State pays \$3.3 million for Research Park property to prepare for future UCF growth

The University of Central Florida had a sudden growth spurt last month when the Florida Cabinet purchased 218 acres in the Central Florida Research Park on behalf of the university.

The property, which carried a price tag of \$3.3 million, was the last undeveloped land adjoining the main campus. It is located just east of the southeastern corner of the main campus.

With nearly 500 acres of the campus already set aside as preserves, environmentally protected land and wetlands, and the expectation that UCF will likely someday serve as many as 50,000 students, President John Hitt convinced the Board of Regents the property was needed.

In 1993 the BOR added the purchase to the State University System PECO list, and the Legislature approved it. The land was owned by the Orange County Research and Development Authority.

The purchase was made on Feb. 23 by the Florida Cabinet, acting as the trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund on behalf of UCF. Officially, the university will lease the property from the state as it does the existing campus property.

The sale of the property was handled by Mike Ryan of the firm of Lowndes, Drosdick, Doster, Kantor & Reed, which represented the Orange County Research and Development Authority. Tom Ross, chair of the authority, signed for the sale.

Ombuds officer enhances TQM

Victoria "Vicky" Brown, executive assistant to President John Hitt for the past four years, has been named the first UCF ombuds officer, available to help members of the campus community thread their way through processes and problems at the university. In her previous position Brown often informally represented the president in the role of ombuds officer.

The ombuds officer position was established to further the goals of Total Quality Management, an ongoing effort at UCF. Earlier this year, UCF's USPS Staff Council proposed such a position in order to help staff members resolve problems through existing channels or through informal mediation. and other clients might use this office to address problems in various areas on campus.

For instance, the officer will meet with clients who have had problems with an operating office. Brown will ensure that clients have attempted to resolve the problem with the appropriate office; if not, she will refer them to the office and brief its representative to meet with the client and address the issue.

While the role ensures high-quality service for UCF clients, it also involves

liaison with departments that have attempted to address problems. If university resources were tapped by the client already, possibly including appeals, the officer will ensure that the client is aware of the end result and the steps that were taken.

Brown will assume her expanded professional duties when her replacement is identified in the president's office. That role, executive assistant to the president, will manage office operations. A new position, serving as senior executive assistant to the president, also is being announced, tailored for a faculty member who will advise and assist the president.

remain in that country until its June 24 match with Ireland.

Top-seeded Belgium will head-quarter at the Ormond Beach Soccer Complex. Morocco will base its official training site at the Austin Tindall Recreational Facility in Osceola County. Ireland will use the Seminole County Sports Training Center.

All teams must be in their official World Cup training site five days prior to the first Florida Citrus Bowl game on June 19, according to regulations of the FIFA, the world governing body of soccer.

Teams made the site selections based on a list of facilities provided by World Cup USA 1994. Team representatives toured the sites immediately after the World Cup final draw in Las Vegas on Dec. 19, and had until Jan. 15 to submit their preference.

Conference targets HIV, AIDS prevention

Two University of Central Florida representatives are among those taking part in the HIV Prevention Collaborative Partners Conference in Washington this week.

The conference will help launch a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention marketing initiative targeted to reduce sexual transmission of HIV and other sexually transmitted

diseases among young adults.

Members of various professional organizations, local and state education agencies and university projects were invited. Representing UCF are Gail West, director of the Higher Education Consortium for AIDS Prevention, and Suzan Kurdak, HECAP peer education coordinator.

Each participant is developing draft strategies and guidelines for

select issues on research and evaluation, health communications, national and local coalition building, local community implementation issues, and linkages and integration with existing health, education and social services agencies.

HECAP is a five-year project funded through CDC to provide HIV and AIDS prevention education to college students.

UCF students take workshop to Carolinas
