interest to the members of the Hatter squad, because it closed the football career of six of their number. These were: Chet Freeman, Capt. Larry Bernard, Lloyd Layton, Maurice Williams, Tom Smith and Nat O'Kelly, and each covered himself with glory in that last great battle for their Alma Mater. In the third quarter it was Layton who broke up a Centre threat by intercepting a pass and racing eighty yards for a score. Mox, Hatter guard, played havoc with Centre's famous spread formation. This game was a grand climax to a successful Hatter season during which the Hatters scored 193 points to their opponents 13. Such a consequence is, no doubt, the result of the fact that Stetson is not a one-man team, but eleven men working as one. The Hatters' motto is: "Eleven men in every play."

## *Freshman Football*

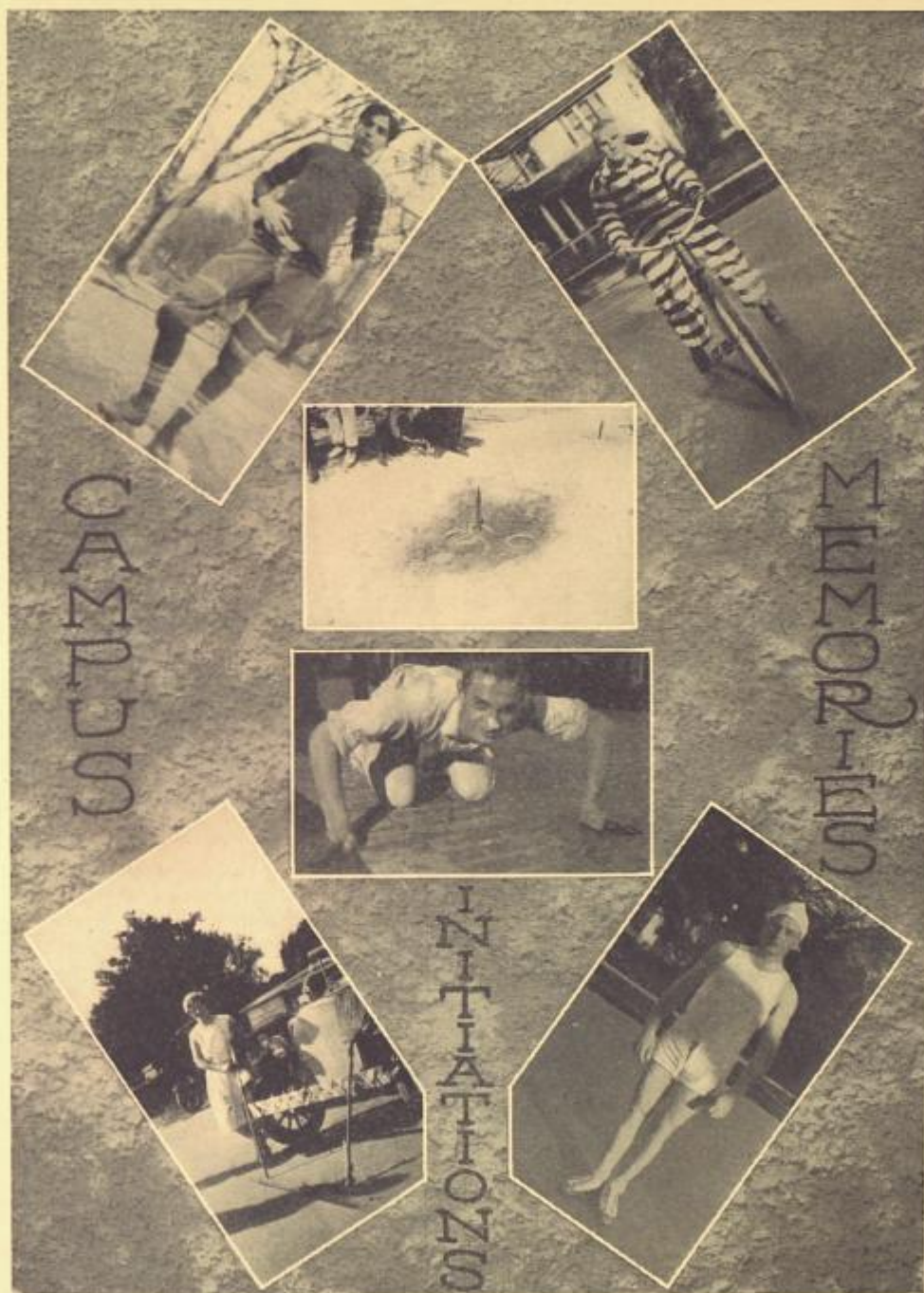

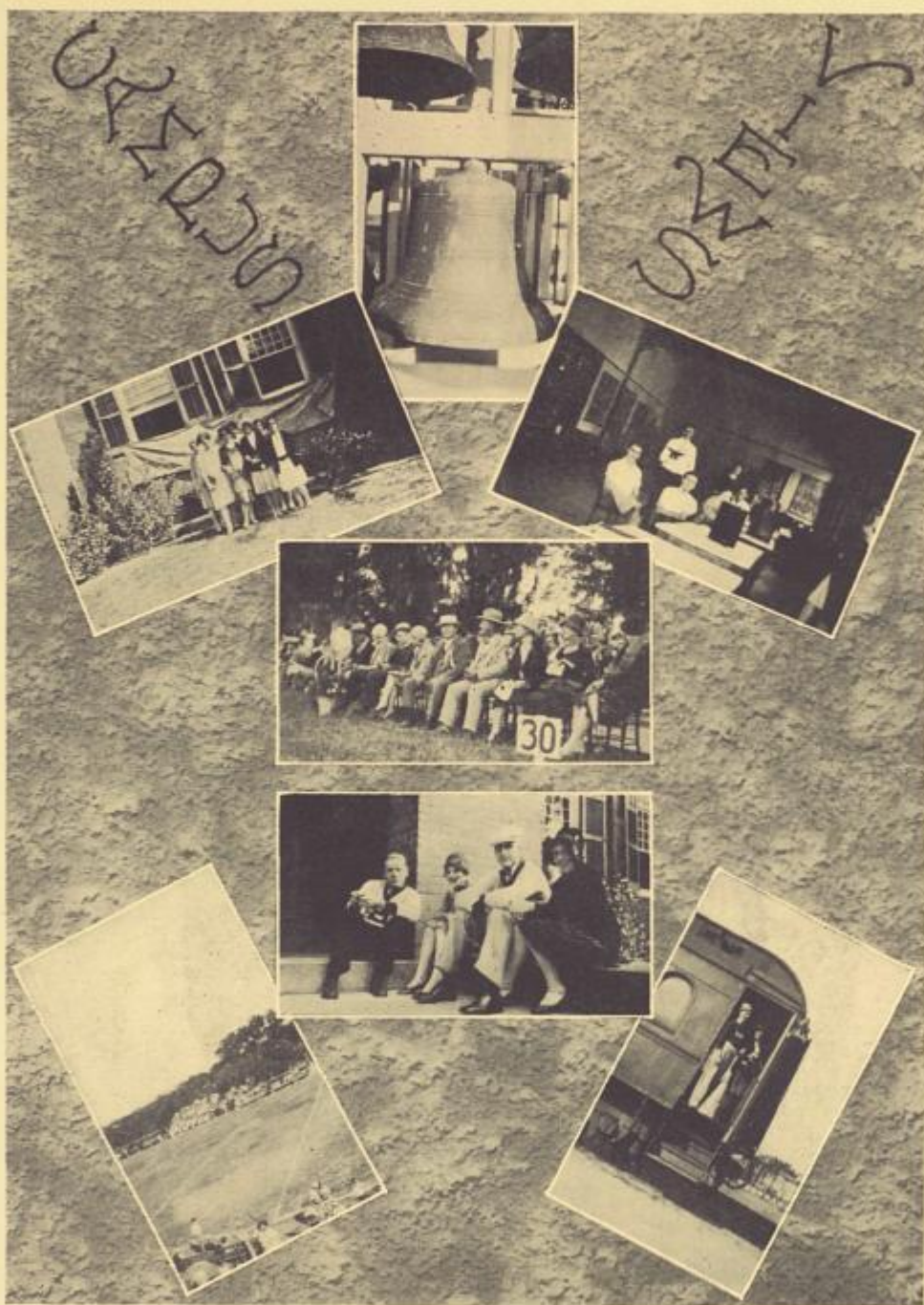

At center Bruce was a tower of strength. In fact the entire team deserves credit for their fine work. They worked on the principle that it takes eleven men to play the game, which is nothing short of the truth.

