### Departments merge

College of Engineering Dean Gary Whitehouse announced that the faculties of the existing departments of electrical engineering and computer engineering will merge into a new unit to be called the department of electrical and computer engineering, effective this summer. The reorganization has been approved by the division of academic affairs and President John Hitt. Nicolaos Tzannes will serve as chair.

All faculty, staff and student populations in the current departments will move to the new department. All degree programs and curriculum structures will remain in place for the near future, with the standard guarantee of students being allowed to graduate under the curriculum requirements of the UCF catalog that was in use when they entered the university.

### Journal launched

The department of foreign languages and literatures has launched a new journal, the *Foreign Language Journal*.

Editors said articles will be in English, and will treat the broadest possible spectrum of foreign languages: general methodology, culture, travel, literature, linguistics, audio-visual/computer instructional enhancement, study abroad, student exchange and English-as-a-Second Language. Also, it will address specific interests: summer institutes, grants, scholarships, seminars, awards and recognition and abroad programs.

The audience will be primarily high school and elementary school teachers of foreign languages, although community college and university teachers may also be interested. Only articles by members of the Foreign Language Proficiency and Culture Association will be considered for publication. Annual meetings will begin in spring 1993 in Orlando. Selected talks will also be published.

Members will receive periodic newsletters as well as a list of members' addresses, specialization or interests. The newsletter will serve as a forum or clearinghouse for all matters relating to the propagation of foreign languages and cultures.

## Faculty, students recognized at Founders' Day Convocation

Fifty-nine faculty members and 102 students were honored during the university's fourth annual Founders' Day Honors Convocation on April 8 before a standing room-only crowd in the Student Center auditorium.

The two-hour ceremony recognized this year's most outstanding students and faculty. Among the most prestigious of awards, chemistry professor Brooks Madsen was named teacher of the year, Cheryl Walters librarian of the year, and chemistry professor Christian Clausen researcher of the year.

In all, 17 faculty members were recognized for excellence in teaching, advising and research. Thirty-six others were honored for 20 years of service to the university. And seven

retiring faculty members received stained-glass plaques depicting Pegasus.

Among the student honors, nine undergraduates were recognized for their honor theses. Founders' Scholars Awards were presented to undergraduates in the top one percent academically within each college. Three students were recognized for accomplishments in research. Outstanding students from each college (one in each except Arts and Sciences, with three) were also honored individually for academic accomplishments.

Faculty members honored for teaching excellence were: English professor Richard Adicks, computer science professor Charles Hughes, and Madsen, all from the College of

Arts and Sciences; associate management professor Lloyd Fernald, College of Business; associate education professor Jennifer Platt, College of Education; associate engineering professor Harold Klee, College of Engineering; associate biological sciences professor Robert Laird, College of Health and Public Affairs.

Those honored for advising were: Milan Meeske, school of communication; Parveen Wahid, electrical engineering department; and Joyce Dorner, nursing department.



## International Air Attache Corps flies through UCF

Twenty-eight members of the International Air Attache Corps visited the University of Central Florida on March 20 to observe Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets and gain an understanding of the AFROTC program as a commissioning source.

The visitors, representing 28 nations, are high-ranking officers assigned to embassy staffs in Washington, D.C. The Air Force sponsors two or three field trips for the officers each year.

The group was hosted at UCF by the staff and cadets of AFROTC Detachment 159.

President John Hiitt welcomed the officers at a continental breakfast with cadets and university officials. Lt. Col. John Linn, commander of Detachment 159, followed with a briefing describing the commissioning program and highlighting the successes of the

detachment.

Cadets and staff members escorted the attaches on a campus tour and a walk-through of the AFROTC facilities on campus. Cadets demonstrated aspects of the military and physical fitness training program, giving the attaches a first-hand look at cadet training. The demonstration included marching drills, an open-ranks inspection and a fitness training session.

The group concluded their visit with a luncheon, giving cadets and university officials an opportunity to meet with them and learn about military training and careers in other nations.

"I feel this is an invaluable experience for the cadets," Linn said. "To be able to interact with officers from other nations and exchange experiences and ideas is something they can carry with them for their entire Air Force careers."

**Jerry Schiffhorst**, English professor, received a UCF-DSR in-house grant for his project, "The Ambivalence of Sexual Power in Milton."



More phone calls were made this year (17,880) than last (14,186). More money was pledged (\$114,644 compared to \$84,590). And the rate of new donors and new donor pledges doubled over last year.