This was Tom Smith who for three seasons had been the shining light in Stetson basket-ball. With his loss it was necessary for Coach to groom someone to fill his place, which was no easy task.

With but little practice the team went up against the Orlando Legion team who nosed out a win over the Hatters by a score of 24-21. But the boys showed the makings of a real team, and it was even more noticeable in the next game with the Daytona All-Stars when the Hatters registered a win of 34-28. These two games were played mostly for the experience in preparing for the college games, and the deciding of the State S. I. A. A. championship. The first one of these games was with Rollins College, and the boys took them into camp by the score of 29-16. Things began to look good until the team traveled to Ft. Pierce to meet their semi-pro team who handed the Hatters a 63-49 defeat. Going from there to Miami the team met the Hurricanes of Miami U. the following night, and were again forced to taste bitter defeat to the tune of 33-25. Coming back home for a rest and a tuning up on the stale points, the boys met the Hurricanes in a return game and turned the tables, defeating them 32-26 in a fast, exciting game. On the next jaunt the Hatters traveled to Lakeland to meet Southern College who exhibited some good basket-ball to beat the Hatters by the score of 33-19. This was a bad break, and the next week-end saw the team again in defeat at the hands of Rollins College in the second game by the score of 29-19. In the closing game of the season the Hatters again met Southern College on the home court, and were determined to turn the tables which they did when they defeated the Moccasins 18-15. This game closed the season with the ledger showing four victories and five defeats.

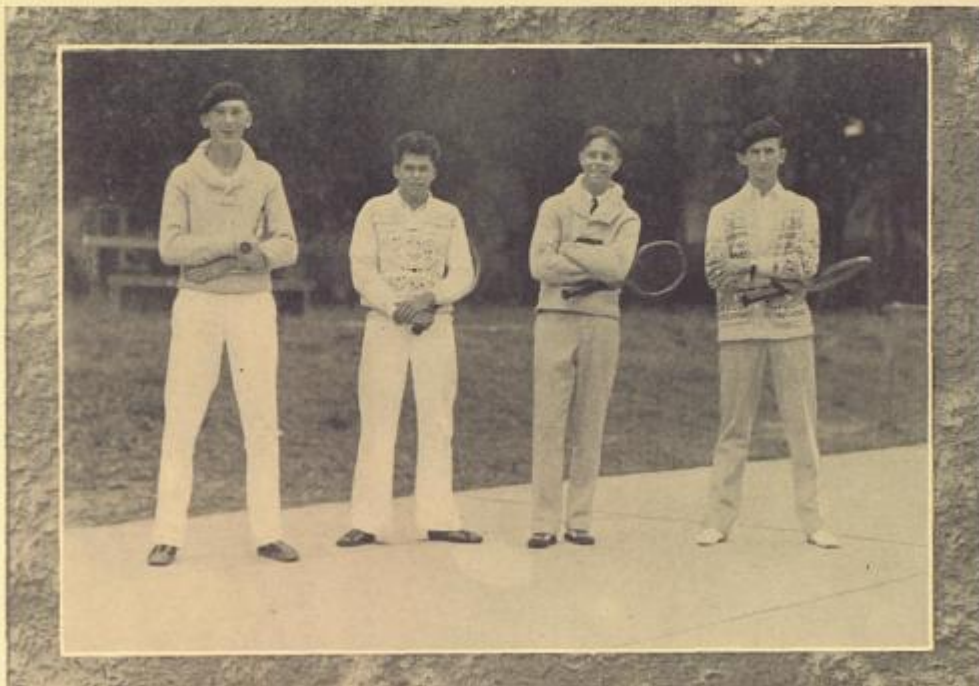
## *Track*
